

## Former Prince Rupert Resident Tells of Seeing King and Queen Opening of Regent St., London

Amidst deafening cheers of thousands of loyal subjects lining beautifully decorated streets, the King and Queen, in an informal "family" drive, and unattended by any military display whatsoever, officially opened the new Regent Street. The King, who wore morning dress with a white flower in the buttonhole, looked hale and hearty, and repeatedly raised his top hat in acknowledgment of the plaudits of the crowds. while the Queen, a dignified figure in silvergrey and a silver toque, bowed and smiled in a real friendly manner.

Regent Street, having teken up a vantage point some time previous to the passing of the procession-if two carrages and a few mounted police can ke called a procession.



Vancouver Shippers Holding Back in Booking Space Result of Falling Market

RATES TO THE ORIENT

Business for immediate loading from Vancouver for U.K. or the continent is practically non-existent, and if steamers have not made arrangements to complete leading at other ports, the little business they are getting at Vancouver riterion of what the market can stand says Harbor and Shipping. The only husiness of interest at the present time that for new season, but so far shippers from Vancouver have not been very active participators, and the only business reported which may be for new season's loading here is optional cargo from Portland or Vancouver. In this connection it is interesting to note that Vancouver still maintains a preference over Portland insofar as full cargoes are concerned of 1-3 per ton. During the first part of the month, Portland shippers were showing a good deal of anxiety regarding space, and quite a lot of bookings were made and charters effected at 35 -, whilst 37 6 was freely paid for barley from San Francisco. Towards the end of the month, however, as an outcome of the fall in values of shipping services on the Atlantic, tonnage wa ssecured for North Pacific loading at as low as 32 6. Shippers from Vancouver are not yet satisfied that the time is ripe to start operations, although according to advices from all parts of Alberta, growing conditions are excellent and wheat is looking exceptionally promising, but of course, all kinds of things can happen between now and harvesting, and so
