Valuable Watersheds Being Destroyed and Property Damaged by Blaze

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 5 .- Fires in four major sections of Southern California have fed on thousands of acres of brush and timber and consumed 150 homes and cabins and is now reaching out to seize valuable watersheds. Driving winds are mocking the efforts of more than three thousand workers.

Property damage is estimated in excess of half a million while forest officials refused to estimate the damage to the watersheds. Unotticial estimates place the total loss in the Verdugo Hills alone at more than a million dollars.

Steamer Catala Off Reef Is Now in Pearl Harbor for Temporary Repairs

That the Union steamer Catala, stranded since October 8 on Mist Island, three miles from Port Simpson, had been successfully floated at 10 o'clock this morning was the announcement made in a message received today by the local offices of the B.C. Towage & Lighterage Co. from the salvage vessel Salvage King which, with the assistance of the Salvage Princess, pulled the vessel off. The next eration, following the floating of the ship, was to beach her in Pearl Harbor, close by, where the plan is to put temporary patches on preparatory to delivering the vessel to the local dry dock where

he necessary inspections will be made +---with a view to having bids made for the permanent repair of the vessel. To that end, work will now be driven and It is hoped that the Catala may arrive here within the course of the next few

The floating of the Catala marks the successful completion of an important step in one of the biggest and most Builder of Vessel and Shipyard difficult salvage operations on the Pacific Coast in several years. Efforts to pull the vessel off a few days after the stranding having failed, the only other means was then to blast away the rock pinnacle which held her so as to relieve the hold and place her on an even keel. All this has now been done and a successful salvage is assured. High tides during the next week will give plenty of time for the work of making the temporary patches on the beach. To make another inspection on behalf of the Union Steamship Co. of the wrecked steamer Catala which is expected to arrive within a day or so from Mist Island near Port Simpson. where she has been stranded since November 8, W. D. McLaren, who had charge of the building of the vessel two years ago at Montrose, Scotland. arrived from Vancouver on the Camosun last night, accompanied by his secretary, A. W. Morris. Mr. McLaren disembarked here from the Camosun and went out this morning to the wreck on the Salvage Princess.

To make an inspection of the vessel with a view to submitting a tender for her repair. Hubert A. Wallace of the Burrard Dry Dock Co., North Vancouver, also arrived on the Camosun. Mr. Wallace, it will be remembered, was stationed at Prince Rupert a few years ago when the Wallace interests were building ships at the local dry dock.
