A. A. Cole Writes Interestingly of Great Stewart Gold Mine in Bulletin

In a bulletin published by the Canatian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy at Montreal, A. A. Cole, a mining engineer, in an article on "The Silver Mining Industry in Canada" deals incidentally with the Premier mine at Stewart. He tells of the geological formations and then goes on to say:

The mineralization is divided into two phases, one of primary (hypogene) origin and the other of secondary (supergene) origin. The primary phase consists of pyrite, galena, zinc blende, and small amount of chalcopyrite, and carries gold and silver values. It is accompanied by a sub-phase of barren We sell superior lumber - pyrite. The last phase of the igneous activity took place subsequent to the primary mineralization, and consisted of intrusion by lamprophyre dikes.

After a period of uplift and erosion, secondary enrichment took place. This consisted of sulph-antimonides of silver and of native silver. Silver values were greatly, and gold values slightly, increased in the enriched zone.

The property is equipped with a modern mining plant. Both hydro-electric and semi-diesel power is used.

The mill, as originally installed, used a combination of gravity flotation and eyanide treatment. All grinding and flotation was performed in cyanide solution. In the early part of 1926, additions to the mill were completed which brought the milling capacity up to 400 tons daily. Under the present milling system, a very clean table concentrate is made, and from the slimes and reground table-tailings a flotation concentrate is recovered, thus producing a final tailing so low in value that cyaniding, with its attendant expense, has been rendered unnecessary.


