SEIZED OPIUM LARGE VALUE

SEATTLE, Dec. 5.—Customs inspectors on Saturday seized opium valued at more than \$81,000 when the big Blue Funnel liner Proteus arrived from the Orient.

BEARS ARE BOLD BAD BRUTES ON THE QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS

SKIDEGATE, Dec. 3.—Bears are still out and are getting very bold. One chased R. Wilkie of Lawn Hill out into the salt chuk. Another took up his stand in the middle of the island highway and defied Mr. Chutney who operates the government car here, to ram him with the car. CRUDE OIL SKIDEGATE

STEAMER FINED VERY BIG SUM

SEATTLE, Dec. 5.—A fine of \$122,850 is to be levied by the United States against the British steamer Proteus, liner of the Blue Funnel line on which \$65,000 worth of narcotics was seized Saturday on the arrival of the vessel from the Orient. BOARD OF TRADE

Complaints are often made about the board of trade. Just now the chief complaint is that it is not any too active. When it is active the complaint is made that some clique is running it or that it is a political organization. Plenty of other kicks are registered against it. In fact it is very much like other organizations of its kind in other places where similar complaints are made from time to time.

Some years ago the Victoria Board of Trade was eating itself away with dry rot and the people of the city were taking little interest in it. Then the younger men of the Rotary Club and Kiwanians undertook to put some life into it. They abolished the old organization altogether and started the Chamber of Commerce with new officers and since that it has been functioning with vigor and has been one of the factors that has made for the recent improvement in Victoria conditions.

It has been suggested that the board of trade here is not sufficiently representative of the business interests of the city. It has done good work but might do much better if everyone took interest in it.

STEWART RAILWAY SALE

Nobody seems to know exactly what the sale of the Stewart railway means. It may have purely a local application or it may be the precursor of a move to build through from Stewart to the Peace River country. At any rate the operation of the railway will benefit the mining town and will be a decided advantage to the owners of mines along its route.

UNIVERSITY EXTENSION LECTURES

Terrace is anxious to have university extension lectures but cannot get them unless Prince Rupert is willing to take them. The lectures must be free to the public. Any local organization putting them on must provide a hall and pay the cost of advertising and any other incidental expenses in connection with the series.

It is a matter for some organization interested in education to undertake. The board of trade has passed it over to the Parent-Teacher's as being without the scope of activity of a trade organization.

It would seem rather a pity if the lectures cannot be heard here. As they are purely educational in character, possibly the school board might co-operate in helping to carry the cost. At any rate it seems odd if Terrace is anxious to have them and Prince Rupert turns them down.

BASKETBALL GAMES

Reports indicate that some wonderfully good basketball games are being played in the city this season. The exhibition hall is being used for the purpose and usually there are three games each basketball evening. A good many attend these games and it is remarked that those who do not are the losers thereby, if they enjoy good sport.

GOOD WORK OF BIOLOGISTS

The fisheries experimental station under the Biological Board, which is just getting down to work, has already made itself quite useful and further developments may be expected in connection with it. The work goes on quietly and without ostentation and bids fair to become very important, especially in a place like this where the development of the fisheries along modern lines is the hope of the port. The fact mentioned in the waterfront news Saturday that the experiments with dog fish liver oil for vitamins had been fully confirmed at the University of B.C. shows that the work done here is supported elsewhere.

Local Production Bids Fair to Enhance Reputation of Players' Club and Please Audience

The Prince Rupert Players' Club staged a full dress rehearsal at the Westholme Theatre yesterday of "Adam and Eva" and it is no exaggeration to say that the reputation gained by this club in its previous productions will be greatly enhanced after Tuesday and Wednesday of this week.

The story of the play itself is about a rich American businessman who has a genius for managing his family. The young business manager, however, takes charge of the home for a while, the family having got father to take a long trip.

The young man finds himself confronted with a hurricane of flippancy and lingerie bills. How he extricates himself from trouble and does good for the family and himself must be seen to be appreciated.

As "Adam" Louis Smith displays some of the finest acting seen on the local stage and is splendidly supported by Jimmie Farquhar as "James King" the father. Much humor is afforded by "Uncle Horace" and "Lord Andrew Gordon," played, respectively, by Jack Doherty and D'Arcy Marsh. Smaller parts are ably portrayed by George Waddell and Dave Balfour.

Of the four ladies' parts, by far the biggest is that of "Eva" which is played by Miss Irene Morrison whose setting of the part is a pleasure and delight and a splendid performance for a newcomer to the stage. The appeal of Ben Self against a conviction and fine by Stipendiary H. F. McLeod for unlawfully fishing with a salmon net was also adjourned to date to be fixed. Milton Gonzales, appearing for the appellant, stated that he was ready to proceed and asked that a date be fixed so the case should be disposed of while his witnesses were still in the city. L. W. Patmore, for the government, asked for an adjournment, some of his witnesses not being immediately available. The case was stood over until Wednesday at 2:30 p.m.

The third appeal was that of Theda Gale against a conviction and fine by Magistrate McLymont for selling liquor as a result of the activities of Liquor Board operatives. Mr. Patmore, for the appellant, stated that he was ready and desirous of proceeding. E. F. Jones, for the crown, stated that some of the witnesses were in Vancouver. The case was adjourned to date to be fixed.

In one of the civil cases J. W. Collier is suing the corporation of the city of Prince Rupert for \$228.88 damages as a result of injuries sustained when he was struck on the street by a city truck. Mr. Patmore, for the plaintiff, stated he was ready to proceed but Mr. Jones announced that he was awaiting instruction from the insurance company. The case was adjourned, date to be fixed.

The Stewart case of W. J. Crawford vs. Northland Mining Co., in which plaintiff is suing defendant for \$357, was set over to the January court. Some of the defence witnesses had not been served. It was stated, R. W. Kennedy has the case for the plaintiff while defendant is appearing in person.
