

THEN CAME TURN FOR BETTER

The turn for the better came with the beginning of the production of aeroplane spruce in the neighborhood. There was a revival which was followed later by the building of ships and the consequent big steady payroll. That ended and gloom once more pervaded the city and with many the gloom has remained.

Today, however, Prince Rupert has attained a more stable condition. The old ideas of immediate wealth through speculation has gone for good and in its place has come a realization that every dollar obtained must first be earned. We are working our way to a better condition. Fish prices have been stabilized, wheat shipments are made through a government elevator, the shipyard works more or less steadily and business with the district is developing. Gradually changes are coming about, a new mill is to be built ,commencing at once, and other good things are in the offing as aids in the march of progress.

FILTER THAT WILL PROTECT AGAINST TROUBLE

While W. R. Allen, on the gasboat 'Smiles," and Richard Emery, of another small trolling boat were fishing for the elusive king salmon, and were anchored at night they used to discuss methods of improving gasboating, and from these talks evolved a "filter" or 'settler" for which they have asked a patent, says the Ketchikan Chronicle.

Allen made one trip to Washington, D.C., in the interests of the new device and has put all of his money into it prove a necessity.

It is a new kind of "trap" and "indicator" for catching the dirt and water between the gasoline tanks and the engine. A good many gasboats utilize old pipe of some kind and others have an old pipe of some kind and others have a bronze trap. The advantage of the one perfected by Allen and Emery over the others, it is claimed, is due to the fact that it is constructed of heavy glass and the operator can see at any time just what quantity of sediment is

Unless a trap is drained regularly it gets full and the muck and water are then carried to the engine, and the engineer then mixes "sulphur" in his language about gasboat engines in general and his own in particular. Or possibly the feed pipe becomes clogged and his language is no less emphatic.

The glass for the new device is extra heavy in order that it cannot be broken with anything short of a sledge hammer, and the inventors believe that it will greatly lessen the troubles of gasboat men.





Increase in Number of Horses This Past Year to 61,158 in British Calumbia

Conditions of the live stock industry of British Columbia in regard to breedng, feeding, marketing, and in respect to prices received, have shown improvement during 1926 according to the report of Dr. A. Wright, live stock commissioner and chief veterinary inspecmade public by Hon. E. D. Barrow, minister of agriculture.


