

HENRY SERETH, HEAD OF SOUTH-ERN ALBERTA LUMBER CO., CHARGED WITH SWIND-LING

NEW YORK, Jan. 13 .- A general alarm has been broadcast throughout Canada and the United States for the arrest of Henry Screth, president of the bankrupt Southern Alberta Lumber Co. Ltd., from New York City and Seattle where he is charged in an indictment handed down yesterday with swindling the Hamilton National Bank of New York of not less than \$150,000 through a series of "kitted" checks.

Sereth is also head of the defunct Sitka Srpuce Mills Ltd., which operated a sawmill at Queen Charlotte City.

SERETH DENIES

VANCOUVER, Jan. 13. - "They haven't got a leg to stand on in this action against me," said Henry Sereth at his residence here today. He announced that he expected to leave within a few days for New York to face the swindling charges reported in press despatches to have been laid against him there.

FRUIT PRODUCTS INTRODUCED IN LEGISLATURE BY ATTORNEY GENERAL-TORY COMPLAINS BECAUSE HE

CANNOT CRITICIZE

BILL REGARDING

VICTORIA, Jan. 13 .- A bill was introduced in the legislature yesterday by Hon. A. M. Manson, K.C., attorney-general, intended to overcome some of the troubles met in handling fruit products. It makes provision for the keeping of records by all mercantile agents, the books to be open at all times for inspection by an officer of the government and all the moneys received by the agents to be regarded as trust funds for the benefit of those concerned, and other provisions. The bill was given its first reading but will not be further advanced until those concerned have been heard.

LONDON, Jan. 13 .- Great Britain had a huge adverse trade balance allowing for re-exports of more than £465,000,000 sterling last year. It is the biggest adverse trade balance since 1919 according to Board of Trade figures today. The total foreign trade, imports and exports combined, dopped £228,000,000 below last year. The situation is being ascribed largely to the coal strike.

PROPER AIR CONDITIONS.

Physiologists tell us the most important point about air and health is the amount of cooling effect the air exerts upon the human body. The skin of the face, neck and upper chest is very sensitive against 73.94 for November, 1925. to this cooling effect. The benefit of sun treatment in the healing the operating ratio and net earnings the Canadian National Railways to take of tuberculosis and other diseases is now reported to result in great part from the tanning of the skin. The tanning makes it possible for month periods of the preceding years people to remain naked exposed to the cooling air for longer periods. The cooling demands greater provision of heat in the body and more food has to be digested to form fuel. People digest 50 per cent more food after treatment has been taken than before exposure. Pupils of the same age learn more quickly while taking sun treatment than their playmates remaining in city schools. We, who are well, can keep fitter by having proper air conditions surrounding our bodies whether working, studying or playing.

LIMIT TO HOMEWORK.

"There are very few parents of pupils who ask that their children be not given homework. There are many parents who want Ja homework given their children, and some of them ask for more of F it than it is usual to give."

This is the opinion of Dr. C. C. Goldring, principal of Earl Beatty School and president of the Toronto Public School Principals' Association, in comment on the action of the board of education in raising the maximum of homework from 20 to 30 minutes for third class pupils, and from 30 to 60 minutes for fourth book children.

"There is not much danger of harm being done by an hour's o homework," said Dr. Goldring, "but I think an hour is enough. Of r course, if the child is delicate or there are special reasons against so much homework, the principal or teachers will use discretion." E Parents in some homes, says this principal, ask that their children be given no home work because they have the radio and want to enjoy it.

\$201,403,360, thus leaving net earnings of \$41,451,628. The gross is the largest yet recorded for a similar period during the five years which have elapsed since the amalgamation of the various units into the present system, while net establishes a new high mark in the financial history of the railway and exceeds by \$9,187,213 the total net of the twelve months of 1925.

The operating ratio of the system, that is, the relation of expenses receipts, continues to show a downward trend. For the first eleven months of 1926 the ratio has been reduced to 82.93 per cent, as compared with 37.83 per cent during the similar eleven month period of 1925.

During the month of Nevember last the gross earnings of the railways amounted to \$25,807,954 compared with \$24,675,451 during November, 1925. In November last the working expenses amounted to \$18,417,118 compared with \$18,224,967, thus, while the earnings increased in November, 1926 by 4.59 per cent., the working expenses increased only by 0.94 per cent.

In November last the net earnings were \$7,390,836 compared with \$6,430,-484 in November 1925, an increase in
