WOLLD RENEW C.N.R. TAXATION AGREEMENT ON BASIS OF 865,000 PER YEAR

The city council, in special session last night, after about an hour and a half's discussion, decided to make a proposa! to the Canadian National Railways that the 1922 taxation agreement be renewed for a period of five years with the substitution of a flat yearly payment of \$65,000 instead of \$45,000, the figure to be exclusive of leases and local improvements, etc. Wires have been sent to railway headquarters asking as early a reply as possible. The railway company has already

BRITISH SHIP QUEENMOOR ARRIVED AT MIDNIGHT AFTER UNEVENT-FUL VOYAGE FROM JAPAN

After a passage reported good and uneventful by the master. Capt. W. S. McCaffrey, the British freighter Queenmeer arrived in port at midnight last uight from Japan to load a full cargo of grain at the local elevat r for delivery to United Kingdom or continent.

The Queenmour left Hakadate, Japan, on April 26 and bunkered at Muroran which port she left on April 28 for Prince Rupert.

On arrival here, the vessel anchored overnight in the harbor and moved into the elevator wharf at 7 o'clock this morning. She is now being fumigated and will be ready to start loading bright and early Monday morning. She will take a cargo of about 8,000 tons and should get away soon after the middle

RUSSIAN BALLOONISTS HAD THRIL-LING ADVENTURE AFTER FLY-ING 1,600 MILES

MOSCOW, May 14.-Two Russian balloonists, who had been missing since they left Moscow on April 30 in an endurance test, were rescued by native trappers in the North Ural mountains after two days tramping and crawling in the snowy wilderness.



Herring Pound Now Empty - Spring Salmon in Harbor -Halibut Landings Showing Steady Gain

The only herring pound established in the district this yearthat of Bradbury & Yelf at Pearl Harbor near Port Simpson-was emptied last week. HALIBUT LANDINGS

Volume of halibut landings at Prince Rupert is gradually creeping up and, while the total is still something more than one million pounds less than at a similar date last year, the past few weeks, taken individually, have shown increases over the corresponding weeks in 1926. During the past week, landings totalled 624,500 pounds-486,500 pounds American and 138,000 pounds Canadian-as compared with 607,300 counds in the corresponding week last year. The total this year to date is 7.076,200 pounds - 5,299,600 pounds American and 1,776,600 pounds Canadian-while last year's total at a simi-

lar date was 8,261,700 pounds. The fluctuation in prices during the past week yas comparatively small. The high Canadian price was 14.7c and 8c hich the Ternen received on Thursday for 5,200 pounds. The low Canadian price-12c and 7c-was paid on Saturday and Friday. The highest American price of the week was paid on Tuesday to the June which received 14.2c and 7c for 13,000 pounds. The low American price was 12.5c and 7c paid on Wednesday to the Alten for a record catch of 70,000 pounds.
