NO ELECTION AT PRESENT EXPECTED

DEMPSEY SAID TO BE FAVORITE IN BIG FIGHT TOMORROW

No General Election Likely Just Now Seems Opinion at the Capital

PRESS COMMENT ON ACTION OF CAUCUS SEEMS TO BE FAVORABLE JUDGING BY BRIEF QUOTATIONS RECEIVED

VICTORIA, July 20.—It is believed that there is no immediate prospect of a general election or of cabinet reorganization.

The Victoria Times says the Premier's decision "will be received with general satisfaction throughout the province."

The Colonist: "The people of British Columbia will be one in agreeing that the Premier should be relieved of all possible worry."

NEW LIGHT ON BONILLA ISD.

This Will be Great Aid to Mariners Using Hecate Strait: Other New Work

For years the board of trade has been asking for a light on Bonilla Island as an aid to tugboats and other vessels.

Another work of local interest is placing of a bay beacon at the entrance to Porpoise Harbor where the spar buoy has been located.

A light has also been placed at Serpentine Point in Lema Passage south of Bella Coola.

CHICAGO AGAIN LEAGUE LEADER

NEW YORK, July 20.—Chicago regained the leadership in the National League yesterday, beating the Giants on the occasion of John McGraw's silver anniversary festivities as manager.

The Yankees won the eleventh consecutive victory over St. Louis although Ruth and Gehrig each got only one hit.

FERDINAND OF RUMANIA DIES

Victim of Cancer Which Sapped His Strength and Death Came From Lungs

NEW KING PROCLAIMED

BUCHAREST, July 20.—King Ferdinand of Rumania died today at his summer residence.

Immediately following the report of his death, the Regency council met at four o'clock this afternoon and proclaimed Prince Michael, son of Prince Carol, as King to rule with the regency council.

The monarch's death came peacefully after a long fight against cancer in which the King gradually lost weight until at his death he was less than 200 pounds.

There has been no disturbance here as a result of the death of the King.

The Regency Council was sworn in this afternoon at 4:50 before the National Assembly.

ASCENDED THRONE King Ferdinand ascended the Rumanian throne during the troublous times shortly after the outbreak of the world war.

He was greatly agitated regarding the position Rumania was to take in the conflict. During the first two months of the war, Rumania, under the rule of the late King Charles, it was charged, had been secretly aiding the Central Powers.

During a speech from the throne in November, 1915, King Ferdinand was shouted down with cries of "Down with Hungary," "Down with Germany," "Down with Hohenzollerns."

GERMAN OVERTURES In August, 1916, the former German Kaiser sent a letter to King Ferdinand informing him that it was his intention to send a special mission to Bucharest relative to Rumania's position.

EDMONTON SELLING ITS REVERTED LANDS More than Eight Hundred Parcels Disposed of This Year Bringing in \$110,000

EDMONTON, July 20.—That the city of Edmonton itself is one of the biggest real estate operators in the city was disclosed when Sam Ferris, city land superintendent, submitted figures showing that more than \$110,000 of realty has been disposed of since the beginning of the year.

Mr. Ferris points out that last year there were eight re-purchases of property by former owners which represented some \$22,000 while this year only two parcels have been bought back by previous owners involving some \$2,860.

Airplane Patrol of Fisheries Being Established by Major D. R. Maclaren, Now on Way North

Plane Hopped Off Yesterday for Butedale With Three Aboard and Will Cover Whole North Coast

VANCOUVER, July 20.—Major D. R. Maclaren, hopped off in a seaplane yesterday for Butedale and Prince Rupert to establish an aerial fisheries patrol.

The plane will patrol the whole of the northern fisheries, including Butedale, Rivers Inlet, Naas and Skeena Rivers and the Queen Charlotte coastal waters and is expected to remain on duty most of the summer.

ALBERTA WHEAT HEADING NOW

Minister of Agriculture of Province Says Conditions Highly Satisfactory

EDMONTON, July 20.—Crop conditions throughout the entire province are highly satisfactory and rapid growth has taken place during the last two weeks.

Precipitation in most districts has been sufficient to put the soil in better shape than at the same time of the season for the past several years.

Early wheat is heading out rapidly in many sections. It is estimated that 25 per cent of the wheat is now in head and heads are showing in many oats and barley fields.

Damage is slight. Local storms in several districts have left their mark, but losses have not been widespread.

Insect damage appears to be slight. In some northern districts wireworms have injured crops to a slight extent, but not enough to cause an appreciable reduction in the yield over the province.

In southern and south-eastern sections of the province the crop continues to give great promise. Intermittent showers are carrying cereal crops and wheat and little irrigation has been necessary.

From Grande Prairie and Peace River comes encouraging news. Growth has been rapid and much early wheat is in head.

EMPIRE GIRDLE ROUND WORLD

Not a Wheel With Hub in United Kingdom Says Amery

LONDON, July 20.—The Empire is not a wheel whose hub is in the United Kingdom, said Rt. Hon. L. C. M. S. Amery. It is a girdle round the world; each part is an equal link, and from its own viewpoint is the central link.

There is always a good deal of business between partner governments which can be expedited by a talk round the table better than by means of despatches.

Reply to a question Colonel Amery said he thought the status of the dominions high commissioners in London would be one of the questions he would discuss with dominion governments.

Col. Amery is starting on a tour of four dominions. He first goes to South Africa. He leaves South Africa September 23, and goes to Australia, then to New Zealand, and will cross the Pacific and reach Canada January 5 or 6.

Col. Amery said: Today Imperial conference is the essential element in Imperial co-operation. Unity of Empire is obtained by contact not by control. Unity is obtained not by subordination but by free co-operation.

CANADIAN ISITORS

If the Imperial conference could meet every year, said Col. Amery, and could be held by rotation in different capitals of the Empire the problem of Imperial co-operation would solve itself.

Alberta has had close associations with Hon. John Oliver and in this province the news that a serious illness has made it necessary for him to retire from the premiership of British Columbia occasions deep and widespread regret.

Dempsey is Favorite in the Big Fight Against Sharkey but Other Man Has Many Supporters

SARATOGA LAKE, July 20.—Jack Dempsey is the favorite in tomorrow's fight against Sharkey as a result of confidence in the man who is physically and mentally tuned up.

NEW YORK, July 20.—Sharkey was more confident than ever when seen here this morning. He said: "I'll beat him. I'm bigger than ever I was and I'm hitting harder."

There is clear weather for the fight and the advance sale of tickets has reached \$900,000. Expert opinion differs sharply as to the prospects.

Derelict Vessel May Be Lady Kindersley Driven on the Rocks

NATIVES ON SIBERIAN COAST REPORT VESSEL BEING FOUND STOCKED WITH PROVISIONS WHICH THEY REMOVED

NOME, July 20.—An unidentified ship that may be the Hudson Bay Company's trading schooner Lady Kindersley, abandoned as doomed two years ago in the Arctic ice pack 200 miles north of Point Barrow, was driven high on the rocks at Kolichuan Bay on the Siberian coast.

Thompson arrived here yesterday after a trading trip. He says the natives found the vessel stocked with provisions, which were removed.

If the derelict was the Lady Kindersley she must have drifted almost a thousand miles from where the crew left her to trudge over the ice until rescued by another ship.

Captain Thompson advances the theory that when the fall tides turned the vessel drifted with the ice in the direction of Siberia.

VANCOUVER, July 20.—Officials of the boys' industrial school at Coquitlam today identified photographs of the decapitated youth found on the railroad tracks near Kamloops as Hugh Birch, 16 years of age, son of Hugh Birch Sr. of Hazelton. He escaped from the institution on July 12.

FERDINAND OF RUMANIA DIES

(continued from page one)
 Ireland. The declaration by Rumania was followed almost immediately by Germany declaring war against Rumania. With his troops at the front King Ferdinand's throne began to totter from intrigue charged against Rumanian politicians and German agents, who planned to dethrone the ruler and install a German prince in his place. There were even plots against the life of the king.
 Rumania's position in the war was a difficult one and after nearly two years' fighting two-thirds of the country was overrun by the enemy. The Rumanians, isolated and without outside support were obliged to accept drastic peace terms sent by Germany with an ultimatum that they be accepted in 24 hours. The collapse of the German army on the western front and the armistice, however, rendered the enforced treaty between Germany and Rumania ineffective.
 Although King Ferdinand took the oath as king the day after the death of his uncle, King Charles, in 1914, he and his queen were not crowned until October, 1922. The ceremonies took place at Alba Julia. On that occasion the crown used by the late King Charles again was pressed into service. It is made of steel from Turkish guns captured at Plevna in 1877.

TOURIST TRAFFIC IS DOUBLED THIS YEAR PROVINCE OF ALBERTA

Publicity Has Great Effect in Bringing Parties to Public Parks

EDMONTON, July 20.—Tourist traffic passing through the city this summer is nearly double that of last season, according to local railway and hotel officials. The fame of Alberta's two national parks, the increased publicity being given the territory in European and United States newspapers and magazines, and the natural desire for humans to "go west" are the various reasons advanced by officials for the heavy influx of tourists.
 While no actual figures are available, an indication of the increase can be obtained by comparing the figures of the organized parties passing over the Canadian National Railways last year and this.
MANY PARTIES COMING
 Last year there were some 20 odd such parties, while already this season more than 20 parties have passed through and 20 more have been definitely arranged. This, of course, does not include individuals and families who form the great majority of the travelling public.
 Bookings at the local hotels are heavier than last year. Already reservations have been made for practically every day until the end of September, which is a situation far more satisfactory than prevailed last season, gratifying as it was.
 The automobile tourists have not been so numerous to date on account of rain. Travelling on the roads has been heavy and motorists have been fewer, but from advices received from auto camps near the international boundary there are many tourists waiting to drive up the moment roads warrant it.

FACILITIES AT EASTERN END

Halifax Getting New Terminals to Facilitate Handling Business by Railway

HALIFAX, July 20.—In line with the policy of the Canadian National Railways to utilize the new ocean terminal facilities at Halifax to the best possible advantage, and to concentrate all passenger handling arrangements in a manner convenient to the travelling public, and also for economy in railway operation, a very complete set of facilities is now under construction for the care of trans-Atlantic passengers.

In designing these facilities every consideration was given to the comfort and convenience of steamship passengers of all classes. At the landing quay the passengers will be disembarked directly into a spacious assembly hall, from whence they will be passed through medical and civil inspection lines conveniently placed, and they will then be taken to a modern railway station waiting room, in which will be found all desired conveniences for obtaining tickets, exchange of foreign money, telegraph service, and conference with steamship officials. There will also be a first class dining room, together with a canteen where lunches may be obtained at a reasonable price. Representatives of various religious and welfare organizations will be stationed in the waiting room in order to give any information desired as regards the institutions they represent.

WOMEN AND CHILDREN
A very excellent feature will be the Red Cross quarters where women and children will be welcomed. In these rooms will be rest quarters, nurseries and a small canteen where tea or coffee will be served to mothers; also bright and clean toilet rooms where children may be bathed.

REDUCE TIME
It is expected that with the inauguration of these new immigration facilities, the time required to examine and pass immigrants will be reduced to a minimum. Arrangements are provided with a view of coping with a large number of immigrants, and special railway tracks are built in whereby an entire steamship special will be run directly up to the main waiting rooms with resultant convenience and despatch in embarking the passengers.

TO COMPLY WITH THE IMMIGRATION requirements, or other causes, are detained, and a fully equipped hospital with wards is also part of the service, this hospital being for passengers who may be taken ill after having left the steamer.

An attractive feature of the entire design of the facilities is that at no time will the passengers of either first, second or third class be compelled to stand in an open shed during the examination of their luggage by the Customs Department. Both the hand baggage, the heavy boxes, etc., will be inspected in warm, well-lighted rooms, where every facility will be provided for prompt and efficient inspection. From the time the passengers leave the deck of the liner until they are on board the railway train they will at no time be exposed to the outside weather. Clean and sanitary detention rooms are being arranged to care for passengers who through temporary inability

to comply with the immigration requirements, or other causes, are detained, and a fully equipped hospital with wards is also part of the service, this hospital being for passengers who may be taken ill after having left the steamer.

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NEW METHODS DETECT CRIME

Edmonton Chief of Police Tells Rotary Club of That City About Work

EDMONTON, July 20.—Chief A. G. Shute of the Edmonton police, lived up to the reputation of his force and hit the bull's eye with his address on "The Edmonton Police Force," which he delivered at the Rotary luncheon here.

"Crime is not a local or municipal matter in this age of rapid transportation. It is a national, and often international matter," said Chief Shute. "The modern, high-speed automobile has completely revolutionized both crime and its detection. In arresting criminals the police are now forced to use the most advanced scientific methods, of which radio, telephone, and telegraph are of the greatest assistance in broadcasting warnings and descriptions.

"An example of this was the way in which the 'gorilla killer,' Earle Nelson was run down. Six hours after the murders had been committed in Winnipeg, the Edmonton, and all other Canadian forces, circled every rooming house in their city with a description of the wanted man, and a warning about his methods.

CANADA'S FINE FORCES
"Canadian police forces are recognized as being among the most efficient on the American continent. At the recent convention of the Association of North-West Sheriffs and Police, the American delegates paid a warm tribute to the way in which the Canadian police handled the 'gorilla man'."

When a new man is taken on the Edmonton force, he is given a thorough training in the criminal code, first aid work, methods of dealing with the public, and crime detection. Cowardice is inexcusable, the constable is expected to face one or half a dozen armed men if the occasion arises.

MEN ARE COURAGEOUS
The conditions of courage which exist in the police force are exemplified by the heroic way in which Constable Osgood of the A.P.P. and Constable William Nixon of the Edmonton police died in doing their duty. Constable
