FORMER LOCAL MAN WINS BIG PRIZE

TROOPS FIRE ON CROWD IN RIOTS AT TAMPA, FLORIDA

Riot in Tampa Ends in Death of Four Persons as Troops Fire on Mob

RIOTERS TRIED TO RUSH JAIL WHERE CONFESSED MURDERER WAS CONFINED BUT WERE REPULSED; CANADIAN A VICTIM

TAMPA, Florida, June 2.—Rioting broke out here as the result of an effort of a mob to rush the city jail. Troops were called out and were greeted with taunts and flying projectiles and later were fired upon by the mob. They returned the fire with machine guns and during the melee four people were killed and many wounded. Civilians are said to have been struck by bullets from several blocks from the jail.

Officials said last night that the violence resulted in four deaths including that of Hugh McRae of Fort William, Ontario. The

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE IS COMING HERE

DOMINION ORGANIZATION TO SPEND MOST OF DAY AT THIS PORT FOLLOWING CONVENTION

The Canadian Chamber of Commerce, the central organization comprising delegates from all the chambers of commerce and boards of trade throughout the country, will visit Prince Rupert on or about September 22, and will be here for lunch and dinner that day, leaving for the East at nine o'clock in the evening.

The big meeting is to be held at Vancouver, a special train being run all the way from Montreal, picking up delegates as it crosses the continent. The convention date is September 12 to 14 and it is expected to be one of the great events of the year from the business standpoint.

Following the convention, the party will embark on one of the Canadian Pacific steamers for Skagway and will stop off here on the return, leaving the boat at this point and proceeding to spend a holiday at Jasper Park.

While here the chamber will undoubtedly be entertained by the Prince Rupert Board of Trade and some big things are in prospect for the occasion. The matter is likely to be discussed among other things at the Board of Trade meeting tomorrow night.

NOMINATIONS IN OKANAGAN

K. C. MACDONALD WILL TRY TO REGAIN SEAT LOST AT BY-ELECTION

VERNON, June 2.—William Farris Kennedy, Conservative, and Hon. Kenneth C. MacDonald, Liberal, were nominated yesterday to contest the North Okanagan election made necessary by the death of the late A. O. Cochrane. The election is to take place next Thursday.

The campaign promises to be a keen one and both sides are claiming victory for their candidate. Mr. MacDonald formerly was member for the district but was defeated at a by-election for entry to the cabinet.

NANKING, June 2.—The Nationalist Government set up here by the moderate wing under General Chiang Kai Shek protested to Premier Tatakouja against the landing of two thousand Japanese troops yesterday at Tsingtao preparatory to advancing into Shangtung province.

PITTSBURG LOST ANOTHER MATCH

TROOPS INTO NORTH CHINA

BRITISH, JAPANESE AND AMERICAN FORCES MOVING FROM SHANGHAI TO TIENTSIN

PEKING, June 2.—The despatch of United States marines from Shanghai to Tientsin is a part of the British, Japanese and United States decision to increase garrison in the northern section of the country, following the retreat of the northern armies who have made what is deemed a strategic move to the Yellow River before the drive of the Nationalists. With two thousand Japanese troops already landed at Tsingtao, a British contingent is now enroute northward from Hong Kong and the Shanghai defence force is leaving for Tientsin tonight.

MINER TRIES TO SUICIDE

ROBERT BENSON ONE OF THE FIRST GOLD SEEKERS TO REACH ALASKA, PENNSYLVANIA

SAN FRANCISCO, June 2.—Robert Benson, one of the first to reach Alaska at the time of the Klondike rush, attempted to commit suicide here yesterday on account of poverty and old age.

The police said he had been living in Sutoro Forest, a dense wood between the city and the beach for the past week, because of lack of funds with which to pay his hotel bill. They added that he would be taken to a relief home upon recovery.

HOLLAND HIT BY CYCLONE

FORTY PERSONS KILLED, 150 INJURED AND MUCH PROPERTY DAMAGE IS DONE

AMSTERDAM, June 2.—Forty persons were killed, 150 were injured, and enormous damage was done by a cyclonic storm which swept parts of Holland and Belgium. Three villages—Neade, Groenlo and Delden—were devastated and nine others were extensively damaged. The wind tore roofs from houses and uprooted trees and a number of buildings, weakened by the storm, collapsed.

TORNADO UNROOFS HOUSES IN KANSAS

Dodge City Sustained \$6,000 Damage in Big Wind Which Swept Through the Town This Morning

DODGE CITY, Kansas, June 2.—Twenty-seven houses were unroofed and more than fifty were damaged when a tornado swept through the northern part of the city this morning, causing damage estimated at \$6,000.

Fighter Dies in Ring from Broken Neck in Fourth Round Against Mandell, Kansas City

KANSAS CITY, June 2.—Collapsing in the second round of a scheduled ten round bout with Sammy Mandell, lightweight champion of the world, Steve Adams of Chicago died in the ring here last night.

The county coroner announced after an autopsy, that death resulted from a broken neck. Mandell was booked by the police on a technical charge and released under a five thousand dollar bond.

Before the autopsy, Referee Walter Bates declared that all Mandell's blows were clean and expressed the opinion that the challenger died of heart attack.

BATHING BEAUTY CONTESTS

The elimination of bathing beauty contests in Vancouver and at other centres as part of the Jubilee celebration is probably a wise move. These contests are not in the best interests of the young people of today and tend to over-emphasize the physical development and sex development craze of the age. Bathing is a wonderfully healthy and stimulating recreation but for girls to strip in order to be looked at, is a totally different thing. We are glad to know that no such proposal has been made in Prince Rupert.

The employee who thinks the business can't go on without him probably does not realize that the head office is probably hoping he will fire himself.

THE STEAMSHIP COMBINE ON PACIFIC

The pleasing methods of the North Atlantic Shipping Conference, from which Canada has suffered on various occasions, are now being extended to the North Pacific. The rapid growth of Vancouver as a port has been largely the result of the amount of free shipping of which it has been able to avail itself. There has in consequence been free competition; and Vancouver has profited by rates a good deal lower than those which the North Atlantic combine have been able to impose on the Atlantic. It could be predicted with certainty that once the shipping trade out of Vancouver assumed large proportions, the shipping combine would attempt to control it, for the purpose of laying additional toll upon it. The time, in the judgment of the allied shipowners, has now arrived.

There has been in existence for some years a Northern Pacific Conference, made up of United States, Japanese, Canadian and British steamship companies; but it is only now beginning to adopt the methods of the Atlantic Conference of which there was a charming manifestation a few months ago when it levied staggering increases upon Canadian agricultural and industrial exports to Europe. True to the example thus set, the North Pacific Conference looked around to find some thriving and growing Canadian export trade, strong enough to be made to stand and deliver. Such a business was found in the Canadian flour export trade to Japan and China. This trade has been growing for years; and at present with a good-sized British army stationed in China, the demand for Canadian flour is likely to grow. The combine marked down the flour trade as a victim; and proceeded to inform it as to the terms upon which it would be allowed to continue to do business in the Orient.

ULTIMATUM TO SHIPPERS

The rate on flour from Vancouver to China ports, fixed by free competition, is \$5.50 a ton. This is not enough for the combine, which has figured out that the flour business is profitable enough to enable an increase in the levy of about 30 per cent.—if the competition of tramps can be eliminated. It has therefore delivered an ultimatum to the Canadian flour shippers. It will continue the present rate of \$5.50 for six months longer—six months is not a very long time—provided the flour shippers agree to give ships belonging to the Conference all their shipments to Asiatic ports. Otherwise the charge will be \$7.00 a ton. If the shippers accept the terms they may safely count upon the rate going to \$7 in six months, by which time the independent lines which have been competing for the flour traffic would be frozen out. The proposition has been put up boldly to the Canadian flour mills without any pretence or camouflage; the shipping companies are out to put these mills in a position that they can ship only to the Orient in their ships and at such rates as they choose to impose.

The proposed transaction is a typical illustration of Conference methods. The people of Canada ought to realize more acutely than they do the danger to this country which arises from their defencelessness against the exaction of an organization which periodically checks over Canadian export trade to see if there is not an opportunity for shoving up shipping rates to a higher notch. The fact that this may check Canadian export business and result in this country losing markets which it has taken years and a vast expenditure of time and money to obtain does not mean much to the Conference; it is prepared to take a chance since, if it guesses wrong and kills the traffic by its exactions, the loss will be borne chiefly by Canada. This is a matter to which the Canadian Government cannot be indifferent. It cannot control ocean rates. It has no influence with the Conference. But it can see that Canadian export trade is not put out of business by extortionate shipping rates. A couple of ships of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, plying between Vancouver and Shanghai, would put an effectual stop to the monopoly projects of the Northern Pacific shipping combine.—Manitoba Free Press.

OPTIMISM AT B.C. SILVER

CHAIRMAN OF SELUKWE GOLD MINING AND FINANCE CORPORATION SPEAKS OF STEWART MINE

SIMILAR TO PREMIER

RICH STRIKE OF ORE MENTIONED SHOWING THERE IS ANOTHER BIG MINE IN PROSPECT

Great optimism in regard to operations on the extension up Premier Mountain of the rich ore zone of the Premier mine, was evidenced by Cromwell Hackley, chairman of Selukwe Gold Mining & Finance Co., London, at the annual meeting. He indicated that the opinion is held that both B.C. Silver and National Silver, sometimes referred to as Selukwe and Sebakwe, respectively, will work out as rich mines as the Premier.

This company owns Kafue Copper Co., which is carrying on the only large size alluvial operations in B.C. and in summarizing the situation, the chairman said:

"The B.C. Silver Mines, Ltd., has established, by reason of its own work, confirmed by that of the Premier and Selukwe Companies, that it has the potentialities of becoming a great ore-producing mine. The work to the south (the Premier) however reluctantly it may have been undertaken by our great neighbor, conclusively establishes, as shown by exploration on their fifth level, that massive ore bodies exist in the Oakville Fraction Claim, 700 feet below our workings. Again, the finding of \$20 ore 2,500 feet and more to the north in the fourth level of the B.C. Silver and on the same horizon on the Sebakwe ground indicates that the pay formation is not confined to some particular geological structure pertinent only to the Premier properties."

DICTATE TERMS

The chairman's remarks about "our great neighbor's" reluctance, etc., can best be understood when it is pointed out that Premier have a 38% interest in B.C. Silver and have certainly not fallen over themselves in assisting in the exploration work. Premier would like to have B.C. and National Silver groups, and undoubtedly all these will amalgamate, but the better the showings on these properties, the better terms they will be able to dictate on the Consolidation.

Chairman Hackley's remarks on each operation will be of importance. "The Sebakwe Company (National Silver operation) notwithstanding that they only commenced work a year ago and are operating at one single point, have completed something like 3,000 feet of development work. They had the good fortune to encounter a 40-ft. ore zone of similar geological structure to those being worked upon by the B.C. and Premier Companies. It does not outcrop, and its existence was not suspected. It is not the ore body to exploit which the tunnel was driven, and in fact, it is proved that that ore body does not exist in the Sebakwe property at this horizon. The Sebakwe Company is installing electrical traction and hoist, so that not only is the desire to be up to date, but the management is most anxious to get on. Though I guaranteed to find \$100,000 only for working capital for the Sebakwe Company, twice that amount has been provided, so development on the present scale can go along comfortably for some time to come."

B.C. SILVER MINES

"Turning to the B.C. developments, (Selukwe) at the time of last year's meeting shareholders will recall that we had just begun to sink the winze between the 'C' and 'D' ore bodies on the third level. This work is completed and is now known as the No. 1 shaft. It is constructed in an exceptional and careful manner, to be used for hauling ore as well as for development. The rock encountered was very hard and progress correspondingly slow. Its vertical depth below the third level is 170 feet, about 500 feet of driving has been drilled at the fourth level, practically all in ore of fair grade, indicating that the massive formation encountered in the level above persists. The fissured zone is exceedingly well mineralized, the best values being \$93 over seven feet. We trust these finds dispose of the fable that values would not be encountered below 600 or so feet vertical from the surface. The remaining exploration consisted in driving northwards beyond the great dyke. Though no special values were found, there exists a mineralized zone about 200 feet in width, indicating great tonnage possibilities if a low treatment cost some day becomes possible and further work at a lower level yields enriched values. We hope to secure further information on this subject during the current year."

TOURIST TRADE STARTING AGAIN

COAST STEAMSHIPS START SUMMER SERVICES THIS MONTH TO NORTH.

The month of June will once again see tourist traffic through Prince Rupert in full swing. Special summer schedules on steamship lines plying in and out of the port will shortly come into force.

Next Monday, the Canadian Pacific steamer Princess Louise will open the tourist season for that company on her arrival from Vancouver enroute to Alaska. She will be followed on the

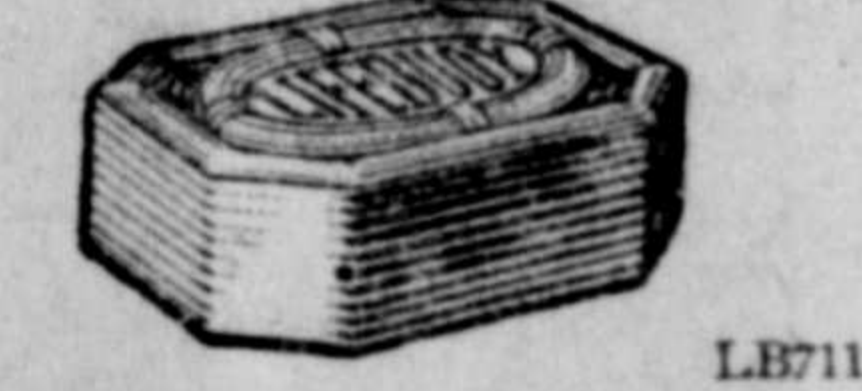

EARNINGS OF C.N. RAILWAY

INCREASE SHOWN IN GROSS TAKINGS NEARLY OFFSET BY OPERATING INCREASES

MONTREAL, June 2.—Increases of \$1,497,833.75, or 7.29 per cent in gross earnings, and \$57,219.47, or 2.75 per cent in net earnings are shown by the operating summary for the Canadian National Railways during the month of April, 1927, as compared with April of last year.

Working expenses during the month of April, 1927, increased by \$1,422,614.28, or 8.11 per cent, and the operating ratio for the month was 87.09 per cent as against 86.51 in April, 1926. The working expenses for the period relatively reflect increases in rates of pay and greater activity in maintenance of way work, the latter being due to climatic and other conditions generally favoring an earlier start on the season's work in certain localities. There is an improvement in net earnings notwithstanding the fact that the month of April, 1926, and the four months period of last year represent the best previous system performance.

For the first four months of the present calendar year, gross earnings of the Canadian National System are shown to be \$94,289,166, an increase of \$4,963,189.37, or 5.36 per cent over the earnings for the corresponding period of 1926. During the period working expenses increased by \$4,509,648.67 or 6.52 per cent over those for the first four months of 1926.

FEED IS STRONG

The strawberry season is now on in full swing, first shipments of Washington berries—the Clark Seeding variety—having arrived.

Rhubarb from Terrace is coming in plentifully now. The price is four pounds for 25c and the quality is good.

The sugar market is firm at present prices with advances expected. Eastern markets advanced twenty per cent per hundred about ten days ago but that advance has not yet been followed by British Columbia refiners.

The old potato market is the subject of much speculation at this time, the situation having taken a complete reversal since last report. It is feared that the stocks on hand in the province today will not meet the demand until the price of the delayed crop of new potatoes is reasonable enough for ordinary demand.

Old beets are now cleaned up but new bunch beets are plentiful, the tops of which are good enough to boil. The price is two bunches for 25c.

Cabbage is scarce and very high at present. Never in the past ten years has the price soared so high.

The wheat market is advancing steadily and bears out predictions made in the last market report. Flour has advanced 50c per barrel in the past two weeks and may go higher any day.

MANY CHILDREN LEPER PARENTS

KALAUPAPA, Island of Molokai, Hawaii, June 1.—The children of leper parents here in the Hawaiian leper colony are fairly sure they will never have the dread disease, and almost equally sure they will never know their parents.

About a dozen children are born here each year. Inmates of this settlement on Kalawao peninsula—a natural prison hemmed in by the sea and precipice—live much as their kindfolk of the outside world. They have their own government and churches; they marry and bring children into the world. But the children are taken from them at the moment of birth.

The new-born infants are placed in the hands of non-leper attendants who take them to the special nursery in the colony's hospital compound. There they live the first year of life under the close observation of the doctor who guards the health of the settlement's 523 patients.

Each Sunday mothers are permitted to see their children—to see them only. A thick pane of glass separates them from the cribs. The mothers may watch one hour—or more. Then they leave to be replaced by other mothers, who watch for another brief period.

When babies are able to walk they

are given final examinations for health and if they pass, as they usually do, they are moved to Honolulu to be placed in orphanages or with relatives.

If the parents still are alive after the children are grown or at least fourteen or fifteen years old, the children may visit the colony, but in most cases the children never return.

This system has been in effect several years and only one baby has ever contracted leprosy.



MANLESS TRACTOR IS LATEST INVENTION FOR PRAIRIE FARMER

LINCOLN, Neb., June 1.—A "manless" tractor, controlled by an electric device, plowed a field successfully recently before a crowd of farmers, professors of agriculture and businessmen.

Unguided by human hand, except when the first furrow was plowed to make a guide row, the machine, equipped with an automatic guide invented by F. L. Zibach, of Grand Island, Neb., plowed a 20-acre field.
