

Dramatic Incident as Souders Wins Big Race

ONE OF DRIVERS KEPT GOING WHILE ENVELOPED IN FLAMES AND HANDS TOO BLISTERED TO STEER

INDIANAPOLIS, May 31.- A record breaking crowd of 145,000 spectators yesterday watched George Souders win the 500 mile automobile race, thus annexing the prize of \$25,000 which had been offered for the big race.

When Souders, who is a young man 24 years of age, came in, his nearest competitor was seven and a half miles behind. He made the two hundred trips around the bumpy two and a half miles of track in five hours, 7 minutes and 33 seconds, making an average peed for the whole time of 97.54 miles an hour.

REQUEST MADE FOR TIME TO LIQUI-DATE AFFAIRS IN ENGLAND BY RUSSIA

LONDON, May 31. - Russian Charge d'affaires Cosengolz has sent an official letter to Foreign Minister Sir Austen Chamberlain, requesting permission for certain Soviet citizens to remain in England in order to liquidate property business for Soviet trading organiza-

The letter said that in the event of refusal, permission orders would be given for the immediate liquidation of all Russian trading institutions and British companies in which the money of Soviet citizens organizations is invested. In such an event, the letter said, the responsibility for all damages which may arise for Soviet institutions as well as British citizens from such speedy liquidation would rest with the British government.

If the request is granted the citizens remaining would include the directors of Arcos and other British companies conducting Anglo-Soviet trade with Great Britain and Soviet trade organizations as well as departmental managers and their necessary staffs.

SOVIET ACTIVITIES **MONTREAL WERE NOT** DISCOVERED IS SAID

(Edmonton Bulletin) Premier King says there is no evidence in the hands of the Dominion Government which shows that the Montreal office of the Soviet trade commissioner has been used as a distributing centre for subversive propaganda or as the headquarters of a spy system. From which it is to be concluded that the Dominion Government has not been collecting evidence, or that the plans for using the Canadian office as a sub-centre for the dessimination of revolutionary propaganda had not been completed when the London raid took place. There is no reason to suppose that the Soviet office at Montreal was not intended to serve the same purposes as the one in London, if the organization of the underground busines had had time to develop.
