Bp "them" he means the people who regard the theatre as an interlude between a dinner and a dance-the people who go to the theatre in the hope of being excited by sensationalism or by sexuality.

"An appetite grows by what it feeds on," he continued. "There is danger of the British stage becoming a sink of sexuality. To be successful every new play has to go a bit further. The thing works in a vicious circle."

"In the provinces," he said, "there are not so many difficulties to contend with. The Little Theatre gets known. It enters into the life of the town.
