Claiming Fraud, Original Owners Whalen Paper Company Demand Cancellation of Property's Sale :

VANCOUVER, April 8 .- Action to set aside the sale of the assets of the Whalen Pulp & Paper Co. Ltd. on October 30, 1925, for \$4,000,000 on the ground of fraud has been launched in a writ filed in Supreme Court for James Whalen, George F. Whalen and Verna Dangerfield who are suing on behalf of themselves and other debenture holders, bondholders and shareholders. The assets of the company consist of plants at Port Alice, Woodfibre and Swanson Bay, said to be valued at about \$19,000,000, as well as extensive timber limits. The Montreal Trust Co., Royal Securities Corporation

Ltd., British Columbia Pulp & Paper* Co. Ltd., and I. W. Killam, president of the Royal Securities Corporation Montreal, are cited as defendants. The endorsement asks the court, among other things, to set aside the sale on the ground that the defendants fraudulently prevented the facts being brought to the notice of the court, when the sale was ordered, whereby it would have been shown that the sale ought to have been adjourned so as to enable a more advantageous sale to be made.

Sale of the assets of the Whalen Pulp & Paper Co. Ltd. was ordered by the Supreme Court when the company got into financial difficulties.

BANK OF MONTREAL REPORT SEES BRIGHTER CONDITIONS IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

In British Columbia the volume of wholesale trade is comewhat in advance last year; retail trade is fair, with sales of spring goods commencing, says the Bank of Montreal monthly report on business conditions. 
