BRITISH-RUSSIAN BREAK IS UNLIKELY

HOMICIDE FOUND BY JURY OVER BODY VANCOUVER MAN

Outlet for Peace River on Pacific Coast is Feasible But Not Economical Project

Railway committee investigating the question makes report to House of Commons-- would watch developments

OTTAWA, April 8.—The railway committee of the House of Commons, which has been investigating the matter of an outlet on the Pacific Coast for the Peace River valley, reported to the House of Commons this afternoon its opinion that the building of such an outlet is feasible from an engineering standpoint but that, on economic grounds, the construction should not be commenced forthwith. The potentialities of the district, the report said, warranted continuous study of its development.

Premier Brownlee of Alberta advocated that the Canadian National Railways take over the Edmonton-Dunvegan railway as it would be unfair to project a line to the Pacific Coast without including the Alberta government road in the system.

BRITISH ARE PREDOMINANT

IN PARTIES OF SETTLERS REACHING WINNIPEG FOR WESTERN CANADA

WINNIPEG, April 8.—British born settlers continue to predominate over all other nationalities arriving in western Canada for settlement. A second large party reached here yesterday morning over the lines of the Canadian National Railways. The party numbered 350 with about thirty-seven families among the total.

Family groups, numbering from five to thirteen souls each, were a feature of today's arrivals. The largest was that of James Mackenzie of Campbelltown, Scotland, who brought over his wife and eleven children. This family will settle in Wembley, Alberta, close to the farm of Herman Trele, world's wheat and oats champion. Mr. Mackenzie, who has spent all his life farming in Scotland is sanguine as to his ability to learn Canadian methods quickly and he expects to be managing his own farm within a year.

Alexander Kerr, with his wife and ten children from Argyllshire, Scotland, was another interesting family group. He also is a skilled agriculturalist and will settle at Radway Centre, Alberta.

A group of thirty young men from Norfolk and Yorkshire County, England, who have been brought to Canada by the colonization department of the Canadian National Railways, were also among the arrivals.

Disturbing Elements Not Wanted in World Needing Peace Today

SIR AUSTEN CHAMBERLAIN OUTLINES ATTITUDE OF GOVERNMENT TOWARD SOVIET—CAN AFFORD TOLERATION

LONDON, April 8.—There is no present prospect of Great Britain breaking off diplomatic relations with Soviet Russia it was indicated by Sir Austen Chamberlain, foreign secretary, in a speech at Birmingham last night. He declared that, with the provocation Russia had given her, Great Britain would have a clear right before the world to sever diplomatic relations.

"Such a rupture would cost us nothing as a nation but we are reluctant to introduce any disturbing elements in a world needing peace," Sir Austen said. "This reluctance to sever relations is not a mark of weakness but of strength."

Our position is such that we can afford to tolerate and disregard outrages which no government has a right to inflict upon another government with which it wishes to remain in diplomatic relations.

MOTORSHIP HIT ROCKY ISLAND

ISKUM FEARED TO BE TOTAL LOSS NEAR DUTCH HARBOR—CREW RESCUED BY NATIVES

DUTCH HARBOR, April 8.—The motorship Iskum foundered on Unimak Island, west of here, on Wednesday when a heavy gale made her drag her anchors and she tossed upon the rocks of the island. It is feared that the vessel and her cargo will be a total loss.

Aided by natives on the island, the crew reached shore safely and were brought here by a passing gasboat.

VESSEL SINKS OREGON COAST

TEAMSCHOONER COMES TO GRIEF WHEN BROKEN RUDDER STOCK PERCEDED HULL

MARSHFIELD, Oregon, April 8.—The steam schooner Necanicum is filling rapidly as a result of a leak caused by a broken rudder stock and is reported to be sinking off Coos Bay in tow of the steamers Doylestown and Chehalis. The crew let go of the vessel's deckload of lumber when it was found pumps would not keep her afloat.

The Necanicum's rudder was broken when she struck on a bar while passing out of the bay on Thursday morning.

DR. K. C. MACDONALD IS LIBERAL CHOICE

ARMSTRONG, April 8.—Dr. Kenneth Cattaneach MacDonald, a Vernon dentist, will attempt at the forthcoming by-election in June to regain the legislative seat of North Okanagan which he lost to the late A. O. Cochran in the ministerial by-election shortly after the last general provincial election. Dr. MacDonald was the unanimous choice of the Liberal convention held here yesterday afternoon for the purpose of nominating a candidate.

SUCCESSFUL FARMING BY PRAIRIE NATIVES

Took One Million Bushels of Grain From 97,000 Acres

MONTREAL, April 8.—Successful farming operations by the Indians in the three prairie provinces, is indicated in a report stating that they produced one million bushels of grain last year, about half of which was wheat. The number of Indians in this area is estimated at 35,000, and the land preserved for their use is considered of the most fertile.

They have cultivated 97,000 acres of this land, and the crop was a profitable one in all respects. More development in farming by the Indians is being planned this year. They were particularly successful with live stock, and beside selling a large quantity, they took many prizes at Winnipeg and other places.

NO AGREEMENT ABOUT DATES REACHED WITH ANYOX FOR PLAY-OFF

A telegram has been received by the Prince Rupert Basketball Association from Anyox stating that April 19 and 20 are not satisfactory dates for the smelter town players to come here to play in the finals for the ladies' basketball championship of Northern British Columbia. They can only come, they state, on April 12 and 13. Since these dates are not suitable to Prince Rupert and arrangements cannot be made to hold the series at that time, it is probable that the series will be called to a close and the Milburn Cup awarded the Prince Rupert Maple Leafs who defeated Smithers recently.

DOG FISH REDUCTION

FLOATING CANNERY LAUREL WHALEN TO BE SO USED AT SKIDEGATE INLET

SKIDEGATE, April 8.—It is reported that the Millerd Cannery Co. is bringing the floating cannery Laurel Whalen here to engage in dog-fish reduction. Oil will be extracted from the livers and fish meal will be produced from the bodies.

It is hoped here that the fisheries department will give every encouragement to the concern and it is even said that the government should pay a bonus for every dog-fish caught for these pests have increased tremendously during the past ten years. They destroy countless thousands of young halibut, herring and salmon and also play havoc with halibut gear.

It was stated at Millerd headquarters here this morning that the project of dog fish reduction at Skidegate Inlet had been under contemplation but definite decision had not been reached although it was thought the plan might materialize.

"TEMPTRESS" IS THRILLING FILM

At an amateur circus given by the banker Fontenoy for the amusement of his guests, Elena, his beautiful mistress and the wife of the Marquis Torre De Bianca, meets Robledo, her husband's boyhood friend, who has just arrived in Paris from the Argentine. Robledo falls in love with her before he knows who she is. When he finds out he is furious thinking he has been played with. Fontenoy is insanely jealous of Robledo and upbraids Elena. She laughs at him and when he confesses financial ruin leaves him. In despair he kills himself.

TIMBER WOLVES IN PEACE RIVER COUNTRY

Eight of Pack of Nine Big Monsters are Captured by Trappers
PEACE RIVER, April 8.—The presence of a considerable number of timber wolves has been reported lately. Bill Gardner a local trapper, captured eight out of a pack of nine when visiting his trap lines recently, some 25 miles from here. A big black wolf escaped him but he intends to get it later. The wolves weighed from 125 to 150 pounds each, and as Gardner exhibited them around the town on his flat bottomed sleigh they were snaphotted many times by citizens anxious to get a close-up view of real timber wolves. In comparison with last year, fur is reported to be scarce in the north country.

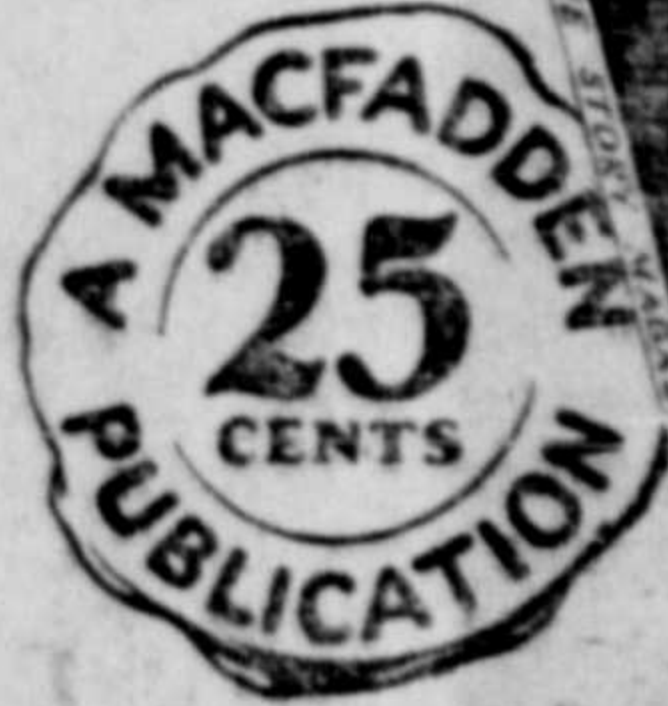

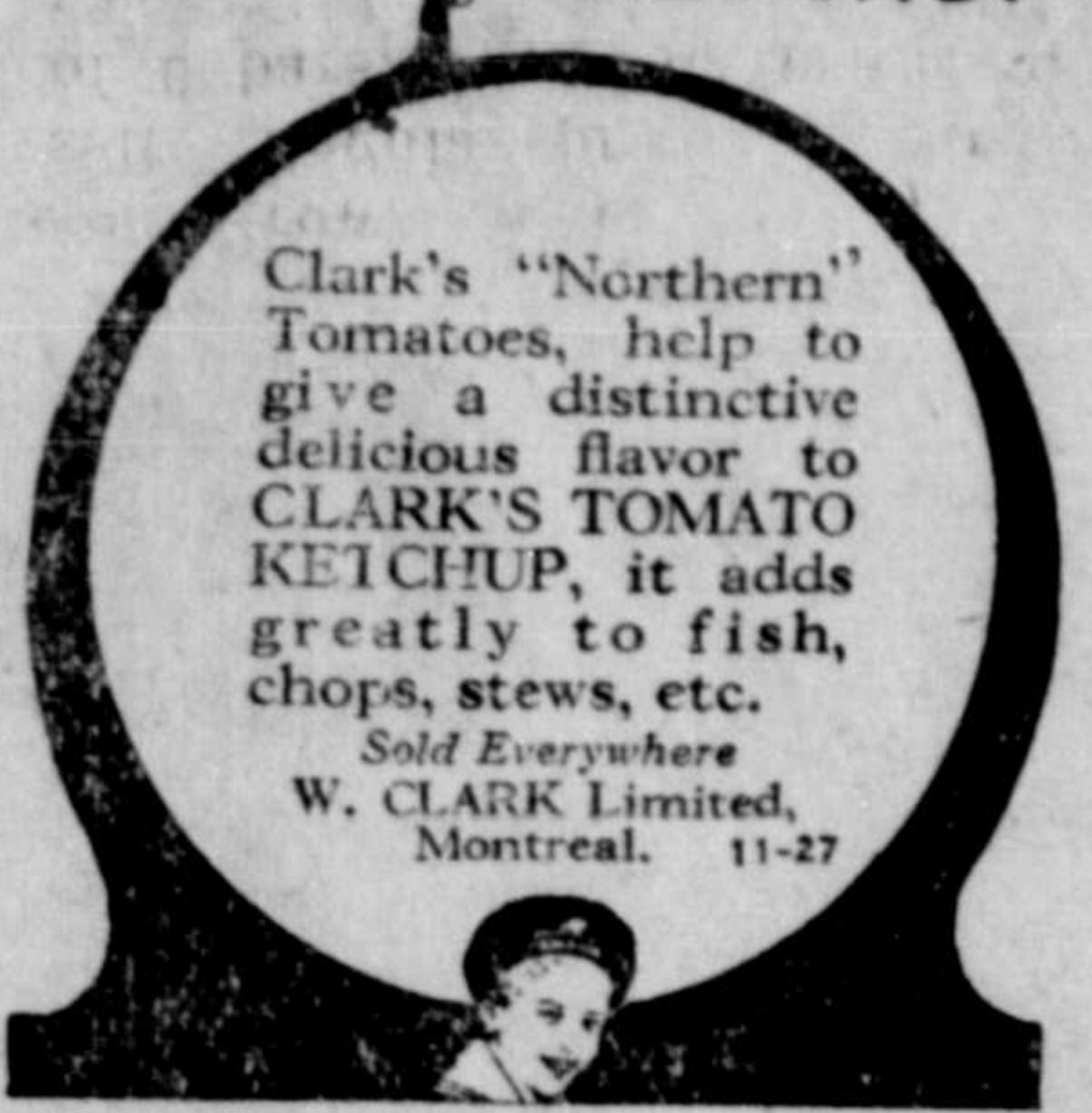
