Daily Round Opens up at 7 a.m. and Lasts Until 7 p.m .- Routine Given

MONTREAL, Jan. 4 .-- A nurse's life round starts at 7 a.m., not a minute later, and ends at 7 p.m., with intervals of half an hour for dinner and supper. Breakfast is eaten before going on duty. However, at some time during the day a nurse is allowed three-hour stretch off duty in which to

On Sunday she is granted five consecutive hours off duty, but is expected to attend a church of her denomination during that time.

It is on her weekly half day off, when she leaves all her cares behind her at 1 o'clock in the afternoon that the nurse splurges. If she has frivolous tastes-and the cash-she can shop for pretty things, go to the theatre, or indulge in a matinee tea. She can pay calls, read, study, sleep, or merely do her laundry. Whatever she wants to do.

The nurses do night duty for two months at a stretch, from 7 p.m. to 7 am. ### MOVE TO UNSEAT EDMONTON MAYOR Australia.

January 10 is Date Set by Mr. Justice Ford For Hearing of Argument in Application

EDMONTON, Jan. 4: - Arguments in the move to unseat Mayor A. U. G. Bury will be heard by Mr. Justice Ford in the supreme court chambers on Monday, January 10, at 10 a.m. The fiat which grants leave to have the matter come before the court, was granted by Mr. Justice Ford.

Neil D. Maclean, K.C., presented the application on behalf of Jos. A. Clarke. a defeated candidate for mayor in the civic elections of December 13. That Mr. Bury is not qualified for the position by being a property owner or by having a sufficient business tax assessment, is the ground set out in the motion.

Mr. Clarke, the relator, filed his personal bond for \$200 and Messrs. Lempiere and Neher were sureties to the extent of \$100 each in bonds for the costs.

# DIET OF BEARS

DO BLACKS AND CINNAMONS EAT CLAY BEFORE "DENNING UP" FOR WINTER

MONTREAL, Jan. 3 .- Whether the black and cinnamon bears of the Canadian north woods and the Rocky Mountains eat clay "with malice aforethought" before they seek their dens for the long sleep of winter or whether the presence of large quantities of clay in the bears' stomach during the late fall and early spring is merely an accident of diet, have long been questions of dispute among Canadian hunters and naturalists. And now a new angle is given to the controversy.

To those unacquainted with the habits of the bruin family, it may be surprising to learn that the bear does fill his stomach with clay before retiring for his long winter snooze, but this is not news to the man who has "skinned out" a bear which was caught either just before he "denned up" or just when he emerged after his winter hibernation. When bears are killed at either of these periods, hunters claim. they are invariably found to have large balls of clay in their stomachs. The inquiring mind naturally asks "why and how," and there are almost as many answers to these questions as there are hunters and naturalists. One theory is that Nature has
