EDMONTON, Aug. 20.—Wheat is filling and ripening under ideal conditions in almost all sections of northern and central Alberta, according to the Edmonton Journal's fourth monthly crop report, and is rapidly reaching the cutting stage to that prospects for yield are heavy and grades good.

Almost without exception all districts estimate big crops, very few anticipating an average for wheat of less than 30 bushels to the acre and a number expecting as high as 40 bushels, so that the general average should run between 30 and 35 bushels from present indications. Districts expecting as high as 49 bushels are Athabaska, Bellis, Chipman Dapp, Duffield, Frog Lake, Jeffrey, Kinuso, Pouce Coupe, Provost, Radway Centre, Shandro, Sylvan Lake and Viking, well scattered districts.




COURTEOUS ACTION OF CONSERVATIVES

BATTLEFIELD IS COMMEMORATED

Quarter Million Empire Soldiers Lost Lives Defending Menin Gate for Four Years

YPRES, Aug. 20 .- (Canadian Press)-The deadliest battlefield of the whole war is that terrain, now smiling and peaceful, which rolls away from the Menin Memorial Gate. The gate has just been dedicated by Field-Marshal Lord Plumer to the memory of 56,000 British dead who lie in nameless graves in "the Sallent."

The gate now stands in massive simplicity astride the Menin Road as it crosses the most and enters Ypres. It is surmounted by a stone lion that faces Menin, even as the British faced for four years, the battering of the German hosts. On its sides as the traveller passes through and under are huge panels, and on the panels are carved in alphabetical order the names the 56,000, among them more than 7.000 Canadians.

The long columns of names in black are most significant evidence of the warfare that went on for four years in the sodden wastes of the Salient. They are not all the dead whose graves cannot be located; many thousands more are commemorated at Tyne Cot, for instance. A quarter of a million soldiers of the Empire died in barring the roadway for four years to the Germans who, once through, would have had an almost unobstructed pathway to the Channel ports.

For four years the battle raged before the gate—a phantom gateway then. Through that gateway the Canadians went to St. Julien, there in April 1915, () to make their famed stand against the first gas attack. The enemy, never more than five miles from the gate, approached within less than a mile in the spring of 1918. Only the intense British offensive of September, 1918, removed the relentless pressure.

PLACE TO BE SHUNNED

It is said that the millions of Empire went through the gate to face the German hordes. Actually, in the daytime, it was a place to be shunned; even in the night, it was used sparingly. every hour of the day and night throughout those four years, the gate lay within range of and under fire from the enemy's guns.

From this gate you look out on a farmland stretching to distant ridges, From outside, you look into an old town that is new; even the ruined Cloth Hall loses some of its antiquity in the maze of scaffolding that surrounds and supports it.

During the war, you would have whom not one could be seen; marked by bursting shell and, at night, ringed in flame. You would have looked inside on a wrecked town, dominated by the ruined Cloth Hall tower.

From the gate stretched the Menin Road, a ghastly highway. Pock-marked that, riddled with shrapnel and rifle bullets; recking with asphyxiating gas had not cost, of British and German together, more lives than there were stones in its make-up.

SYNOPSIS OF

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occapation, .nd improvement for agricultural

Full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land." copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Gov-

ernment Agent. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be

received For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland,

for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands." Mill, factory, or industrial sites on

timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 29 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled

LEASES For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers,

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
