NINETY THOUSAND RAILWAY EMPLOYEES ASK MORE PAY

Okanagan Man Slays Wife and Falls Victim to Policeman in Duel

Household quarrels end in tragedy—armed man resisted arrest and lost life in battle with game warden

PENTICTON, January 7.—Armed with two rifles, George Barden, a garage man, shot and killed his wife here yesterday and, after being pleaded with by William Steel, owner of the house where the tragedy occurred, and others, for more than two hours to surrender to the police, was fatally wounded in an exchange of shots with Game Warden Robertson.

Hearing a woman scream as he passed the Steel residence on his way to court shortly after ten o'clock, Magistrate T. A. Hope ran into the house where he found Barton beating and kicking his wife.

"Get right out of here or I'll plug you," shouted Barden as he saw Hope enter. As the magistrate left the house to call the authorities, the shot rang out.

When the police arrived on the scene a few minutes later, Barden called: "Come a step nearer and I'll shoot you. You will never take me. I have killed her and I know it's a hanging job. So keep away."

After nearly three hours of pleading, Barden was wounded when Robertson attempted to take him by force, and he died a short time after.

Steel, who left the home where he lived alone earlier in the day, could offer no suggestion as to why the couple, whose house was next door, were in his place. Barden arrived from Chelan last fall but his wife came only last month. They were known to have had many quarrels.

Trail of "98 days" He was born in Glenora county, Ontario, and went to Winnipeg in the early days, later coming to British Columbia.

WELL KNOWN NORTHERNER IS NO MORE

J. A. FRASER, FORMERLY GOLD COMMISSIONER AT ATLIN, DIES IN VANCOUVER AFTER BRIEF ILLNESS

VANCOUVER, Jan. 7.—J. A. Fraser, aged 75, gold commissioner at Atlin for twenty-two years, died at his residence here yesterday. The news of the death of Mr. Fraser, who had been ill for only a short time, will be received with sorrow by hundreds of friends of "Trail of '98 days".

AMERICANS TO LEAVE HANKOW

THEIR POSITION ALSO BELIEVED TO BE PERILOUS IN CHINESE CITY

HANKOW, Jan. 7.—Anxiety for the safety of Americans in Hankow arose last night when a British steamer was placed opposite the United States consulate. Frank Lockhart, the consul, has circularized the American colony, advising that women and children go aboard and take three days' provisions. Fifty women already are aboard and are prepared to sail for Shanghai.

Consul Lockhart's circular concluded: "Women and children unwilling to avail themselves of these facilities cannot expect to receive any guarantee of transportation at a later date."

Eu Gen Chen, the Cantonese foreign minister, declared his government had issued a proclamation stating that American women would be protected. A proclamation has also been issued blaming Great Britain for the incident on January 3 which, he said, resulted from "the wounding of a number of Chinese."

LONDON, Jan. 7.—The British consul at Hankow is still in the possession of the Chinese military. American women and children are today evacuating the city according to Reuters' Shanghai despatch.

CANADIAN GOLD IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—Gold bars valued at \$3,500,000 were received at the Bank of Montreal today from Canada. This foreign exchange transportation—as the Canadian dollar, being at a discount of five thirty seconds of one per cent—permits the shipment of gold at a profit.

SEINE BOAT BUT NOT MEN FOUND

FEARED THAT EIGHT PERSONS ON JESSIE ISLAND NO. 4 LOST THEIR LIVES

WHITES AND INDIANS

Masset Native was Among Those on Ill-fated Little Boat.

VICTORIA, Jan. 7.—The Vancouver seining boat Jessie Island No. 4, which left Chemainus two weeks ago for the West Coast was picked up this morning off Pachena Point, a total wreck, by the Canadian Government steamer Givenchy. There was no trace of eight persons who were on board. The boat left Chemainus with a cargo of herring nets for Barclay Sound on December 26.

The boat piled up on the rocks in Pachena Bay on the West Coast during the recent storms. The Bamfield life boat found the wrecked hull of the craft high and dry in Klootus Bay almost ripped to pieces but without sign or trace of the crew of three and five passengers.

The eight persons aboard the vessel when she cleared from Chemainus for Barclay Sound included two whites and six Indians.

THOSE ON BOARD

Those on board the ill-fated boat were Capt. George Brown of Clayoquot Sound, Engineer "Brownie" James of Hesquiat, Michael Ambrose of Ehatset; Joseph Harry of Nootka Sound; Henry James of Nanaimo; Leo Peter and wife of Clayoquot Sound, and an Indian named "Pat" believed to have been from Massett.

Fears for the safety of the craft were felt a few days ago when the vessel failed to reach her destination. Her sister ship, Jessie Island No. 2, left eighteen hours later and arrived at the usual time, reporting no sight of the Jessie Island No. 4.

Inquiry at the office of the Indian Agent here this morning failed to lend any light on the identity of the Indian nicknamed "Pat."

LOCAL GIRLS PASS EXAMS

MISSSES HUNTER, CASTELL AND PALMBOM SUCCESSFUL IN RECENT R.N. TESTS

VANCOUVER, Jan. 7.—Results of the Registered Nurses' examinations held at various training schools in the province during the month of November have been announced by Miss Helen Randall, R.N., registrar of the Graduate Nurses' Association of British Columbia.

The results show three successful candidates from Prince Rupert General Hospital—Miss Georgina Hunter, Miss Ann Castell and Miss Zada Palmboom.

The three young ladies mentioned above are now entitled to the privileges accorded to the use of the letters "R.N." after their names. All three are members of this spring's graduating class from the local hospital. Miss Hunter will have completed her training next Monday and Miss Castell and Miss Palmboom will be through soon thereafter.

WELSH CITY STARTS LOADING AND RYOKA WILL FOLLOW SOON

A quick job of lining having been done at the ocean dock by a dry dock crew, the Smith Line freighter, Welsh City, went on berth at the elevator yesterday afternoon to start loading grain for the United Kingdom or continent.

As soon as the Welsh City gets away, the Ocean Transport Co.'s freighter, Ryoka Maru, will move down from the dry dock to start loading for Shanghai. Lining of this vessel will be completed today.

Railway Minister Frankly Admits Responsibility for Cancelling Vancouver Hotel

OTTAWA, January 7.—Hon. Charles A. Dunning, minister of railways, states that he would welcome a parliamentary investigation into the reasons for cancelling the contract for the erection of a \$5,000,000 Canadian National hotel in Vancouver. The contract was authorized by the late government and was later cancelled by the present administration.

In making his statement regarding a parliamentary investigation, Mr. Dunning said he would be glad to take the responsibility as minister of railways for recommending the cancellation to the government.

"Regarding the future," the minister stated, "the president and board of directors of the railway company have not yet recommended provision for the construction of the hotel at Vancouver in 1927."

Enthusiastic Toronto Financier Predicts Several Stewart Mines to Rival Premier in Few Years

John P. Kendall, prominent young Toronto financial man, has visited and had practical experience with most of the great mining fields on the continent but the Portland Canal is the most wonderful he has yet seen. Such was the opinion which he enthusiastically expressed to a representative of the Daily News this morning on his arrival from Stewart where he has been for the past week inspecting interests he already holds and acquiring others. "From the standpoint of activity, mineralization and the spirit of its residents and investors I have never seen anything like it," asserted Mr. Kendall.

"And from what I have learned during my brief visit, I venture to say that, within five years' time, there will be four or five mines there as great as the Premier."

Mr. Kendall made a minute inspection of some of the properties immediately north of the Premier including the National Silver and the Premier Extension. In the Extenuate property, now operated by Grant Mahood, he saw what he described as wonderful mineralization. The B.C. Silver and Big Missouri, he said, are already established and proven mines that will some day outrival the Premier. In the Bear and Marmot River valleys were also mines which he considered had marvellous prospects.

Mr. Kendall also conversed with many of the residents of Stewart and Hyder. Their spirit of optimism he said was surprising for the people on the ground are often the most skeptical.

"I came West with great expectations, but those expectations were even surpassed with what I saw," declared Mr. Kendall.

Financial people of the East are realizing the wealth and possibilities of the Portland Canal region and money for development there is becoming increasingly available, he said.

"British Columbia," Mr. Kendall said, "will be the scene of the next great mining boom and the Portland Canal will take a large share of attention and investment. There have been a few regrettable stock promotions on certain mines but that will no longer have a serious effect for the public is becoming educated and confidence has been restored."

Mr. Kendall, who is a guest at the Hotel Prince Rupert, will leave for Toronto tomorrow morning.

INCENDIARY AND THIEF

PERCY KENWARD OF DETROIT COMMITTED FOR TRIAL AT REVELSTOKE

REVELSTOKE, Jan. 7.—Percy Kenward of Detroit was yesterday committed for trial on a charge of stealing an overcoat and several small sums of money during a hotel fire here on December 22. He confessed, according to the police, that he himself kindled the fire as well as that which destroyed the Hotel North Bend on December 4. Kenward says, in each case, the motive for playing fire bug was to secure money. His method was to mingle with the fleeing residents from the burning residences under the pretence of helping them.

THIS YEAR HAS FIVE ECLIPSES

THIS COUNTRY WILL ONLY SEE MOON SHADOW ON JUNE 15 — SOME OTHER PHENOMENA BOOKED

MONTREAL, Jan. 7.—Three eclipses of the sun, two eclipses of the moon and the transit of the planet Mercury over the sun's disc are all included in the program for the year 1927, it is stated by Prof. A. J. Kelly, of McGill observatory. Virtually at the beginning of the new year the first eclipse of the sun was observed on Monday in the Southern Pacific Ocean.

On June 29 there will be a total sun eclipse, visible in Great Britain and Norway, while on December 24 a partial eclipse of the sun will be visible in the southern seas.

Montreal Faces Sequel to Increases Recently Given Others of Staff

MONTREAL, January 7.—More than ninety thousand railway employees are involved in negotiations on wage increase demands ranging from ten to twelve cents per hour. Thirty-five thousand maintenance men on all lines and a similar number of railway shopmen demand a ten cent increase; eighteen thousand Canadian National office staff and freight shed employees are seeking a ten per cent hourly rating increase and twenty dollars a month for rated men; six thousand Canadian Pacific clerks demand wage increases and improved working conditions, and eight hundred Canadian National sleeping, dining and parlor-car employees request a twelve per cent increase. These demands result from increases recently granted conductors and carmen.

PRINCE COMING IS ANNOUNCED

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS WILL ATTEND JUBILEE OF CONFEDERATION AT OTTAWA AND VISIT HIS CANADIAN RANCH

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—The first news despatch received from London over the newly inaugurated radiophone transatlantic commercial service, opened to the public this morning, was an official announcement that the Prince of Wales would visit Canada next summer.

Only urgent demands for his presence in England on official business will prevent the Prince making an official American visit next year. After attending the Jubilee of Confederation in Ottawa in July, His Royal Highness plans to spend a vacation at his ranch in Alberta. He will then visit middle western United States later going to New York for the Anglo-American polo matches before returning home.

PUBLIC WAITING FOR NEWS SANKEY APPEAL

Rumor That Application For New Trial Will Not be Heard Until March Discredited by Local Officials

The local public is awaiting with keen interest news of what may transpire in connection with the application for a new trial before the Court of Appeal in Victoria of Joseph Sankey who is sentenced to hang for the murder of Miss Loretta Chisholm. There was a rumor that the carrying out of the sentence might be deferred and the application heard in March but the police and local crown officers are disposed to the belief that the application will be taken at once.

STOLE FOOD TO TIDE HIM OVER

Leo Rolf Gets Seven Days in Jail and Fine of \$25

Leo Rolf, charged with stealing goods from the C.N.R., was found guilty in the city police court this morning and was sentenced to seven days in jail with a fine of \$25, and costs, in lieu of non-payment of fine, a further 14 days in jail. The accused admitted the charge, but pleaded that he simply took sufficient food to last until his cheque from the C.N.R. would arrive in six days' time.

LOSES LIFE WHEN BURIED WITH CLAY

Vancouver City Workman Met Appalling Death Yesterday Afternoon by Suffocation

VANCOUVER, Jan. 7.—Suffocated when he was buried beneath four feet of clay, George Gibson, a city laborer, died before fellow workmen could remove the debris from a cave-in which occurred yesterday in a sewer under construction here.

BOXES MADE TO CONTAIN DOPE

EXTENT OF DRUG TRAFFIC SHOWN BY OFFICER IN CONNECTION WITH TRIAL IN MONTREAL

MONTREAL, Jan. 7.—Judge Monet in police court here set bail at \$10,000 for every one of the five men who were arrested here last week in connection with what the police claim is the biggest drug trafficking ring on the North American continent. The men will appear this week end.

Francis W. Cowan, chief of the narcotic division of the federal department of health, today told newspapermen he had learned that in the last three years orders had been given to and executed by a single concern for the manufacture of 31,500 boxes to contain 50,000 ounces of illicit drugs valued at \$1,000,000 wholesale. This was not taking into account orders given for boxes destined to contain raw opium and so forth.

INTEREST WAKING IN MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS.

Some interest is commencing to be taken in the matter of the municipal election which is now but six days' distant. It is pretty certain that Mayor Newton will be opposed, even though to beat him would appear to be a job that would take more than six days' or less campaigning. If there are any candidates who would essay to oppose him, they would have done well to make an earlier start. Undoubtedly many people who would like to end His Worship's "mortgage" on the mayoral chair but they have been frightened that they would be turned down. It has been a case of "the spirit is willing but the flesh is weak" which is not a very desirable state of affairs.

With five in the field, there is already enough material in the field to contest the four seats on the aldermanic board. More candidates will likely offer themselves for the voters to choose from as far as the seats below the mayor's are concerned.

Nothing is yet heard about the school board contest but the three retiring members of the Board will probably submit their papers again on Monday. There may even be a contest for the three seats on the board.

Certain campaigners in connection with the police plebiscite have been active recently and their voice will likely be more distinctly heard within a day or so. In this connection, it looks as though the champions of the city police system are waiting for the other side to say something.

Judging from the opinions that are expressed around town, the chances do not look very good for the passing of the \$35,000 sewer bylaw. This would provide at least for the starting of a much needed improvement but there is a rather strong view that the \$35,000 for the work would by no means see the job completed.

BRITISH AND AMERICAN NEWS SERVICE.

Sometimes Canadian papers are criticized for featuring American news and views more than they do the affairs of the Mother Country and the Empire. The criticism to a large extent may be justified but to rectify it is a task that is, so far, removed from the hands of the publishers of Canadian newspapers. In most papers—the big as well as the small—there is a good deal of space to be filled by correspondence material that is usually furnished by news bureau services. Often press agent material, if it does not conflict with advertising, proves acceptable. The Daily News as well as all other Canadian papers uses such services and it is generally difficult to select British material of such a nature which would appeal to the reading public. United States has developed highly efficient news organizations such as the Associated Press, United Press and International News Service. Until Great Britain develops similar organizations that will produce Old Country and Empire News suitable for Canadian consumption there will continue to be the American tinge to Canadian newspapers.

BRIGHT PROSPECTS FOR BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Twenty years ago British Columbia was one of the least important of all the provinces of Canada, considered from the point of view of the producer or the manufacturer. Today British Columbia is the third of the manufacturing provinces of the Dominion and its products are more various than the products of any of the provinces of the Dominion. In the course of another twenty years, if the manifold products of British Columbia are projected and applied to the best possible advantage, there are abundant reasons for believing that British Columbia will lead all the provinces of Canada in the volume and value of its products. We have a superabundance of raw material, and the conditions for manufacturing and export are more favorable than the conditions in any of the other provinces of Canada. Our harbors and waterways are open all the year round, and we have direct and cheap access to all the markets of the world. Our shipping business has grown tremendously within the last three or four years. The harbors of our principal ports are now crowded with ships and our yards for the construction and repairing of ships are doing a flourishing business. The prospects of British Columbia from a business point of view are therefore brighter than they ever were at any period in our history.

ALDERMAN JOS. GREER SPEAKER

DEALT WITH SEVERAL ASPECTS OF CIVIC FINANCES IN ADDRESS BEFORE ROTARY CLUB

Alderman Jos. Greer addressed the Rotary Club at its luncheon yesterday and dealt with the financial position of the city as well as some of the problems which would face the new council in 1927. Starting with the incorporation of the city in 1910 when it was necessary to make borrowings for street work and other city needs, he described the manner of financing by selling bonds and then creating a sinking fund to meet these bonds when due. In 1916 the city adopted the serial bond system by which a certain amount of the principal and the interest was retired each year. This system which was still in effect would result in the retirement of the major portion of the city's indebtedness created at that time by 1946. From now until 1946 however, it would be necessary to provide \$196,000 each year to take care of debts already contracted. The present bonded indebtedness of the city amounted to \$2,200,000, which was \$300 for each man, woman and child in the city.

The bonded indebtedness was divided up as follows: Local Improvements, \$900,000; General Account \$311,000; Water department \$436,000; Light Department \$234,000; Telephone Department \$51,000; Schools \$223,000. Although the total assessment for the past year amounted to \$15,668,000, improvements, government property, hospitals, churches and other exemptions left the taxable property at \$6,481,929. This included the railway property assessed at \$2,500,000 on which the company paid \$45,500 per year as per agreement with the city. There was left a net taxable property valued at \$4,250,000.

Alderman Greer then took the past year as an example of how the revenue was raised to meet this requirement as well as provide for the carrying on of the various services of the city. In the millage rate which was arrived at last year 21 mills were required to pay off interest and a portion of the principal, 12 mills were necessary for school purposes and 11 mills were necessary for general administration.

Speaking of the borrowing power of the city, Alderman Greer said that it was impossible to borrow more than 20 per cent of the assessed valuation. The speaker said that the consensus of opinion was that the debt of the city was high and when the city debt got over the two million mark it was getting near the danger point. However the city's finances were in good shape. "I do not believe it advisable to say that the city is hard up and cannot pay," remarked the Alderman. "It is only necessary for any one whom the city owes to present his account and receive payment," said the speaker.

POWER PROBLEM
Turning to some of the problems which faced the city in the coming year the speaker referred to the city's hydro-electric plant which was not able to supply all the power for which the city had contracted. It had been found necessary to make an agreement with the dry dock, which plant the city was now operating to take care of the peak load. This year's council would have to decide whether they thought it advisable to spend a quarter of a million dollars at the Shawville plant to increase the amount of power available from that area. Sooner or later however the city would have to consider other power sources if it continued to own its own plant or would have to consider making arrangements with a company which would meet the city's requirements.

Another problem which would face the city council in 1927, Ald. Greer said, would be a new agreement with the C.N.R. as to assessment and taxation. The agreement entered into in 1922 would expire next month. Also there was the matter of sewerage for the city. Taking all these matters into consideration it certainly showed that there would be plenty of work for the council this year.

Alderman Greer's address was listened to with much interest by the club and, at the conclusion, President Orne thanked the speaker for the very concise way in which he had brought matters of interest to their attention.

COTTON FIRM MAKES ELEVEN MILLIONAIRES

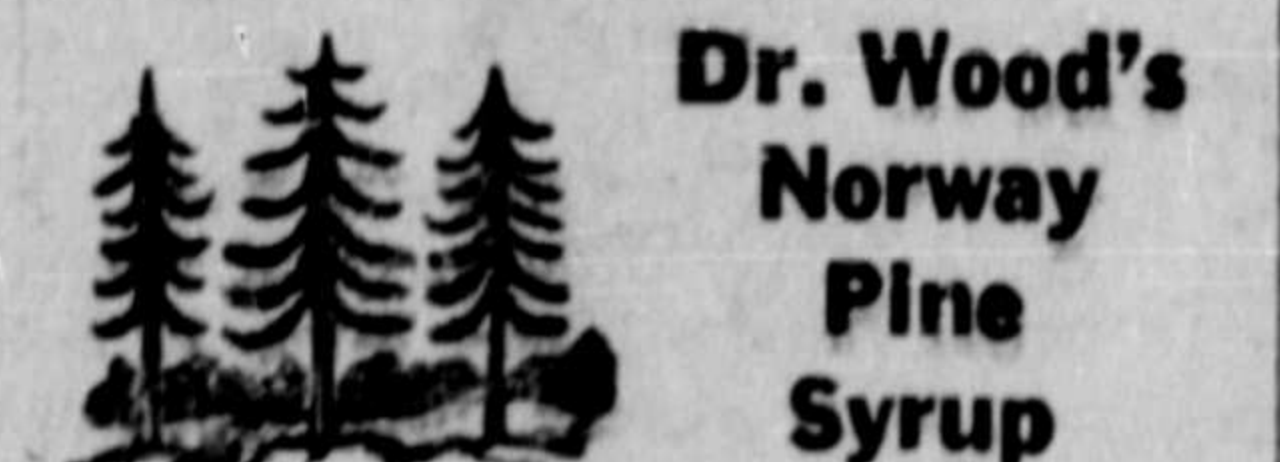
Coats' Family in Scotland has Acquired Much Wealth from Manufacture of Thread, etc.



TRACK EVENTS NEXT IN SPORT

FOOTBALL ON SHELF AND BASKETBALL IN LIMELIGHT NOW

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—With football on the shelf, and basketball in the centre of the college athletics limelight, the track stars are making ready to take an increasingly large part in the sports world, both in numbers of contestants and spectators.

Besides the dual meets and conference championships in the "Big Ten" and Missouri Valley, the college stars have a chance to test their speed and strength in half a dozen different relay games in the middle and west.

The two conference meets are closed to outside entries, but in the Drake relays at Des Moines, the premier track and field meet of the West, more than 2,500 participants are expected to compete representing nearly one hundred universities and colleges and more than a hundred prep and high schools.

The future Olympic stars open their season indoors at the Illinois relays at Urbana, February 26. A month later they have their first outdoor opportunity at the Texas relays at Austin, April 2.

Ohio State University and University of Kansas hold their relay games on the same dates, April 22-23. In the four years the Kansas meets have been held, they have never had bad weather, and last year they had more than 400 entries from forty colleges and universities, besides the interscholastic events.

MANY STATES AT DRAKE

Next on the spring program comes the Drake relays. The meet this year is set for April 23-30 and nearly every state in the west will be represented.

The National Collegiate meet at Chicago, June 11, for event winners only, crowns the track season. With the backing of most of the leading schools in the country, the N.C.A.A. winners may lay claim to being American champions.

At the meeting of Missouri Valley coaches at Des Moines, the track squad mentors said they saw no foreign star in sight who might enter their spring programs.

J. HAMILTON WINS FINAL

CAPTURES GOLD MEDAL PUT UP BY BEN SELF FOR CITY BILLIARD HANDICAP TOURNAMENT

Jimmie Hamilton defeated J. Corbett by a score of 300 to 261 last night in the final of the city billiard handicap tournament which has been in progress for some time, thus winning the gold medal that was put up by Ben Self for the competition. There were thirty-four entrants in the series which has been in progress for the couple of weeks or longer.

Leo Goddard, Emile St. Goddard, Earl Bridges, Donat Beland, Red Welsh, Ross Moxley and others have expressed their intention of taking part.

Jack Delaney, taking a leaf out of Bob Fitzsimmons' book, is going after the "heavies" and it looks as if he would not be obliged to worry very much over being able to give and take in their class, and prove himself fit to take a chance at the heavyweight crown within a few months. 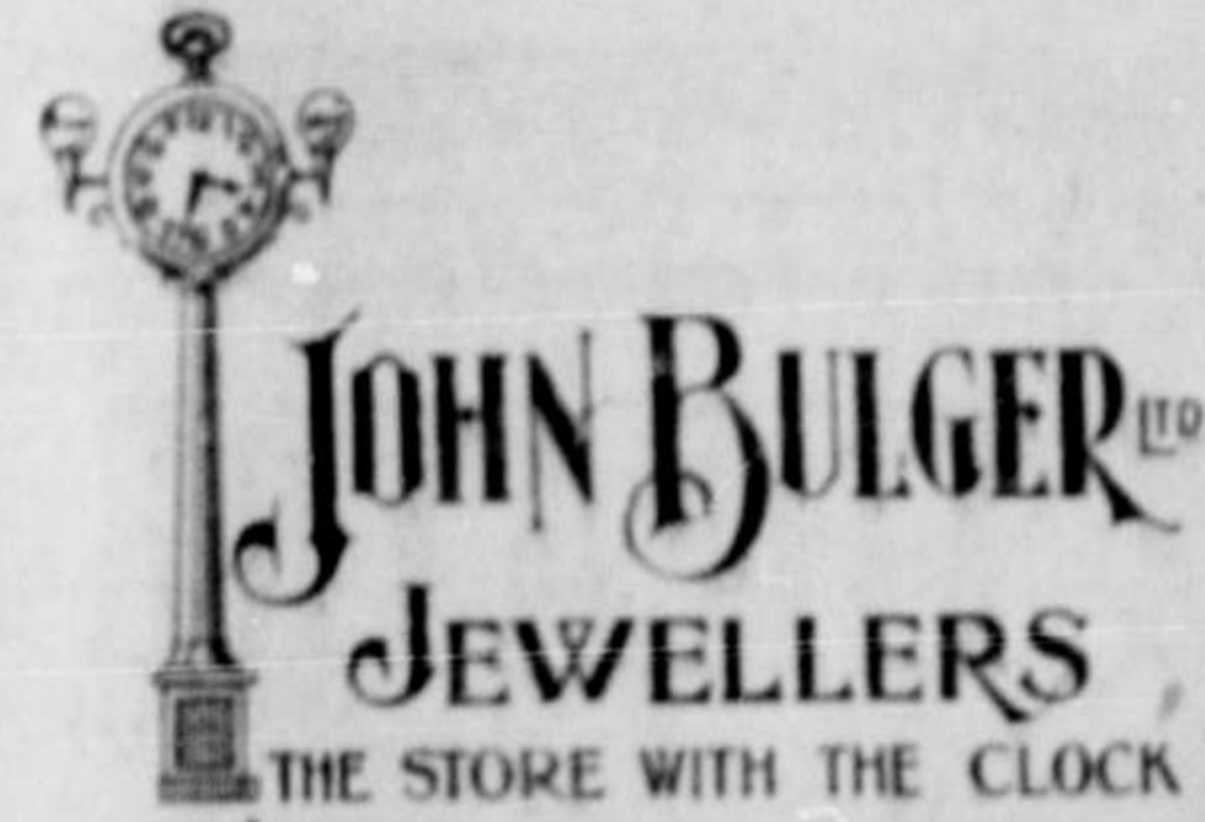

LIQUOR WAR IN SCOTLAND

SAVAGE FIGHT IS BEING WAGED BETWEEN DISTILLING INTERESTS AND PROTESTANT EVANGELICAL CHURCHES

GLASGOW, Jan. 7.—Scotland is in the throes of a big "wet and dry" campaign. The Scotch liquor interests are fighting a savage fight, answering meeting with meeting, speaker with speaker, literature with literature, cartoon with cartoon.

In Scotland, the main proponents of temperance and prohibition are the Protestant evangelical churches.

The job of the dries in Scotland is hard. In the first place, Scotland has big cities, and cities always are strongholds of the wets. Scotland numbers 1,882,286 people.

Furthermore, the job of the dries in Scotland is made difficult by the attitude of the newspapers. The Scotch press is almost overwhelmingly wet. There does not seem to be in Scotland a small-town press which is dry and which has a great influence in the rural districts.

But the greatest handicap the dries have is in the law itself, the Scotch Temperance Act of 1913. According to this Scotch statute: Whenever ten per cent of the registered voters in the voting area sign a petition asking for a temperance vote, an election is held. Three questions must be submitted:

1. No-licence. If this is carried, it means that no public houses can secure licences, but hotels or inns can serve drinks to their guests, and restaurants may serve drinks with genuine meals.
2. Limitation of licences. If this is carried, the number of public houses in the district has to be cut down by one-fourth. If such a measure is re-

It will be seen that giving the voters three options already weighs the election in favor of the wets. But there is more. To carry a no-licence resolution, the dries have to get fifty-five per cent of all the votes cast in the election. Furthermore, the votes they get must constitute at least thirty-five per cent of all electors.

Once an election is held, no other can be had in the same district until three years have elapsed.

ONCE DRY, NOT ALWAYS

In Scotland, the law is such and the sentiment of the people is so shifting, that some of the districts which went dry, later have repealed their own decision.

There are similar strange results as regards the big cities. Glasgow and Edinburgh look upon each other as rivals. Glasgow is pre-eminently the city of big business, of commerce, of money. Edinburgh is the aristocratic town, the town of culture and refinement.

And Glasgow has a bad name for slums and terrible scenes of drunkenness.

EDINBURGH WET

But Edinburgh voted solidly wet in all its wards in every election so far held. And Glasgow, in 1920, out of its thirty-seven wards voted for no saloons in four wards and for limitation of saloons in nine other wards. In 1923, Edinburgh stuck to its wetness by increased majorities. Glasgow stuck to its dryness.

The heart and centre of the dry campaign in Scotland is in a grave three-storey residence building in West George Street—the general headquarters of the Scottish Temperance Alliance. Here James Gillies, one of the Alliance secretaries, is in active charge of the dry campaign.

"We have an up-hill fight in Scotland," said he. "But we are not discouraged. An educational campaign in a country that has for ages been wet necessarily takes time. Besides, the wets can and do spend pounds where we spend pennies. We not only have the out-and-out opposition of the heavily entrenched liquor interests, but we also consider as our opponents the Scottish Public-House Reform League.

"NICE CLUBBY PUBS"

"This organization pretends that what Scotland needs is not prohibition, but nice clubby pubs where a man may take the female members of his family. By drawing this red herring across the path, they help the liquor trade.

"One of the brewery organs gave away the whole show by announcing that their program was not to induce individuals to drink more beer, but to influence more individuals to drink beer. And the so-called reformed pub would do the same thing.

It's a humiliation to Scotland that one-half the imprisonments in one year have been due to drunkenness and drink-associated crimes.

"We are making our most persistent appeal to the mothers. We put out tables showing how the annual expenditure on booze would go a long way towards clothing a wife, a daughter, a son or a small child.

"It makes the women think. We want them to think. We want serious action, not hysteria. In every place in Scotland where the saloons have been wiped out, crime has come down and savings have gone up. It's the American experience all over again.

"We hold there is no true reform, except to wipe out the pub. And that is the line along which we are fighting. It took a long time in America. Nobody thought it would ever be done. People say we never will do it. But we shall!"

So much for the dry cause. The wets have no less to say.
"We are not going to let Scotsmen have anything of the sort put over on them. That is the whole part of our campaign."

So explained Harry Earnshaw, secretary of the Anti-Prohibition Campaign Council at the general headquarters of the Scotch wets.

"We don't camouflage the fact that when we need money we go right to the brewers, distillers, wholesalers and retailers. Why shouldn't they put up money to defend their business?"

"We think prohibition is an infringement of the liberties of the people—an attempt to impose on the majority the will of a minority of cranks.

"We used to be told a lot about how America had become a Utopia since prohibition's advent. So a couple of years ago I made to trip to America. I went to most of the big towns.

"I didn't find the jails empty. The hospitals were not working half-time. None of the police were asleep on their beats. And the courts weren't on vacation. In many places, conditions were worse. In place of a legitimate trade in strong drink, I found illicit trade in

ALBERTA NOT SELLING ITS TELEPHONES

OFFER FOR SYSTEM IN NEIGHBORING PROVINCE CAME ON HEELS OF B.C. TELEPHONE SALE

EDMONTON, Jan. 7.—The Provincial Government has definitely turned down an offer from large financial interests of the East to consider the sale of the Alberta telephone system. It was disclosed in a statement from Hon. V. W. Smith, minister of railways and telephones.

Government officials declined to indicate from what source the proposals came, but it is thought in local political circles that the Bell Telephone Company was behind the offer recently made by one of the most prominent financial men in Canada.

The offer came close on the heels of an announcement from British Columbia that the B.C. Telephone Company had sold out to a big Eastern telephone organization, and it is stated that American capital is behind a gigantic scheme to secure control of a chain of telephone systems across Canada with the object of linking them up with their systems in the United States.

INTERNAL TRADE BOARD WANTED

MERCHANTS OF EVERY PROVINCE TO PETITION DOMINION GOVERNMENT WITH THIS END IN VIEW

OTTAWA, January 7.—The Dominion Government is to be petitioned without delay, by a delegation representing the merchants of every province, to establish a board, or a committee, or a similar administrative body, to look after the internal business of Canada.

This action is the result of months of work on the part of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada, and Moyses Lapointe, secretary of the Montreal branch of that body, stated recently that the head office at Ottawa was co-operating with the provincial boards to bring this matter to a head, and also to prepare a brief to be presented to Government, outlining various demands which retail merchants throughout the Dominion wish presented to the Federal Legislative body.

With regard to the internal business Mr. Lapointe explained that there was little idea, even among business men, and less among legislators, of the tremendous volume of the internal commerce of the Dominion.

amount to about two billion dollars; whilst internal business reaches the immense sum of four billions. Both export and import trade are carefully organized and are managed by large staffs at Ottawa; but there is no attempt whatever to organize the internal commerce, and retail merchants know that lack of this organization causes a very large loss to the Dominion each year."

Mr. Lapointe stated that the association had had a very busy year, and that, in extending greetings and good wishes for the future to retail merchants throughout Canada, the Quebec Provincial Board and its officers felt that they could rightly claim a successful year. The rebate to automobile dealers of the luxury tax previously paid on cars in stock at the time of its repeal, the abolition of stamps on receipts; the

lessening of the stamps required on cheques; and favorable changes adapted by the Post Office in its regulations were among the achievements of the year cited by Mr. Lapointe, as those towards which the Retail Merchants' Association had played a considerable part.
