SAFETY PRINCIPLES

In the same article the writer says: In the application of the instalment plan, certain safety principles should be observed—in the interests of both buyer and seller. The merchant should assure himself that the customer can and will pay in full. He should exact a sufficient cash payment so that the buyer will feel that he owns a considerable share in the purchase and is not merely a renter. He should so adjust the payments with reference to the depreciation of the article that the purchaser will have no cause to feel that the remaining payments are greater than the value of the property. It is safe to say that in general these principles are being fairly well observed. The seller should also tell his customer the cash price and how much more it is going to cost him to buy on instalments. This is always done in the sale of automobiles-that is to say, in more than half by value of all instalment sales.





totalled more than \$11,000,000.

"This pool form of organisation is a comparatively new thing, and we welcome this opportunity of getting together with those interested in similar work in order that we may not only nefit from each other's successes, but that we may learn from one another's mistakes," Mr. Burnell asserted.

"Let me say," he added, "that we in Canada believe to be a positive fact that the binding centract is an absolute ave modern equip- esential to a successful wheat pool and can tell the exact that our five-year contract is the keynote of our success."

PREVIOUS EFFORTS

"Years ago western Canadian farmers tried to obtain a better price, first by forming local co-operative associations, each one of these owning and operating their own elevators. Then in Manitoba tried government owned and operated elevators. In each of these three provinces the farmers formed big line elevator companies. Eventually two of these had between them more than 60 .-000 shareholders, and every one of them owned 450 local elevators and operated three big terminals at the Fort William and Port Arthur, and a transfer elevator at Buffalo."

None of these efforts, however, could prevent the farmer having to stand the full strain of the yearly slump during the periods of heavy deliveries in the fall and the problem of finance connected with the handling of this grain became | ne of great concern, Mr. Burnell said.

IMMENSE TURNOVER Continuing, he described the function of the war-time Canadian wheat pool. its replacement by Canadian contract pool, controlled entirely by the farmers. From its inception in Alberta in October, 1923, with a membership of 22,000 and handling 34,000,000 bushels of wheat the pool had extended to Manitoba and Saskatchewan until today its membership embraced about 138,000 farmers and more than 187,000,000 bushels of wheat and 26,000,000 bushels of coarse grains had been marketed

through the Central Selling Agency. "Last year the Canadian pool had the largest turnover of any organisation in Canada except the Dominion government, Mr. Burnell declared. "While this gigantic organisation has been built in four years, it would not be fair to term it a mushroom growth because it is based on the educational work and efforts put forth in the farmer's organisations of western Canada for more than 25 years."

IMMENSE BENEFIT Mr. Burnell continued: "While the

formation and operation of the pools had not solved all the problems of the western Canadian farmer, yet the better prices resulting therefrom have brought about much better conditions, not only among the farmers but throughout the whole Canadian business field. The frozen credits of former years are being generally and gradually liquidated and a more prosperous condition brought about. This is reflected in the general rise in land values, and the return of people to the land. Another factor making for our success was the fact inited in the effort to co-operatively market our grain through the pool. The farmers controlled the organisation of the pools themselves without looking for government assistance.

In studying some of the efforts that have been made toward co-operative marketing in some of the countries represented at this conference, one is forced to the conclusion that what is needed is more pool and less politics. In some cases pool officials show a decided tendency to try and find an easy way for the farmer to better marketing conditions. I do not believe that there is an easy way that will materially benefit the grower; the things he seeks to remedy are hard conditions. Any attempt to loosen up the pool contract, any lack of enforcement of the terms of the contract, any attempt on the part of the pool organisation to allow the pool members to eat their cake and have it too, will prove futile and eventually lead to disaster. The farmer cannot overcome hard without facing the music.
