



FEED IS STRONG

The strawberry season is now on in full swing, first shipments of Washington berries-the Clark Seedling varietyhaving arrived. These are in full pint boxes and are meeting good demand at 35c per basket. Prices will be lower shortly unless the weather turns wet. Rhubarb from Terrace is coming in plentifully now. The price is four pounds for 25c and the quality is good. This line has almost entirely displaced apples, which are out of reach and very scarce, as a dessert food.

The sugar market is firm at present prices with advances expected. Eastern markets advanced twenty per cent per hundred about ten days ago but that advance has not yet been followed by British Columbia refiners.

The old potato market is the subject of much speculation at this time, the situation having taken a complete redemand. Consumers should protect
