DEPARTMENT, WITH NAME CHANG-ED, WILL BE DIVIDED INTO THREE BRANCHES

OTTAWA, March 9. - Without amendment, the bill, proposed by Hon. W. D. Euler, minister of customs, for the reorganization of the customs and excise department passed the committee stage in the House of Commons and now stands for its third reading.

The bill changes the name of the department to that of the Bepartment of National Revenue and divides the department itself into three chief branches-customs, excise and income tax. Each of the three branches will be placed in the hands of a commissioner who will have practically the same power as a deputy minister.

OTTAWA, March 9. - Divorces granted in Canada during the year 1926 were ten per cent higher than in 1925 and were the largest in number so far recorded in any one year. The total for all provinces was 608 against 551 in 1925. The number in British Columbia was 167, Alberta being next highest with 154. #### FIRE ELIMINATED

Fire in the air has been almost comoletely eliminated, and a risk of its oc-Wednesday, March 9, 1927 curring is probably less than the risk of a railway collision. When it does occur, however, it is a very terrible matter owing to the fact that the high speed through the air acts on the burning petrol with a blow-lamp effect.

Precautions against the effects crashes are well worth studying. Many a minor crash has killed the pilot from concussion for want of strapping himself in his seat. ING MORE BUT USING LESS LIQUOR THAN GRAND-FATHERS

OTTAWA, March 9.—Canadians the present day generation are consuming more beer and smoking more tobacco than their grandfathers did back in 1869, but are drinking less wine and spirits than their forefathers did i

spirits, wine, beer and tobacco on which customs and excise duty are paid.

The decrease in the consumption of spirits is best illustrated by the figures of 1869 which state that 1.12 gallons were drunk, while last year only .27 gallon was consumed.

On the other hand last year over 5.61 gallons of beer were consumed by every man, woman and child in the Dominion. while back in 1869, 2.29 gallons made

the annual consumption per head. The joy of drinking wine has de creased with present day generation as only .07 gallon of wine was drunk in 1926, while in the days of Sir John A Macdonald the amount drunk was .11

Just after Confederation-in 1869 the annual consumption per head of tobacco was 1.75 pounds, while last year 3.46 pounds were smoked, due probably to the number of women smokers.

The average consumption of spirits per capita since 1869 was .87 gallon; of beer, 3.97 gallons; of wines, .10 gallon. and of tobacco, 2.62 pounds.
