# REIGN OF TERROR IN SOVIET RUSSIA

## CONSTITUTIONALISTS SUSTAINED IN THE IRISH ELECTIONS

### Government Sustained in Irish Elections but Opposition Make Gains

DUBLIN, June 15.—The Constitutional party is returned to power here, the opposition or republican group having increased the strength of their opposition from 46 in the last Dail to 50 in this. Both the Fianna Fail or De Valera group and the Sinn Feiners are opposed to the present Irish Constitution but all others support it. All returns are now in except for one for the National University and one for Dublin University. The results with the two polls to appear from are as follows:

### SUPREME COURT OPENS SESSION

PROCEEDINGS OPENED THIS AFTERNOON WITH MR. JUSTICE DENIS MURPHY PRESIDING

With appropriate remarks by Mr. Justice Denis Murphy who commented on the satisfactory fact that six months had elapsed in Prince Rupert and district without any such serious crime being committed as to require the attention of the higher courts, the regular spring session of the Supreme Court Assizes was opened in the city at 1 o'clock this afternoon. There were no jurymen summoned owing to the fact that there are no criminal cases on the docket.

### BOSTOCK AND J. A. GAUTHIER

SENATOR DENIES THAT HE GAVE THE MAN THE LETTER QUOTED IN THE AFFIDAVIT

VICTORIA, June 15.—Senator Bostock gave John A. Gauthier an ordinary business letter of introduction in which the word "credentials" was not mentioned and gave him no warning that large powers were being conferred upon him. Senator Bostock said at the resumed sitting of the Royal Commission investigating liquor charges before Mr. Justice Morrison. The letter quoted in the Gauthier affidavit was different from the one the senator wrote, he told the commission.

## Reign of Terror in Russia is Increasing and Suicides and Executions Are Very Numerous

### Not enough prison accommodation for the thousands arrested so victims are sent in freight trains to Siberia

LONDON, June 15.—A despatch from Russia says the new reign of terror has more than doubled the number of suicides in Moscow, where there are now from ten to fifteen daily. Moscow and Leningrad do not possess enough prison accommodations for the additional thousands of persons arrested during the past few days so they are guarded in freight trains, which are leaving both cities nightly taking their victims to Siberia.

### SULPHURIC PLANT AT TRAIL SMELTER WILL BE CONSTRUCTED NOW

TRAIL, B.C., June 15. — Extensive plans are being made and construction will be proceeded with immediately of a large contact process sulphuric plant at the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Company's plant. This plant will make sulphuric acid from the smelter fumes, and the first unit will cost approximately \$250,000, according to announcement made by the management here.

In conjunction with this plant, an experimental phosphate fertilizer plant will be erected, using phosphate throughout from the fields in the Crownest district, where the Consolidated has located large beds. Any sulphuric acid which will be made and used in this connection will reduce the sulphur dioxide in fumes to that extent and consequently will reduce smoke damage.

The police are heavily armed. Despite reports that the killer is in Saskatchewan, the police continue to guard the border points.

### CHICAGO CUBS NOW NEAR TOP

CHANGE IN NATIONAL LEAGUE SUPREMACY IMMINENT—RAIN STOPS GAMES

NEW YORK, June 15.—Rain throughout the East yesterday caused the postponement of most of the big league fixtures. Three games were played in the National League and none in the American.

Chicago Cubs made it four straight over the New York Giants and are now but one full game behind the National League leaders, Pittsburgh Pirates, who, with the Brooklyn Dodgers, were idle. St. Louis improved its hold on third place by defeating Philadelphia and the Cincinnati Reds continued their drive to get out of the cellar by defeating Boston.

The stage is now set for a dramatic battle for National League leadership, between Pittsburgh Pirates and Chicago Cubs. The latter now have won ten games without a single loss and the last four were at the expense of the Giants for a clean sweep of the series.

Since the Cubs have played two more games than the Pirates and lost two more they are still a few points behind in the standing. Western teams made a clean sweep yesterday.

### CAUGHT FIRE TAKING OIL

CANNERY MOTORSHIP MET MISHAP AT SEATTLE BURNING INTERIOR AND BURNING WOMEN

SEATTLE, June 15. — Two young women were severely burned and a woman and children thrown into the sea when fire destroyed the interior of a wooden cannery motorship Donallane at Point Wells yesterday morning.

The heroic action of the crew in tagging women and children through the portholes resulted in the rescue of all the members of the saltery crew. The vessel had stopped to take gas and oil and a member of the crew dropped the hose into the hold where it struck a light bulb and the waste oil ignited.

### WOMAN'S HEAD BATTERED IN

MAN FOUND BESIDE HER WITH THROAT CUT AND HAMMER AND RAZOR IN ROOM

VANCOUVER, June 15.—Mrs. Annie Donald, 35 years of age, was found this morning lying on a bed in her Cambie Street home with the side of her head battered in. On the floor lay the body of her husband, G. W. Donald, 35 years of age, with blood flowing from a terrible gash in his throat.

In the room the police found a carpenter's hammer clogged with blood and a bloodstained razor on the chair beside the bed.

### IDENTITY OF WOMAN FOUND

JEAN K. EDWARD WHO WAS MURDERED IS REALLY MRS. N. C. MCKINNON

VANCOUVER, June 15.—The police cleared up the identity of Jean K. Edward, the woman found murdered here on Sunday. Her real name was Mrs. N. C. McKinnon whose husband lived apart from her, it is believed at Bellingham.

### JAPANESE DROWNED IN SKEENA RIVER

Body of Takijiro Shinde is Recovered and Police are Making Investigation Before Interment

Takijiro Shinde, Japanese employed by the B.C. Packers at Standard camp in the Skeena River slough, apparently fell off a fish boat on Tuesday afternoon and was drowned. The body, floating in the river, was recovered and taken to Port Essington where the provincial police is investigating the circumstances of the fatality. Later the remains will be brought to the city and placed in charge of the B.C. Undertakers for interment.

### APPEAL IS ENTERED AGAINST FOUR YEARS MANSLAUGHTER SENTENCE

VANCOUVER, June 15.—An appeal has been filed against the sentence of four years for manslaughter on behalf of Angus Nicholson. The conviction arose out of the death of Marshall Douglas. Bail is being sought and the appeal is not likely to take place until autumn.

### A BUSY MONTH AT HOSPITAL

RECORD MADE IN NUMBER OF PATIENTS AND CHEAPNESS OF OPERATING

At the Hospital Board meeting last night James Thompson presiding, the finance committee, through one of the members, Chris Elkins, reported that the income of the hospital for the month was \$5,629.25 and the expenditures \$5,684.73 leaving a deficit for the month of \$55.48.

The hospital had been busier than ever before in its existence, there being no fewer than 62 patients there at one time, the total hospital days being 1751 and the cost \$2.81 per day for each patient, the lowest on record. For the house committee Mr. Elkins reported that the sidewalk to the nurse's home had been completed and other minor matters attended to. A new electric stove was ordered to be installed on the second floor, this being considered cheaper than repairing the old one which had been giving trouble.

### DAMAGE CASE IS REPORTED

HOSPITAL HEARS OF CASE IN ALBERTA BEARING ON RESPONSIBILITY OF NURSES

At the meeting of the hospital board the report of an Alberta case dealing with the responsibility of the hospital in regard to matters of carelessness was read. In the particular case cited, nurses had applied hot water bottles to a patient and the man was injured thereby. Damages in the amount of \$5,182 were assessed against the hospital and the higher courts upheld the judgment. It was pointed out in the judgment that if the carelessness had been at a time when the nurses were in the operating room directly under the supervision of the doctor, the hospital would not have been responsible but the complaint had to do with action taken after an operation and the nurse was then under control of the hospital authorities and was expected to know her work and use reasonable care.

### PROMINENT LOCAL JAPANESE PASSES

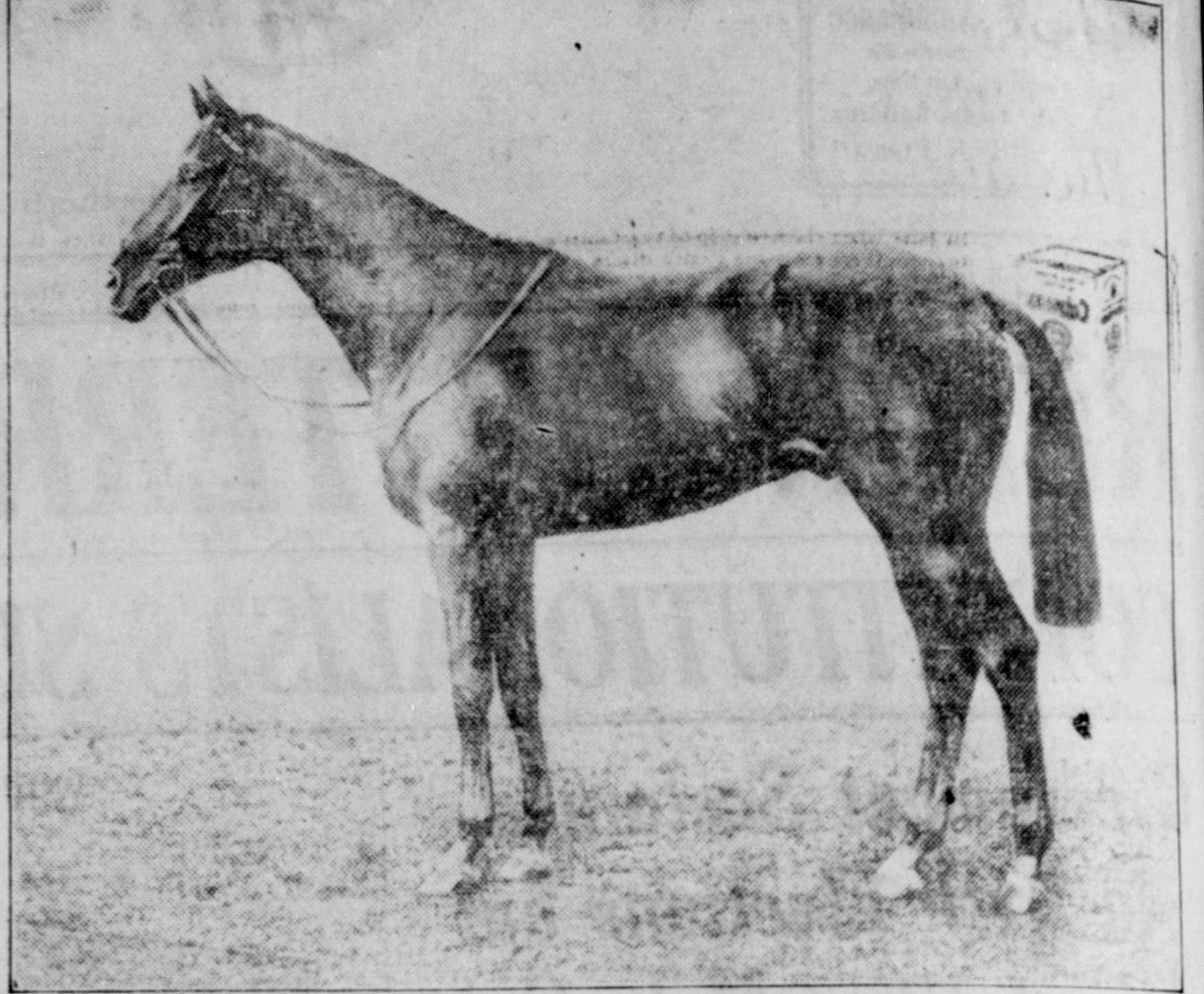
Death Came Suddenly in Prince Rupert General Hospital to Tore Yoshioka, Restaurant Proprietor

### WILL DISCUSS PROBLEMS OF THE PACIFIC

#### DR. HENRY SUZZALLO OUTLINES PLANS FOR INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE AT HONOLULU

NEW YORK, June 15.—The chief things some chief Americans will talk over with equally important Chinese, Japanese and British citizens at the meeting of the Institute of Pacific Relations in Honolulu from July 15 to 29, were outlined in an interview by Dr. Henry Suzzallo, formerly president of the University of Washington, and well known on the coast for his grasp of the problems confronting the various races and nations that live on Pacific shores. How important these problems are to the world in general Dr. Suzzallo said was made evident by the fact that half the human race lives in countries bordering on the Pacific.

"The Institute of Pacific Relations," Dr. Suzzallo said, "meets in Honolulu in July not to legislate or to make resolutions. Its purpose is discussion, frank and unofficial, between leading citizens in the ten countries bordering on or having interest in the Pacific. Americans are often easy-going just because they are prosperous. They are slow to sense how important a part Pacific relations will play in the peace of the world. But it is the great arena of the future. We can make it a peaceful arena, a living demonstration that men are civilized enough to recognize and reconcile their differing interests through frank discussion, instead of ignorantly letting relations reach the fighting stage when intelligent speech is impossible until the contestants are physically worn out. I shall never forget what a young American officer of the World War said to me five years after his return from France, 'I can never get over the fact that the war was stopped at eleven o'clock one morning when the war lords were willing to negotiate.'

TALK SETTLED IT  
"That young man by his penetration and clarity of view accused the civilized world of being willing to fight until it was too tired to do anything but talk, and of finding then, that talk—frank talk, open discussion, was all that was needed to settle supposedly irreconcilable differences. That is what the Institute of Pacific Relations wants to do—bring out all the issues between the Chinese, Japanese, Americans and British, and the colonials of each—find out what each race thinks of those issues, and what can be done to make us all pull together, for sooner or later, we've got to."

Dr. Suzzallo was asked how this international meeting was different from others.

"In the first place, it isn't bossed by any one nation, or by a group of nations, as most of them are," he said, "for every nation has its say in running the Institute, and in the second place, this is one international meeting where political leaders, bankers, university presidents, labor leaders, economists and women's club leaders meet both formally and informally to look at all sides of Pacific questions. They must be looked at from every point of view if we are to understand them at all."

BIG PROBLEMS  
"The Chinese and Japanese look at the immigration question very differently from the Americans, and this we shall try to understand, at the Honolulu meeting. We want to know why they think as they do, and they want to know why we think and act as we do."

"In the third place, and possibly the most important, this conference is unique because no one has an axe to grind, and if he had, he couldn't grind it. Usually Orientals see Occidentals only in their 'GOVERNMENT LIQUOR ACT'

**PLACE BRITISH IN SETTLEMENT**

INDIAN RESERVE OPENED FOR FAMILIES SENT TO CANADA UNDER EMPIRE SCHEME

EDMONTON, June 15.—The opening of the Saddle Lake Indian Reserve and the placing of British immigrant families on it, is one of the best if not the best, immigration and land settlement schemes yet tried in western Canada. The plan, which is being carried on by the Land Settlement Board in co-operation with the government of Great Britain, gives every indication of being a complete success. The 12 families that are now in their new homes on the reserve are enthusiastic about their prospects, and more than satisfied with the farms which they were allotted.

Under this settlement scheme which is officially known as the "3000 British Families Settlement Scheme," 51 families are being sent to the Saddle Lake reserve. Beside the families which have already reached their farms, twelve more are en route from Winnipeg, and the remainder have left England. For
