MOSCOW, May 18.—Russia is demanding satisfaction from Britain for insult and loss in connection with the recent raid on WEDDING WAS delivered to the British Charge d'affaires here as a protest. The note declares that continuance of commercial relations with Great Britain are possible only on condition of the exact fulfillment of the provisions of the commercial agreement of 1921. Furthermore, the Soviet declares, it reserves the right to make a claim for violation by the British government of the agreement, for insult offered thereby and for material losses growing

The railway counsel argued successfully that while the railways were required to carry members of His Majesty's forces under certain terms, this was done in right of the Deminion and not of the provinces.

PREMIER OF ULSTER FIRST PREMIER OUTSIDE BRITAIN TO TAKE SEAT IN LORDS

LONDON, May 18 .- Viscount Craigavon, better known as Sir James Craig. Premier of Ulster, was today sworn in Philadelphia 13 as a member of the British House Lords. This is the first time that premier of a parliament other than that n London has been given a seat in the British Upper House.

Sir James Craig, when he was named a viscount in the King's New Year's New York 20 honors list, December 31 last, entitling Chicago 17 him to a seat in the House of Lords, Philadelphia 15 decided to take the title Viscount Detroit 12 Craigavon, after his old home on the Washington 12 outskirts of Belfast. GREAT POLITICAL ACTIVITY EVIDENT IN CITY FROM THE NUMBER OF REGISTRATIONS

That political activity here is quite strong at the present time may be assumed from figures that have been compiled at the office of Norman A. Watt, registrar of votes, following the recent registrations and court of revision on the provincial voters' list for 1927.

No less than 902 new names have been added to the list in Prince Rupert polling division (city) of which 23 were put on at the court of revision on Monday. In other polling divisions in the riding 69 new names were added, making the total gain for the constituency 971.

Objections entered at the court of revision, affecting the whole district, totalled 296, of which all but nine were allowed by the revising officer. The names struck off were mostly on account of death or removal from the district. Thirty-four applications for transfers to other districts

and other polling divisions in this district were allowed.

The total of voters on the Prince Rupert electoral district list now stands at 2,940, as compared with 2,268 last year, or an increase of nearly seven hundred.

SCHOOL WRECKED AND FARM AND BARNS DESTROYED

BATH, Michigan, May 18. - Two explosions believed to have been caused by dynamite, wrecked a section of the district school and killed at least 35 children, the principal of the school, one other teacher and two bystanders, according to a statement given out by the police. Twenty-two bodies had been recov-

ered up to noon. A short time before the explosion at the school, the farmhouse and barn of Andrew Kehoe was blown up and destroyed by fire. The body of Kehoe, who was treasurer of the school district, was found in front of the school building. OPEN SEASONS FOR BIG GAME IN BRITISH COLUMBIA FIXED BY AUTHORITIES

VICTORIA, May 18.—The directors of big game in British Columbia this year are fixed in regulations issued following their approval by the cabinet on recommendation of the game conservation board. Simplified by the division of the province into two game districts, one west of the Cascade Mountains and one east of that range, the regulations make little change in the actual seasons allowed for the shooting of big game.

In the eastern district, male moose are open from September 10 to December 15; in Omineca riding, north of the Canadian National Railway, from October 1 to October 31.

Male caribou may be killed from September 1 to December 15 in the eastern district, except in Mackenzie and Skeena ridings, and that part of the Cariboo west of the Fraser River and the territory south of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

The open season on male mountain sheep will be from September 1 to November 15 in the eastern district to the north of the Canadian National Railway and in those parts of Cariboo and Lillooet south of the fifty-second parallel of fattitude and west of the Fraser, In Fernie, Cranbrook and Columbia the season will be open from October 1 to October 31.

Mountain goat may be killed in the eastern district from September 1 to December 15, except in a large area bounded by the international boundary on the south, the Canadian Pacific Railway on the north, the Columbia River on the east and the Fraser River watershed on the west. A reserve is created here to protect mountain goat recently imported from Alberta.


