Staggered by vicious left hooks to the jaw toward the close of the first round and jarred frequently by Sharkey's stiff counter-wallops, Dempsey fought on and won because he refused to be beaten back or balked. He kept plunging in and breaking his opponents' guard with short right hooks. His right eye was cut and streaming blood, his lips were split but with dogged persistence which thrilled the huge throng that watched. he kept going until his great opportunity arrived and then he landed on his opponent and won the fight.

WAS FAIR BLOW

NEW YORK, July 22 (later)-Official slow motion pictures, taken during the light, show that Dempsey's disputed blow, which contributed to the victory was apparently fair. The majority of sport writers for the morning papers apparently thought it low. Charles Mathison, one of the judges, said he would report to the commission that Dempsey should be disqualified.

The eighty thousand spectators paid in something like \$1,200,000 in cash. The pictures show three blows struck to the stomach instead of one.

OLD SPEED LACKING Dempsey's old speed seemed lacking as the fight began. Younger, speedier and more clever. Sharkey outstepped and outboxed Dempsey and when he clubbed fic blows at the close of the first round the end seemed near with Sharkey as winner. It was such a first round as that against Tunney but last night he had the gameness to fight back to vic-

Dempsey kept battering and flailing at his rival, growing stronger instead of weaker as Sharkey tried hooks and uppercuts which were beaten off from the second to the sixth rounds Slashing to the best of the conflict. Dempsey directed a body attack while the other tried to fight his way clear, ripping in left and right hooks which sometimes slowed and cut Dempsey but never stopped the attack.

BULLDOG GRIT

Blood spattered from Dempsey's eye and he spat blood. Only the furious bulldog grit enabled him to hold Sharkey during the third and fourth and fifth rounds. Sharkey carried the sixth, spearng rights and lefts, but the ex-champion made a slashing finish that had Sharkey on the run at the sound of the gong. paving the way for the three short rights to the stomach and the left to the jaw which ended the bout.

WINNER PLEASED "I'm so tickled and pleased, I'm all up in a heap and don't know what to do." Dempsey said, after the fight.

Sharkey said: "I'll be fighting yet when Dempsey's got grey hairs. It is all in the game. It was just a misfortune." Tunney said if Dempsey had been away, he has come back. "I never saw him fight better."

To sum up once more, let us as the hosts of Mr. Baldwin, "work all we know to let him see the wonders of Canada, and the people, without being obliged to make speeches every time the train stops." That will be a policy of considerate courtesy for which the great English statesman, we are sure, will be profoundly grateful and the one most likely to inspire him with a desire to repeat this initial visit.

Canadian Press).-Men in India cause the State Railways in that country plenty of worry during the cholera and malaria epidemics, according to Dr. T. H. Bishop, of Calcutta, who visited Winnipeg recently in the course of his first tour of the Dominion.

Dr. Bishop is one of the chief medical officers of the India State Railways. Men have been known to disguise themselves as Purdah women in attempts to journey home while suffering from either cholera or malaria. Numerous other means of evading the medical authorities have been tried by the natives and often with disastrous results, Dr. Bishop stated.

Dr. Bishop cited last year as a case when evasion by the natives resulted in a malaria epidemic which proved so serious that it interfered with the operations of the trains as a large number of railway clerks were stricken with the


