Fleet Returns to Banks After Big Storm Which Threatened Destruction

SEWARD, February 28 .- Singing chanties of victory, Alaska's halibut fleet, with a thousand men aboard, again winged its way to the open sea last night after a two-day battle with a storm which for a time threatened to take a greedy toll of lives. Only the sudden cessation of the tempest saved the fleet from destruction. Caught in the full force of the gale's onslaught as it swept out of the north across the Gulf of Alaska on Friday, 270 halibut boats struggled for hours toward ports of safety while the storm-lashed waves swept over their decks. Just as hope began to be abandoned that many

storm subsided at noon on Saturday just as unexpectedly as it had arisen. WAS KILLED IN revealing a sea littered with battered and damaged craft. The majority of the vessels were bereft of their gear.

The boats, which had limped into Seward Saturday night, many with their dories gone, speedily outfitted here for another dash to the banks.

During the two day storm, shipping along the southeastern Alaskan coast was virtually at a standstill. Considerable damage was done along the waterfront of Seward where the waves picked up small boats and tossed them about the bay. The damage to the halibut fleet is likely to run into many thousands of dollars.

A great calm prevailed last night over the lately storm-swept area.

QUEEN WRITES HER NAME ON FARMHOUSE WINDOW AT SANDRINGHAM

LONDON, Feb. 28 .- Queen Mary, with fond recollections of her girlhood, has written her name with a diamond on a window pane of a Tudor farmhouse in the little old village of Walpole St. Peter which makes no effort to keep up with the times and for years has been gradually slipping backward.

The house is known as the Dovecote Farm, a Sixteenth century building restored by the Rev. H. Staveley, curate at Sandringham from 1902 to 1906, and for years a friend of the Royal Family. The window is in the rector's study, a room very much admired by the Queen during a recent visit. Dovecote Farm is opposite the ancient Church of St. Peter. As far as the public is aware this is the first time Queen Mary has ever done anything of the kind although the practice of writing on glass was repeatedly adopted in earlier times.







Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.


