PRE-EMPTIONS

Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age. by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occapation, and improvement for agricultural

Full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, 'How to Pre-empt Land," copies o which can be obtained free of charge ty addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be For more detailed information see

Applications are received for pur-Crown lands, not being timberland for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grasing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further in formation regarding purchase or lease Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and

Lease of Crown Lands." Mill, factory, or industrial sites of timber land, not exceeding 40 acres. may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20

acres, may be leased as homestes. conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and im provement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed LEASES




All Trades, Businesses and Professions must be registered before April 30th.

Notice is hereby given that, pursuant to sub-section of Section 52B of the Taxation Act, every person who engage in, carries on, or practices any Trade, Business or Professio within the Province is required to obtain from the Commit sioner of Income Tax a Certificate of Registration before April 30th, 1927. Application should be made to any Province Assessor, from whom full information may be obtained. Certificates will be issued without the payment of any fee therefor.

Default in complying with the provisions of this section renders the person liable, upon summary conviction, to a fine of \$10.00 for each day during which his default continues.

Application forms may be obtained from any Provincial Assessor, Government Agent, Provincial Police Officer, or from the Commissioner of Income Tax, Victoria, B.C.
