CANADIAN AVIATION TO BE IMPROVED

HON. S. F. TOLMIE GIVES ADDRESS POLITICAL QUESTIONS

CARDINALS ARE NEARING FRONT

ST. LOUIS BUT ONE AND A HALF GAMES BEHIND PITTSBURG FOR SUPREMACY

NEW YORK, June 25.—St. Louis Cardinals are now but one and a half games behind Pittsburgh Pirates in the race for National League supremacy. Following close behind the Cardinals come the Chicago Cubs who defeated the Pirates 4-2 yesterday while St. Louis was accepting for the Cincinnati Reds 3-2. New York split a double-header with Philadelphia and Boston beat Brooklyn 5-3.

Chicago White Sox further sank into third place in the American League by losing to Detroit 9-4, while Philadelphia was idle. St. Louis defeated Cleveland 2-1 in the only other game played in the league yesterday.

The game between the Cardinals and the Reds went eleven innings before the former were able to run out. Today St. Louis is to tackle Cincinnati twice. Twin conquests, coupled with a Pirate defeat, would find the world champions once more leading the National League.

At New York today, the Yankees and the Athletics will have two clashes following their halt yesterday.

KNOCKED DOWN AND KILLED

EMPLOYEE OF TRAIL SMELTER MEETS DEATH IN HOME FROM UNKNOWN MAN

SHOT THREE TIMES

Wife Saw Man with Hat Pulled Over Face to Conceal Features Run Away

TRAIL, June 25.—Answering a knock on the door of his home, Charles Jury, an employee of the Consolidated Smelters here, was killed shortly after 3 a.m. yesterday. He was struck over the head and shot three times through the body.

Jury's wife who was awakened by the scuffle, said her husband had got out of bed to answer a knock. Shots were fired as he turned on the light. She ran to the door in time to see a man with a cap pulled low over his face concealing his features. He vaulted the verandah rail and made off.

Police are watching all the railway lines, rounding up strangers and searching the surrounding hills in an effort to locate the murderer.

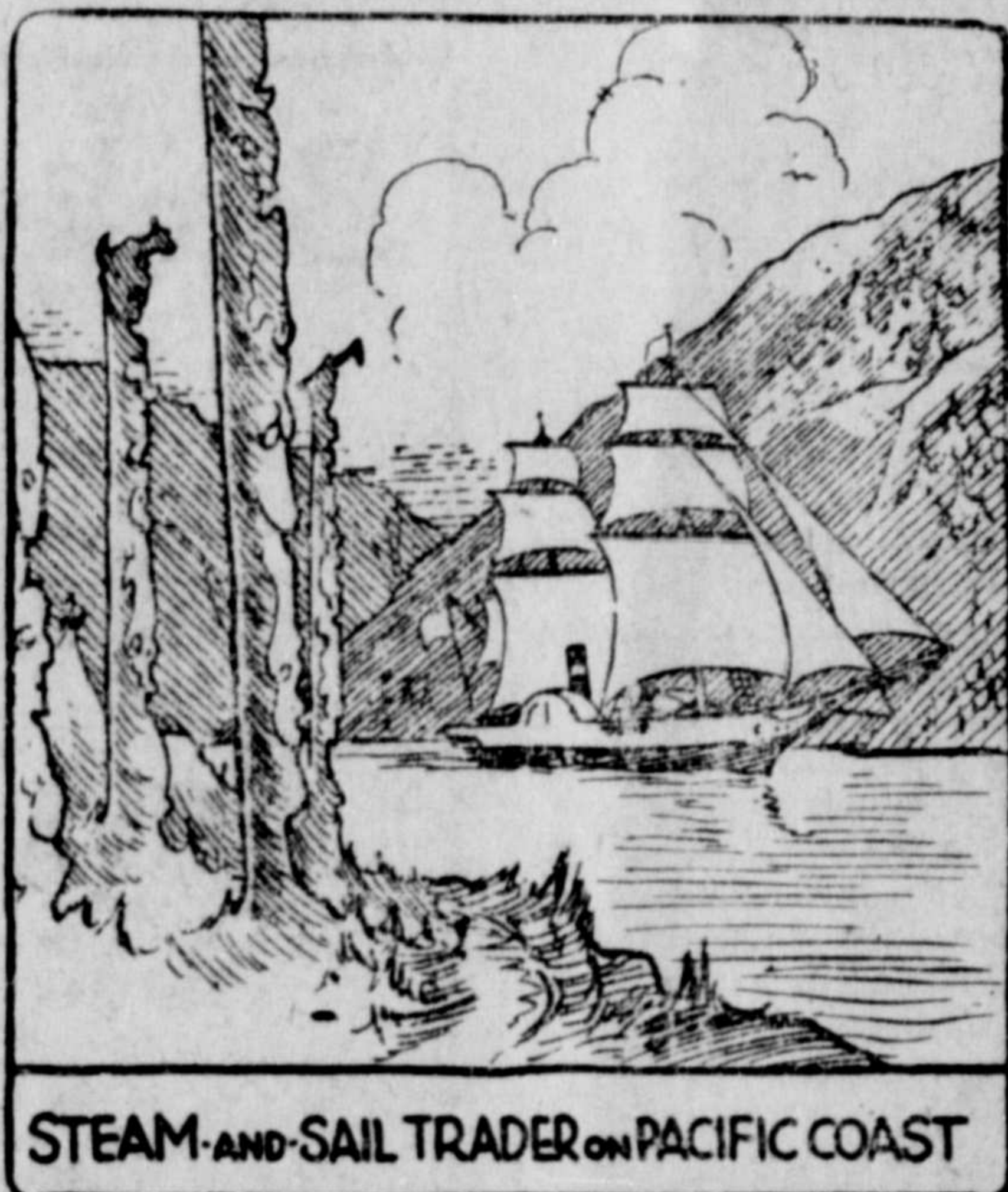
Besides the widow, Jury is survived by four children.

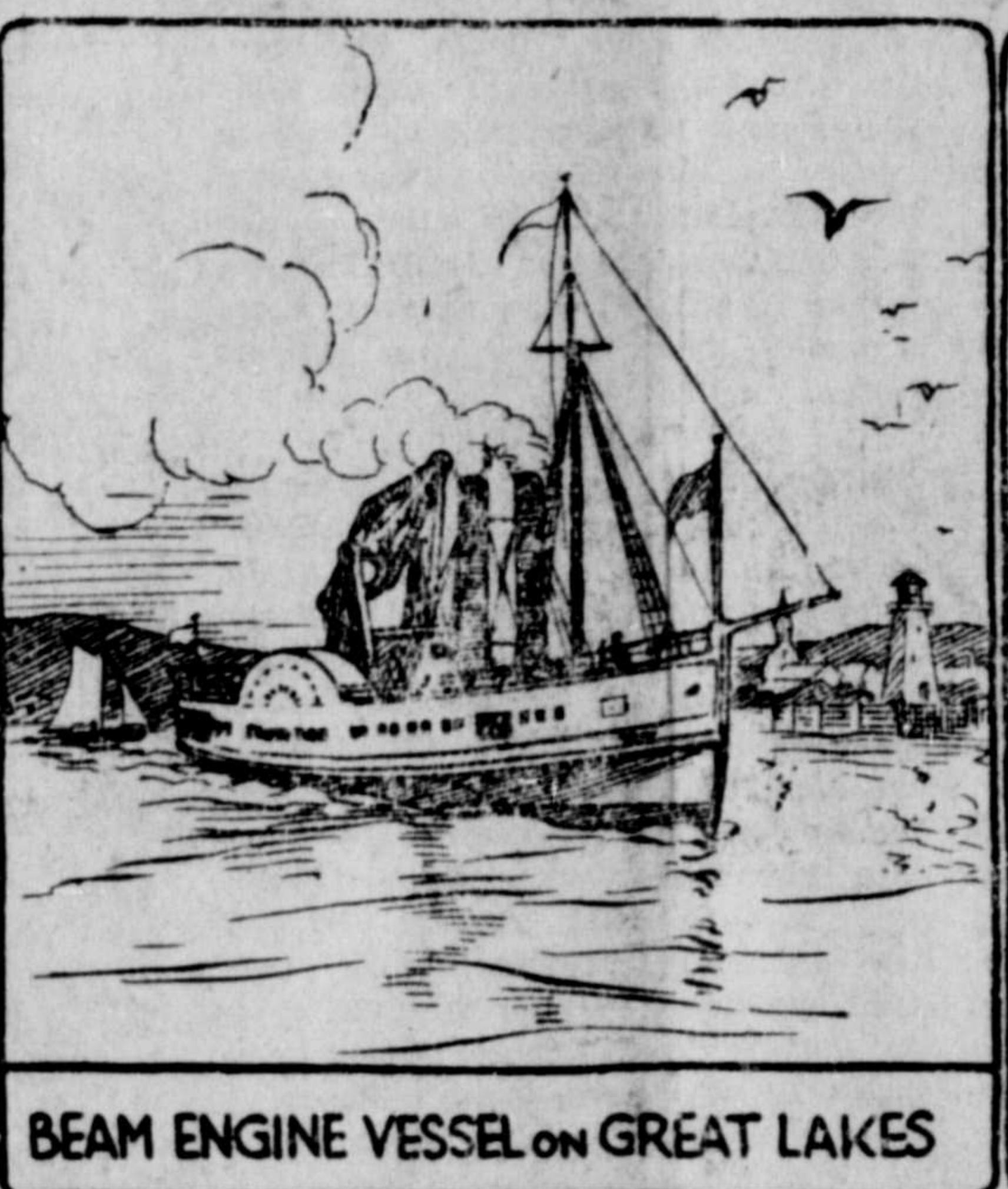

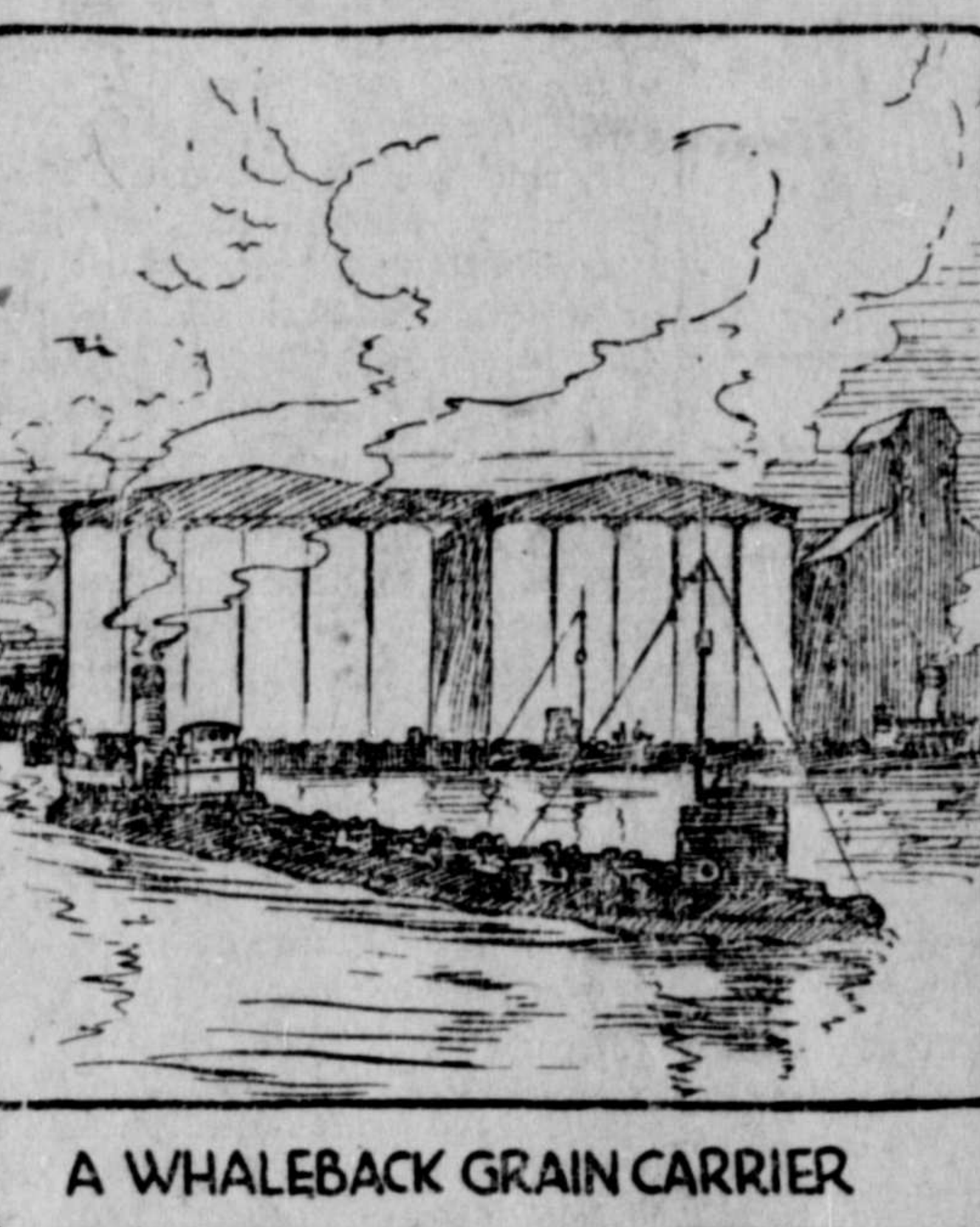

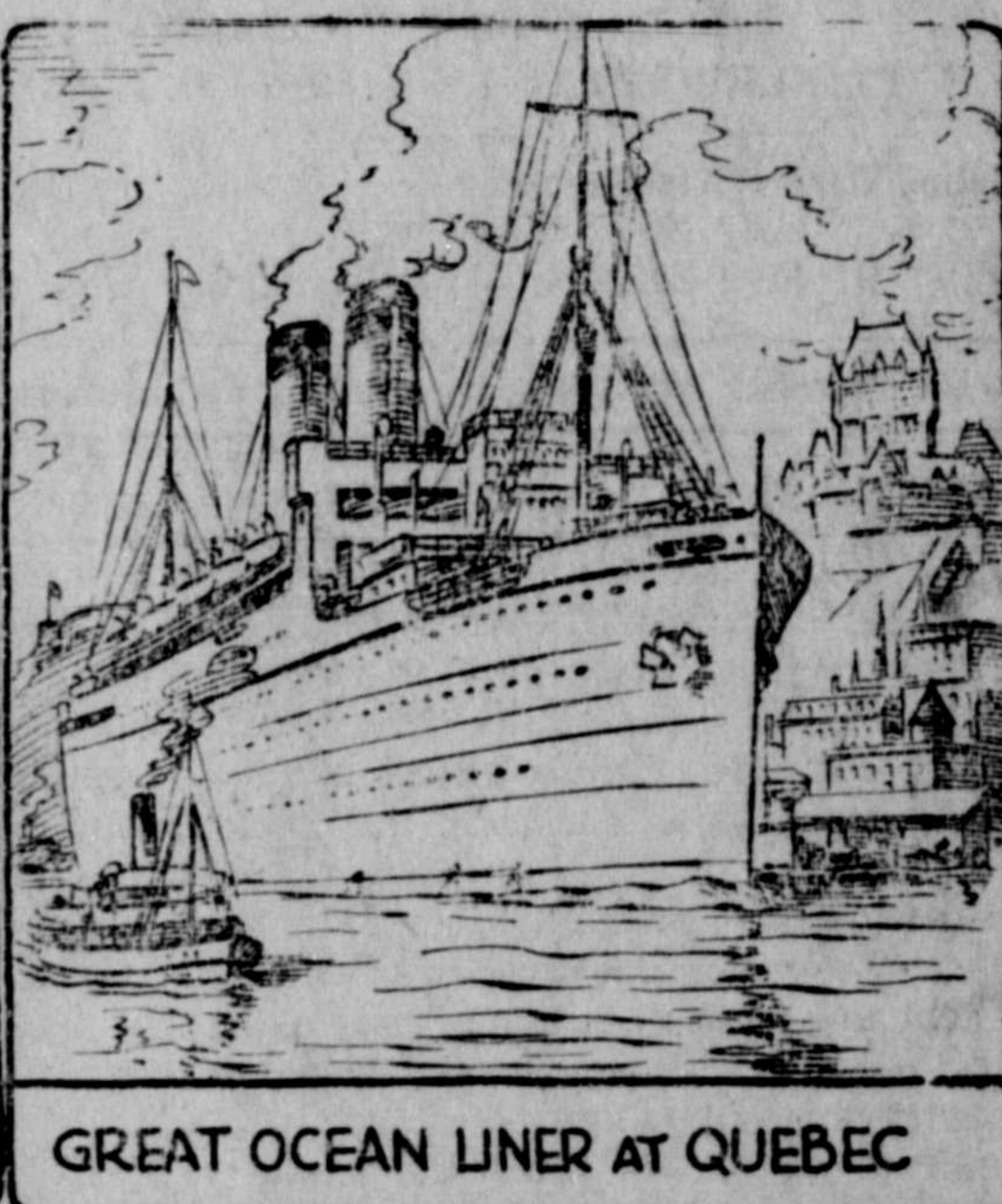
STEAM AND SAIL TRADER ON PACIFIC COAST

GREAT OCEAN LINER AT QUEBEC

Defence Aviation Force to be Maintained as a Separate Canadian Unit

OTTAWA, June 25.—Reorganization of the aviation activities of the department of national defence is to take place under which it will be separated from both civil and military jurisdiction. Colonel Ralston, minister of national defence, announces.

To meet the growing needs of the country three branches of the service will be formed—military, civil and aeronautical engineering. The civil department will have to do with flying in connection with administrative duties. The change comes into effect on July 1. It is understood that this is the first step taken by the Dominion Government in connection with Canadian defence as a result of an arrangement made at the Imperial Conference in London last year which was attended by Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King and Hon. Earnest Lapointe.

DR. JAMES IS NEW ENGINEER

VICTORIA, June 25.—Dr. Howard James has been appointed resident engineer for Number 1 mineral survey district with headquarters at Prince Rupert. He is a graduate of the University of British Columbia and a post-graduate of Harvard.

AIRPLANE TO SCOUT ROUTE FOR HIGHWAY

VICTORIA, June 25.—An airplane is to be used from September 1 to October 6 to find a location for the proposed highway from Prince Rupert to Terrace. While it has been virtually decided to build along the Skeena River, it is hoped that possibly a less expensive route will be found.

Peace Pact Between Japan and the United States is Suggested and Official Proposal Likely

GENEVA, June 25.—The possibility that the government and people of the United States may soon be forced to decide whether they wish to negotiate a perpetual peace pact with Japan loomed today as an outgrowth of the tripartite conference at Geneva. The Japanese delegates deny that they made any overtures and Hugh Gibson, head of the American delegation, made a similar denial but the impression nevertheless prevails that Admiral Viscount Saito, head of the Japanese delegation, may suggest some sort of treaty outlawing war between the Japanese and United States to supplement the four power pact created at the Washington conference as a substitute for the Anglo-Japanese alliance.

It is believed that before making any overtures officially, the Japanese would want to receive some assurance that such overtures would have a reasonable chance of meeting with favorable consideration.

Deadlock at Three Power Geneva Conference and Position of U.S. Defined in Washington Despatch

GENEVA, June 25.—A deadlock continues here on the great problem of the three power naval conference mainly as to whether the decisions of the Treaty of Washington in 1922 are subject to reconsideration here. Apparently nothing more important can be achieved until the question is decided one way or the other.

WASHINGTON, June 25.—In any agreement reached at the three-power naval conference at Geneva, the United States would accept nothing less than parity with Great Britain in every class of naval vessel, it was stated today by officials of the state department. Emphasis was placed on the "B" purporting to give reasons why statement because of the publication Britain should return to her old time supremacy of the sea.

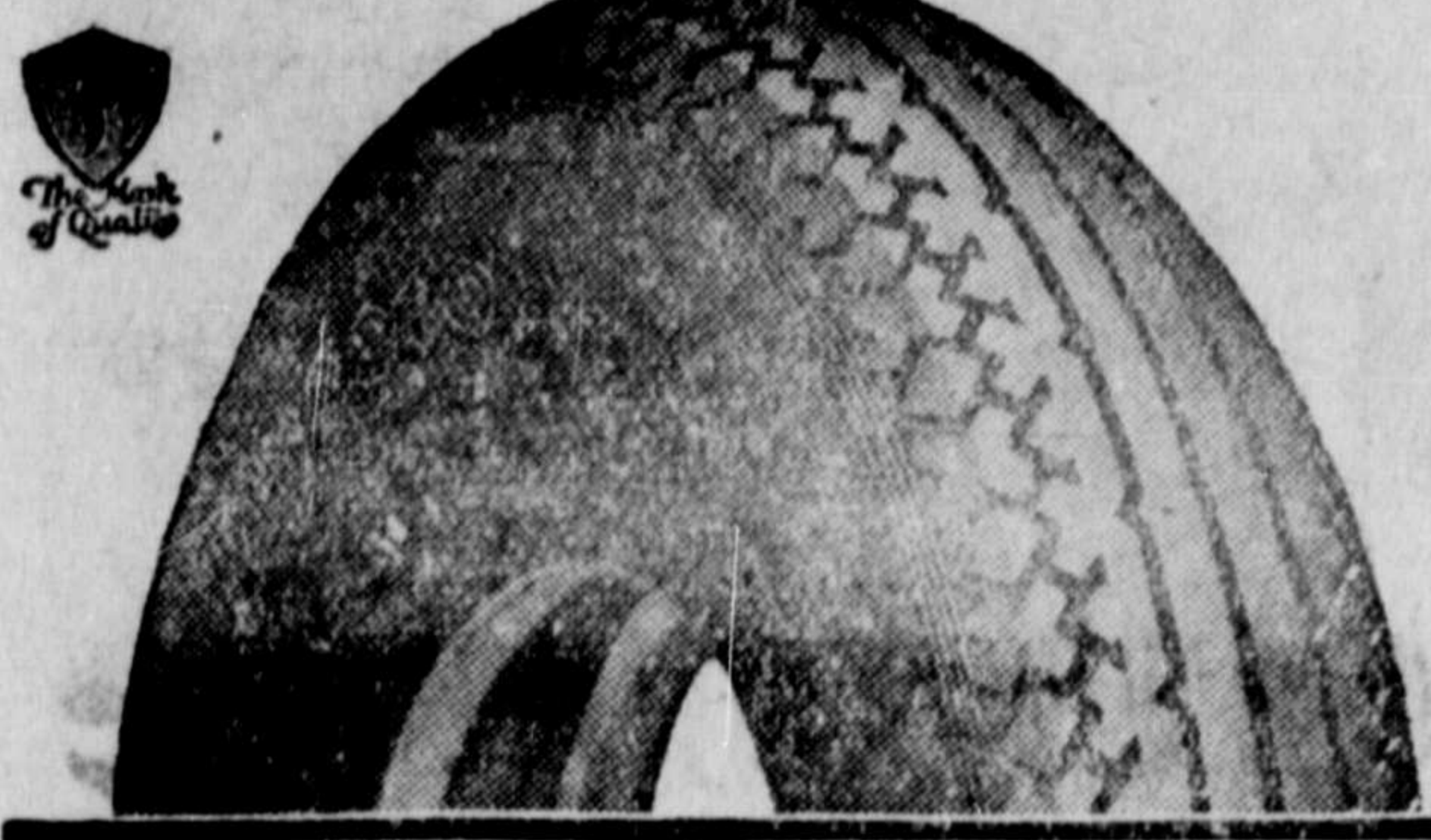
VANCOUVER BOARD IS APPRECIATIVE

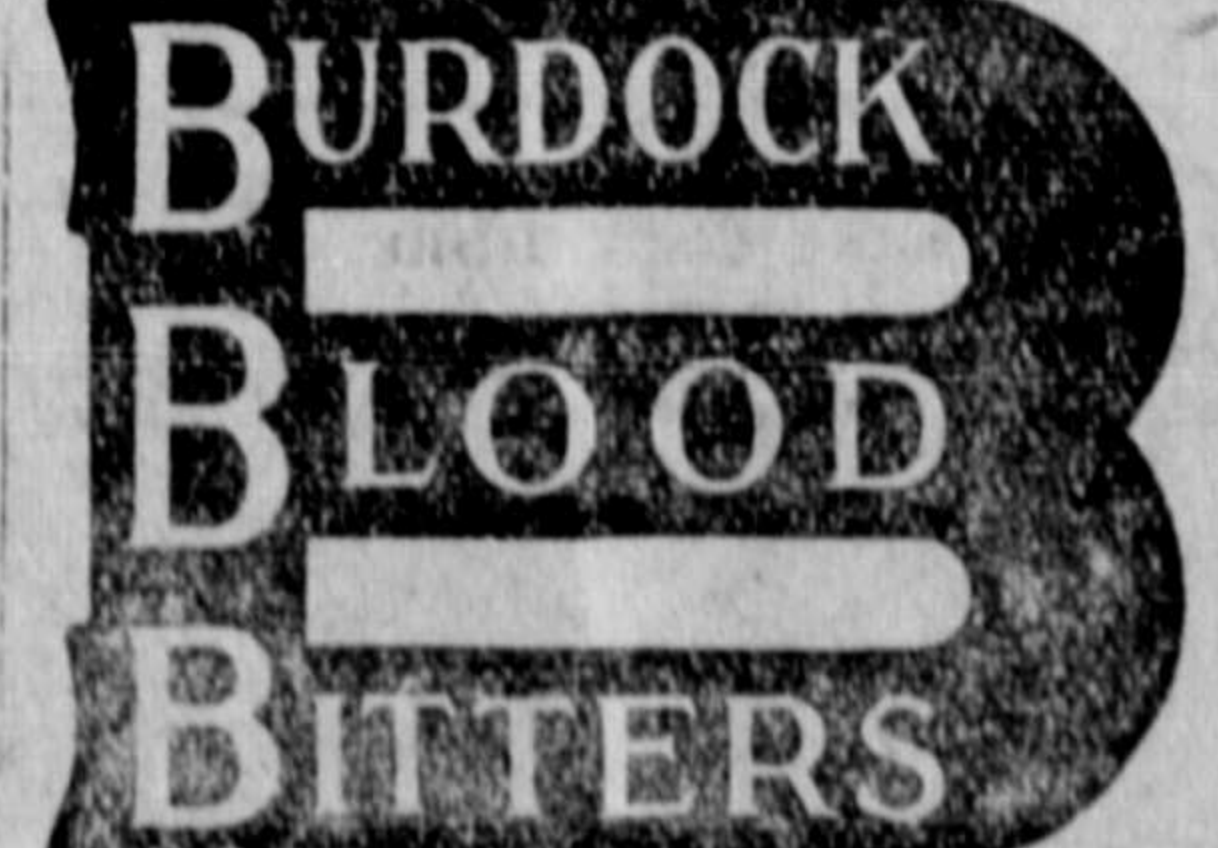

Waterfront Whiffs

Little Salmon Canning Going on Yet—Lull in Boat Building—
 Much Activity at Dry Dock

The opening of the 1927 sockeye fishing season differs little from that of other years. As is usual in the first week or so of each season little fish has so far been caught and it is not considered that much of a run will develop until next month. In District No. 2 Bella Bella and Klemtu are reported to have been the only canneries to actually start packing during this, the first week of the season. Up to Wednesday, Inverness was reported to have been the only plant on the Skeena River having steam up. All boats are fishing on the river, however, in the hope that the run will show an early improvement. The first weekly close season started at 6 o'clock last night and will be lifted at a similar hour Sunday night.

An improvement in trolling was reported this week although the fish could still be a good deal more abundant than they are just now without breaking any records. About 150 boats are estimated to be engaged at the present time in this pursuit in the vicinity of Dundas Island with some 80 at Hippo. Rowboat trolling at Warke Channel is also in full swing.

Bradbury & Yell's seine boat Revellie, which is engaged in salmon packing between Hippo Island and Butedale cannery, is expected in port this week-end to pick up her skipper, Don Yell, who is now fully recovered from burns about the face sustained recently on the boat. He was brought into town a few days ago by the Bruce I. for medical attention.

The gillnetter Sea Gull, belonging to Hanson & Damgaard, was in port this week for installation of a Ford Marine engine after which she will engage in fishing for Port Edward cannery. Last week a similar motor was placed in the Henry Ford, belonging to T. J. Davidson of Osland, and a run of 1 1/2 hours was made from here to Inverness cannery out of which the boat will engage in fishing. Next week the same type of motor will be placed in a gillnetter for F. Crookall of Osland which has just been built.

BOAT BUILDING THROUGH

The season's program of new boat building is now about completed and the summer lull in this line of industry will be shortly setting in. An opportunity will be given thus to carry out considerable repair work that has been hanging fire.

Sucho is now putting finishing touches on the seineboat for William Rudland, his last contract this spring. The boat for William Wood of Sandspit recently left this yard and is now being outfitted at the Cow Bay floats before proceeding to the Islands.

Suga is completing the seine boat Al-

berta G. for R. G. Johnston and the vessel is expected to leave early next week to start operations out of Klemtu cannery. The yard is now booked up for an extended period of boat repair work which has already started.

McLean has just completed the seine boat Florence G. for the Gosse Packing Co. which left on Thursday for Captain's Cove cannery out of which it will be employed. This leaves the McLean shop ready for a brief program of repair work after which the Cow Bay premises will be closed up and a start made on the new establishment at Seal Cove.

Under charter for the season, Suga's seine boat Oslo II left this week end for down the coast to fish and pack out of Klemtu cannery.

NEW SERVICE BOAT

Other cannery managers can have their speedboats to rapidly traverse from one point in their fishing grounds to another but Bob Johnston desires something more substantial to cover his territory. Thus the new service "Klemtu Cannery" which arrived in port on Thursday from Victoria where it was built at Foster's yard.

The Klemtu Cannery is a sturdy looking craft which should be well suited for the work it is planned she shall carry out. She is 46 feet long with beam of 11 ft. 5 in. and is powered with a 40 h.p. full diesel Fairbanks-Morse engine. She has comfortable accommodation and, while designed more particularly for the transport of the manager or other cannery officials, is also fitted out for towing so, at a pinch, she may be called into practical work. She has a speed of nine knots per hour.

The boat, of which Capt. Norman Brodhurst, well known locally, has been appointed as master, made the trip up from Victoria by easy stages, stopping overnight at Nanaimo, Alert Bay, Bella Bella and Klemtu enroute. She arrived here at 4:30 Thursday morning and proceeded late that afternoon to Inverness. On Sunday, she will go on down to Klemtu which will be her headquarters.

After a couple of weeks in port, the local halibut schooner Chief Skugald, Capt. William Parsons, left Friday morning to again try her fortunes on the high spots. Analysis has not yet been completed at the fisheries experimental station of the 150 pounds of substance, believed to be ambergris, which the Skugald brought in from the fishing grounds. Last week the station was fairly besieged with visitors desirous of looking the stuff over.

The announcement that the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. is offering the steam trawlers Andrew Kelly, James Carruthers and G. E. Foster for sale has proven of considerable interest. It is an acknowledgment that the big concern has definitely decided to abandon fishing on the company's side. The vessels have been laid up for the past three or four years and, during that time, the company has apparently satisfied itself that it can safely rely on the supply of independent fish to meet its large demands.

A QUICK SALE

The little open boat Irene has had no less than three owners during the period of the past week. A few days ago Bill Watt turned the vessel over to J. G. Willett, who had intended to convert it into a troller but had a quick change of mind and found a purchaser in the person of Jimmy Wadsworth, former owner of the Iduna, who, at the time of writing, looked like he was going to stay with his ship. The Irene is fifteen feet long and is powered with a 3 1/2 h.p. engine.

Rolf Walker has returned to the Yacht Club float with his small pleasure boat which he wintered at home.

Picnic and fishing parties have once again become the order of the day and daily the harbor is dotted with pleasure craft plying to and fro, and at night, the opposite shore is a constellation of campfire beacons. Large organized picnics have of recent years been gaining in popularity and almost every Sunday between now and September is booked up with events of such kind.

Incidentally the anglers are becoming restless and a number of extended trips are being planned.

place these days and Glen McMillan and his men are just as much on the jump as if they had two or three real big jobs under way.

On the pontoons on Thursday were the lighthouse tender Birnie for annual inspection and repair; the P.R.T. for cleaning, painting and repairs; J. R. Morgan's logging boat for a new rudder and keel shoe as well as gumwood sheathing, and the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.'s trawler Andrew Kelly for cleaning and painting.

Moored at the piers were the B.C. Packers' cannery tender Nishka from Lowe Inlet for machinery repairs; the snagboat Bobolink for inspection and repairs; and a 40 foot seineboat, owned by Matthew Yeoman of the Queen Charlotte Islands, for fitting out and installation of a 30 h.p. Standard gasoline engine.

Meanwhile finishing touches are being put on Haaton Lund's new halibut boat Emblem I, which is to be completed this week-end and the launching of Lars Voge's new halibut boat is scheduled for June 29 with completion on July 4 after which she will be commissioned in packing salmon to Butedale cannery.

Construction is also well advanced on a 64 by 22 foot scow for the Rupert Marine Products.

As well as all this, there is a good deal of miscellaneous work for the machine shop including the turning out of a crankshaft for the Granby Co.

Each in trouble, three of the very latest design of trolling boats, enroute from Seattle to Ketchikan, were forced to put into Prince Rupert this week for repairs. One, named Nada, broke its crankshaft. The second, going to the first aid, broke its shaft and the third caught fire in the attempt to aid the other two. The Nada is now at dry dock awaiting repairs and the other two are at the Cow Bay floats. Features of the three boats are winches to facilitate the handling of the weighted lines and small derricks. They are something new in the way of seineboat construction. (continued on page six)

MAY BUILD SCHOONER

The Prince Rupert dry dock is figuring on a 95 foot Arctic schooner, to be used by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police at Herschel Island, for which the Dominion government is inviting tenders to close on June 30. Of extra heavy construction and with other features necessary for operation in the icy seas of the far north, the job is one of the best now available for ship-builders and, if it should be landed here, would be the biggest single building contract the local yard has had since it constructed the freighters for the Canadian Government Merchant Marine.

Twenty-three cases of sockeye salmon were canned last Tuesday, the first day of operation for the new cannery built during the winter at Klentu by R. G. Johnston and associates. The plant had a fairly satisfactory week's operations considering it was the opening of the season and it is hoped it will have a good pack this season. Mr. Johnston has this cannery under his direct supervision as well as that at Inverness of which he has been manager for many years.

The halibut boat Zeballos, Capt. Henry Jorgenson, left Tuesday for a ten day trip to the fishing grounds after which it will take up a packing charter for the Gosse Packing Co.

Tug Cape Scott arrived on Tuesday having in tow two scows of lumber and coal for Albert & McCaffery. The lumber was mainly large stuff which will be used by the Rupert-Vancouver Stevedoring Co. in connection with the reconstruction of the west end of the government wharf, on which a good start has now been made.

Power tug F. H. Phippen returned Thursday afternoon from Georgetown with a scow containing fish boxes for the local trade. On Friday the Wigwam took a scow of lumber from the Big Bay mill to North Pacific Cannery and on Monday another scowload will be delivered to Carlisle.

The local halibut boat D.S.T. Capt. Jimmy Parsons, is to enter on a packing charter for Lowe Inlet cannery on her return from a week's trip to the fishing grounds.

The halibut boat Eastern Point is at the McLean Ways for repairs following recent contact with a log when her stern was partly stove in.

HALIBUT HEAVY

Halibut landings at Prince Rupert this past week have been heavier than for any week since the present season opened. From Saturday to Friday (inclusive) a total of 990,800 pounds was landed of which 620,000 pounds was from American bottoms and 270,800 from Canadian. The figures for the corresponding week last year were: total 679,000; American, 342,500; Canadian, 336,500.

Landings at the port for the season to date are now just a little more than 300,000 pounds less than at a similar date last year. Heavy gains the past few weeks have been steadily bringing the present season's total up until now, with two more weeks showing gains as the last two have done, the 1927 total will be in excess of that for 1926.

Total landings for this season to date are as follows: American, 8,270,600 pounds; Canadian, 3,392,500 pounds; total, 11,663,100 pounds. Last year's totals at a similar date were: American, 8,700,200 pounds; Canadian, 3,326,000 pounds; total, 12,026,200 pounds.

Prices were fairly good at the first of the week but there has been considerable falling off toward the end, no doubt on account of the increased supply. The high bid for American fish was 15c and 8c which the Thor received on Tuesday for 3,000 pounds.
