Interesting Discourse Made Before Gyro Club by J. C. Brady, M.P.

Rupert Gyro Club, at its luncheon yesterday afternoon, by J. C. Brady, M.P., who was for several years a resident of that Dominion. In opening, Mr. Brady that it was important that the various parts of the British Empire should become more familiarly acquainted with each other.

Small though it might be, with an area of little over 100,000 square miles, New Zealand had become in its brief history one of the greatest Dominions of the Empire, Mr. Bady said. Its population now was something in the neighborhood of 1,400,000 and it was rapidly increasing with a great development coming from within. As an instance, Dunedin, founded only 79 years ago by a handful of settlers, had grown to be a city of 90,000 people.

New Zealand's isolation had not proven an insurmountable handicap. With an indomitable courage, its peoples, ninety-eight per cent of them British, had taken hold and wonderful had been the results. The distance that they must deliver their produce had resulted in there being devised a refrigerator system by which perishable goods were delivered to all parts of the Empire in as fresh a condition as if they had travelled only one day.

Limited in area, the government of the Dominion, with two-thirds of the land now arable, had set about, through an ambitious system of irrigation etc.. to bring the remaining one-third under cultivation. It was a great country vineyards and stock production.






