Conference of Premiers was One of Most Momentous in History of Canada---McLean

VICTORIA, November 19 .- The recent gathering of provincial representatives will produce rich results in every part of Canada, Premier MacLean told the Canadian Club at a luncheon in his honor here yesterday. The results would be felt in increasing understanding and a stronger national spirit.

Readjustment of provincial problem and irritations by the conference had showed that Canada was thinking nationally as never before. All the provinces were willing to make concessions in order to help others. From these positive offers of co-operation he predicted the Canadian Government and Parliament would work out solutions for all Canadian problems.

In moulding a Canadian spirit and promoting development of a great country, the conference was one of the most momentous gatherings in the history of the Dominion, Premier Mac-Lean stated.
