WARD AGAINST STAGE COMPANY

JANE BRADSHAW LOSES HER
DOLLAR BUT GETS TIDY
MONETARY REIMBURSEMENT

VANCOUVER, Feb. 25.—Damages of \$22,000 were awarded by a Supreme Court jury yesterday in favor of Jane Bradshaw and her daughter, against the British Columbia Transit Co., Ltd., for injuries sustained while they were passengers on the company's buses which were between this city and New Westminster. In a defence statement, the company admitted its liability for the accident here on December 7, 1925, in which the two women, who were the mother and daughter respectively of Chief Justice Bradshaw of one of the neighboring municipalities, received injuries necessitated the daughter giving up her career as a professional singer. Bradshaw claimed \$25,000 and awarded \$17,000, the mother being awarded \$5,000.

TERRACE WANTS ROAD TO RUPERT

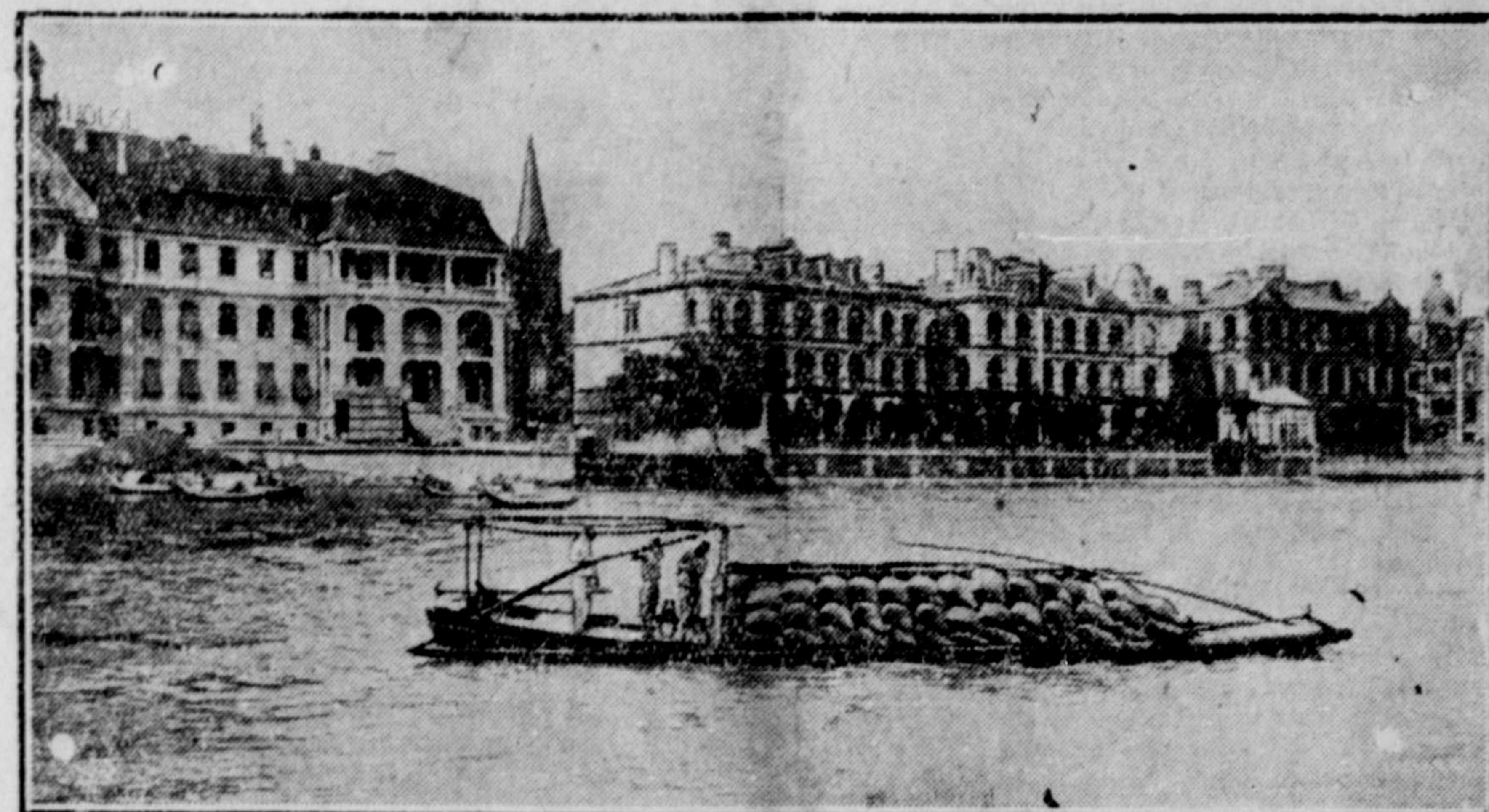
PROJECT ENDORSED AT MEETING OF
BOARD OF TRADE—A. H. BARKER
NAMED TREASURER

TERRACE, Feb. 25.—A meeting of the board of trade was held in the Terrace on Tuesday evening with J. K. Barker, president, in the chair. By-laws were adopted. It was decided to appoint a separate treasurer and A. H. Barker was elected to the office. J. B. Agar retaining the chairmanship. The annual membership fee was set at five dollars. The president was authorized to appoint standing committees. The meeting endorsed the Prince Rupert road project and the secretary was directed to write the proper authorities asking that the work on the road from Terrace be pushed ahead and that a start be made on the road from Terrace to the coast.

BLACK BEAR'S TRIAL DELAYS

DISCREPANCY BETWEEN COUNSEL
THREATENS TO CONSIDERABLY
LENGTHEN HEARING

PRINCE RUPERT, Feb. 25.—Beset with projected legal bickerings, the trial of the Bates, better known as "Black Bear" on a mail robbery charge, gives indications that it will not be concluded until late next week. The latest delay came yesterday when the prosecution defence clashed on the admissibility of evidence of Arthur Denny, an intermediate revenue collector. The defence contended that information obtained by the collector in the performance of his duties was not acceptable to the court. Judgment of the court was taken so late that the judge might obtain advice on the question.

BENNETT NEW TORY LEADER?

ALL SIGNS POINT TO HIM AS
CHOICE AT NATIONAL CON-
VENTION THIS YEAR

(Special to Daily News)
OTTAWA, Feb. 25.—All signs point to the selection of Hon. R. B. Bennett of Calgary West as Dominion leader of the Conservative party at the national convention to be held in Winnipeg in October. Notwithstanding the fact that Hon. Hugh Guthrie is the nominal House Leader of the party at the present time, it is Mr. Bennett who is the real spokesman in the House. It was he who responded, on behalf of his party, to the budget speech last week. He complimented the minister of finance on the clearness and fairness of the document but he also questioned its effectiveness in really reducing the Canadian tax bill. Mr. Bennett is unquestionably the most outstanding man as far as the political activities of the party today are concerned. His record as a former minister of justice and for a brief time last year as minister of finance qualify him for the highest honor his party can bestow upon him. His ability and political sagacity is unquestioned. Furthermore, he comes from the west where it is essential that the Conservatives must retrieve their political fortunes and he is universally popular with members of the party from the Pacific to the Atlantic coasts.

WILL ADMIT WOMEN AS SYNOD MEMBERS

VICTORIA, Feb. 25.—Women will be admitted as members of the Anglican Synod in British Columbia with the restriction that "in every parish at least fifty per cent of the elected representatives shall consist of male communicants." It was decided at the annual meeting of the synod here yesterday. The admission of women to the synod has been a vexed question for several years and, at times, has caused some strong feeling.

LONGSHOREMAN KILLED WHEN SLINGLOAD FALLS

Pat Flaherty Killed and William Smith,
Less Seriously Injured, When
Iron Falls into Hold

VANCOUVER, Feb. 25.—Two longshoremen were injured, one fatally, when a sling load of scrap iron, being loaded on to the steamer Belcher here, fell into the hold yesterday. Pat Flaherty died ten hours later in hospital where it is said that his companion, William Smith, is expected to recover.

Customs Commission Given Recommendation with View to Abolish Liquor Export

WINNIPEG, February 25.—Recommendations which, if concurred in by the Royal Commission investigating the customs, will mean the abolition of the liquor export houses in British Columbia were made today by Hon. N. W. Rowell, K.C., counsel for the commission. Basing his recommendations on a large number of findings which he asked the commission to make, Mr. Rowell recommended the enactment of federal legislation which would render impossible the continuance of export houses. He asked that licenses or bonds of the Consolidated Exporters of British Columbia and all its branches, the Jos. Kennedy Co., the Commercial Bonding Co., the B.C. Distilleries, and the B.C. Brewers be not renewed. In addition, Mr. Rowell asked the commission to recommend that evidence as to the violation of the Criminal Code by the said companies and their officials "be forwarded to the Attorney General of the province of British Columbia and to the minister of justice for appropriate action." Other recommendations providing for the collection of arrears in income and sales taxes from the companies included in the auditor's statement were made.

Situation in Shanghai Still Tense as Northern Troops Are Forced to Retreat Into City

SHANGHAI, February 25.—The defenders of the foreign settlement of Shanghai remained alert on Friday to prevent native incursions from the opposing Chinese forces struggling for possession of the city. The armies continued to concentrate and volunteers of a machine gun company were mobilized this morning and held in readiness while British troops paraded with two six-inch motorized howitzers along the Bund. More Northern Chinese troops arrived this morning and it is estimated that eight thousand in addition will be in the city by tonight. The Northern forces have retreated to Sung Kiang, only 28 miles from Shanghai.

Would Buy Land Back from Yellow People and Ship Them Away

ATTORNEY GENERAL DENOUNCES TREATY THAT MAKES
IT IMPOSSIBLE TO LIMIT EMPLOYMENT
OF JAPANESE AND CHINESE

VICTORIA, February 25.—Declaring that the Japanese treaty made the bill limiting the employment of Orientals ultra vires, Attorney General Manson said in the Legislature on Thursday that the Dominion government should be asked to denounce the treaty and to take every step to prevent the further influx of Orientals into British Columbia. Mr. Manson was speaking on the bill of C. F. Davie, Conservative member for Cowichan-Newcastle, which would exclude Orientals from various occupations. This bill passed its second reading but another bill by Mr. Davie to exclude Orientals from public schools of the province was defeated. Members of the government voted against both bills on the ground that they were ultra vires. After pointing out that the natural rate of increase of Orientals exceeded that of white residents of the province, Mr. Manson said, "I believe we should take all property owned by Orientals, pay them a fair compensation and transport them all to other climes. The expense would be enormous. It would run into millions but it should be borne by all of Canada. The people of Canada should consider taking this step before it is too late."

ADZICK CASE COMMITTALS

FORMER DEPUTY ATTORNEY
GENERAL OF ALBERTA AND
WIFE ARE SENT UP

EDMONTON, Feb. 25.—Hugh C. McDonald, K.C., former deputy general of the province of Alberta, and Mrs. Margaret (Peggy) Adzick were committed for trial here yesterday by Magistrate Primrose, on charges of wounding Veko Adzick in a brawl at his home in the Adzick Apartments, 102nd Street, on New Year's Eve. On the stand, in the course of the preliminary trial, Adzick testified that he had heard McDonald shout to Mrs. Adzick to kill him as he lay on the floor writhing in pain from a number of knife wounds inflicted by his wife. The case, which has caused a sensation here, will be followed with interest to the higher court. It was known that McDonald was involved but it was hardly thought he would be committed. The prosecution called every witness to the affray, as well as those who were alleged to have been at the party before the actual stabbing, with the possible exception of Thomas G. Livingstone, who is now at Fort Saskatchewan jail serving a month's sentence on a charge of padding the payroll of the North-western Utilities, Ltd. and who is alleged by the police to have been at the celebration.

FOUND IN SEWER PIPE UNDER
MAIN STREET, VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, Feb. 25.—The body of Alick Chernmenoff, aged 10, who was last seen alive on Sunday when he went to play near an open sewer on the False Creek flats near the Canadian National Railway station, was found late on Thursday in a sewer conduit under Main Street by police officers. The body was lodged against sacks which prevented it from being swept out to the open water of False Creek beyond.

LITTLE INTEREST IN BY-ELECTION

ONLY DOZEN VOTERS TURNED OUT
DURING FIRST HOUR THIS
MORNING

Little interest was being taken in the civic election in the early part of the day. E. F. Jones is returning officer and Frank Vickers and W. E. Willis-croft are acting as deputies. Jas Hampton and P. Lanza were acting as scrutineers for P. H. Linzey this morning and J. Allen for Jas. Black. At the counting of the ballots this evening H. O. Crewe, H. Collison, J. Allen and Jas. Hampton will act as poll clerks in totaling up the number of ballots cast for each candidate. The first hour of voting this morning brought out only about a dozen voters. There seemed to be a little more interest taken in the election towards noon and, in the early afternoon, cars were busy carrying voters to the polls. At 1:30 this afternoon over 200 had cast their ballots with a fairly steady procession of voters appearing as the weather cleared up. It is expected that there will be around 600 cast their ballots before the poll closes tonight at 8 o'clock.

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LIQUOR OUTFIT OFFERS TO QUIT

UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT CAN-
NOT, HOWEVER, COME TO AN

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 25.—The San Francisco Examiner says that the Consolidated Exporters of Canada offered to quit alleged rum running activities and relinquish claims to two ships seized by United States officials on condition that the government drop all indictments against officials of the company which offer the United States government refused. The seized ships are the Coal Harbor and the Quadra. Income tax due on illicit liquor profits was the rock on which the proposal was wrecked although the offer included the promise to turn over to the Canadian government \$2,000,000 worth of liquor ready for shipment, the paper says.

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ELECTION LOOKS LIKE ONLY REMEDY.

It is generally admitted that the present session of the British Columbia Legislature is turning out to be one of the most bitter and unproductive on record. As far as one party at least is concerned, the proceedings have resolved themselves into nothing more than a political game with not a thought for the welfare of the province or the cost to the people. Everything seems to be fair game and not an opportunity is being neglected that might present a means for destructive criticism or political capital. It is beginning to appear that the only remedy will be an early appeal to the people so that things may be brought back to a sound and sober basis where it may be possible for the government to attend to the people's business and not have to spend so much of its time in defending itself from virulose and unscrupulous attack.

PRESIDENT COOLIDGE'S DISARMAMENT PROPOSALS.

It is not surprising that England should have welcomed President Coolidge's proposals of further disarmament by extending the Washington naval ratios to the classes of vessels not covered in 1921. These are vessels of 10,000 tons and under, which of course include light cruisers, destroyers and submarines, etc. At present no limit is placed by treaty on the number of these classes of vessels that may be constructed.

If the United States proposals are not ratified by the Powers, Britain will undoubtedly continue with the naval construction program adopted by the Labor government in 1924, which extends until 1930. In these six years the nations will have spent £64,000,000 on new vessels. The program calls for 18 new warships this year.

It is understood that the navy estimates for 1927-28 have now been drafted. In view of the large volume of new construction in hand, and of the fact that 18 more vessels are to be laid down in the coming financial year, the estimates will probably be heavier than those for the present financial year, which amount to £58,100,000.

It is expected that the personnel of the navy, which now stands at 103,125 officers and men, will be slightly expanded to meet the manning requirements of the numerous vessels that will soon be entering service.

During the new fiscal year it is proposed to begin work on three cruisers, one of which will be of 10,000 and the other two of 8,000 tons, nine destroyers and six submarines, representing a total cost of £9,650,000.

VOTE FOR NEW CONSTRUCTION.

The vote for new construction, including preliminary work on these vessels and progress with other ships already building, will reach £10,723,000. Including ships covered by the 1927-28 estimates, the following new vessels have been provided for since March, 1924, when the first post-war building program was adopted by the Labor government:

12 cruisers of 10,000 tons; 3 cruisers of 8,000 tons; 11 destroyers; 12 submarines; 4 gunboats; 2 depot ships; 55,000 ton floating dock for the new base at Singapore.

The total cost of this new tonnage will be at least £41,000,000. Further, the government's program provides for the construction of the following additional vessels between 1928 and 1930:

Six cruisers, one aircraft carrier, 18 destroyers, 12 submarines, and three auxiliary craft at a cost of approximately £23,000,000.

DOES NOT INFRINGE WASHINGTON TREATY.

The new construction undertaken since 1924 does not infringe the letter of the Washington Treaty, which applies only to capital ships and aircraft carriers and places no limit on the building of cruisers and smaller craft, except that 10,000 tons is the limit of displacement. Nevertheless, the construction of so many cruisers and submarines in Great Britain and other countries during the past few years explains the anxiety of the United States to have the Treaty extended to all classes of naval tonnage, or otherwise Uncle Sam must follow suit.

TELLS OF HIS MISSION WORK

CANON RUSHBROOK WAS INTERESTING SPEAKER BEFORE ROTARY CLUB YESTERDAY

Canon W. F. Rushbrook, who has been in charge of the Anglican mission boat service in this neighborhood for over twenty years, related some interesting incidents of his work before the Rotary Club at the luncheon yesterday.

In a new country like this, Canon Rushbrook said, the backward look was sometimes as interesting as the forward look. A little over 21 years ago, he said he had first visited the harbor of Prince Rupert and found it then full of whales. Some of these were immense creatures measuring over eighty feet in length and it was indeed a picturesque sight to watch them. On the first Sunday after the opening of the post office here he had held a church service down on the waterfront in a mess house and, on that day, too, the harbor seemed to be full of these immense whales, which had not visited the harbor in recent years. The speaker then told of an interesting picnic held at Shawatlans which was attended by people from Port Essington.

The change which had transpired during the last twenty years was as noticeable along the Skeena River and other places outside Prince Rupert as in the city. At Essington in the fall of the year, when the Indians loaded their canoes with supplies to return home after the fishing season, there were many picturesque sights. The Chinamen then wore their pigtailed and it was indeed an interesting sight to watch the arrival of the body of a dead Chinaman at Essington. The remains were showered with bits of paper, which it was believed would keep away the evil spirits. The body was interred with sides of pork or chickens. Late in the fall, after the fishing season, the bones were recovered and boiled before being shipped to China.

RAILWAY MADE CHANGES

The building of the railway brought many changes. At first, the canon said, he had had a Columbia River sailing boat, which he used to meet his appointments in the different places. This was not satisfactory, however, and later it had been possible to secure a small gas boat which was still operating out of this harbor. The development of the city also meant the growth of outside points and on Porcher Island there were 400 postal addresses at one time. The idea had been conceived of keeping in touch with these various settlements and rendering whatever service it was possible to give. Sometimes it was necessary, as in the case of his last trip to Prince Rupert, to bring in an invalid. He had found that the isolation which many women had been called upon to endure undermined their health. The husband was often away for a considerable time and left the wife alone and, as a result, the woman often became a nervous wreck.

The speaker gave three reasons why the mission boat was called the Northern Cross. There was a northern cross constellation which was visible in the heavens in the summer time about four o'clock in the morning. There was also the Southern Cross, a larger mission boat operating in the southern part and, also, the name referred to the Cross of Christ and the ideals which this conveyed in the religious world.

WORK RECOGNIZED

The work which was carried on through the medium of this mission boat was both religious and social. From Surf Inlet and Swanson Bay in the south to Alice Arm and Stewart in the north regular calls were made at all settlements and lighthouses, and the government had recognized this service to the lighthouses by exempting the new engine for the Northern Cross from duty and sales tax. Calls were made at the lighthouses in the mission boat more frequently than by the government tender. At some of the places visited, where bachelors lived, there were no other visitors and the fellowship of their fellowman seemed to be appreciated. He had found some great intellects in some of these out of the way places and he was sorry to see them thus isolated from humanity.

In concluding, the Canon referred to a press report which he had read dealing with the establishment of a sailors' and fishermen's home in the city. While his work did not include these in the city yet he felt that Prince Rupert had little at the present time to offer to these men, often without homes, who were in the city for only short periods at a time. He felt that it would be a good thing for these men to have a home and place where they might come in contact with the culture and refinements of life.

President C. H. Orme, at the conclusion of the address, expressed the appreciation and thanks of the Rotary Club to Canon Rushbrook for his interesting and entertaining address.

TRAGIC DEATH EDMONTON MAN

BODY IS FOUND IN GARAGE FROZEN STIFF—CARBON MONOXIDE GAS CAUSE

EDMONTON, Feb. 24.—Frozen stiff after about 48 hours exposure to sub zero weather the body of Robert "Bob" Crockett, pioneer citizen and fox farm owner and manager, was found in a garage on his farm about 150 yards south of Mount Pleasant cemetery, on old Calgary trail.

The body was lying in the garage and death, it is believed, was due to carbon-monoxide fumes, as the doors of the garage were closed and deceased had been evidently working on his automobile.

The body was found by the Phelaney brothers, who operate a meat market on Whyte avenue and who called at the farm with an order of meat for the foxes. Not seeing Mr. Crockett around the house and seeing no tracks, they thought something must be wrong and commenced investigations. They arrived at the garage and found Mr. Crockett half sitting, half lying at the head of his car.

Mr. Crockett had come into the city Monday and had a collision with a team. A unfinished letter was found written to his brother, dated Tuesday morning, in which mention of the accident was made and stating that he was about to start repairs on the car.

Mr. Crockett was 68 years of age and had been in the city about 40 years. He was at one time in the lumber business as a partner of the late John Walter.

NO INQUEST

The inquest on the body of Robert Crockett was not held on Friday due to the fact that the body was so badly frozen as to prohibit an autopsy. It is expected that by Saturday morning the body will be thawed out enough to enable this to be made.

EXECUTION OF SLAYER TODAY

GEORGE HASSELL, SELF-CONFESSED KILLER OF THIRTEEN PERSONS, ELECTROCUTED IN TEXAS PENITENTIARY

HUNTSVILLE, Texas, Feb. 25.—George Hassell, confessed slayer of 13 persons, who was electrocuted in the penitentiary here this morning, believed that a broken romance was responsible for the queer quirk in his makeup which led him to deeds of violence.

Convicted and sentenced to death in January for the murder of his wife and nine step-children, Hassell told the story of his life shortly afterward and drew charts which directed police to the bodies of a woman and two children whom he had killed and buried under a house in Whittier, Cal., several years ago. The bodies of the wife and nine step-children were found in a dugout on Hassell's farm near Farwell, Texas.

When he was 18 years old, Hassell said he fell in love with a young woman in Buffalo Gap, Taylor County, Texas. He married her in December, 1908, and moved to Abilene, Texas. Next he moved to Fort Worth, where he was a night watchman, and then to a farm near Hobart, Okla. He sent his wife and their baby son to Winters, Texas, while he went on to Oklahoma.

RUINED HIS LIFE

"We promised to write every day when we parted," Hassell said. "I wrote, but a week passed before I heard from my wife. Then I received a letter. It stated she was through with me. That ruined my life."

"I joined the army and deserted to join the navy in California. But I longed to see my wife and baby while in the navy, so beat it back to Abilene. She still refused to have anything to do with me, so I went back to California and rejoined the army."

"Army authorities arrested me for desertion, and after I had served two years in the army prison, the old longing to see the wife and child came over me, and I planned to return to Taylor County. But my wife wouldn't answer my letters."

Time after time, Hassell said, he returned to Texas in the hope of seeing his wife and child, and once he married another woman because she had a boy that resembled his. Finally, he said he gave up, after his wife had driven him away from her home and the son had thrown rocks at him. He said he married five times after that, but loved only the first wife.

Wandering around the country, Hassell received word at New Orleans that his brother had died from the kick of a mule at Lawton, Okla. A sister requested him to go there to finish his brother's crop.

TRAGEDY OCCURS

He went to Lawton, married his sister-in-law, and assumed the care of his brother's nine children. After a short time, they moved to Farwell, where the tragedy occurred in December.

Hassell never gave any reason for the killing.

"I may be wrong up here," he said in answer to a question, tapping his forehead. "But I don't know why I killed. I simply can't say."

Hassell was 38. His trial lasted only a few days, and he himself asked for the death penalty.

WOULD DISARM ALL CITIZENS IF BILL PASSES

BILL NOW BEFORE PARLIAMENT CALLS FOR "DISARMAMENT" OF CIVILIANS

OTTAWA, Feb. 25.—(Canadian Press Despatch).—A bill which would practically disarm all civilians in Canada is now before the dominion parliament. The measure, which is fostered by Senator N. A. Belcourt, would place drastic restrictions not only upon firearms but upon knives, bayonets, slung shots, sand bags and knuckle dusters.

Senator Belcourt has the support of the Senate for his bill but there will likely be considerable opposition in the House of Commons, mostly from sportsmen and retail merchants who are interested in the sale of sporting weapons. Senior police officials have been called before a Senate committee to give expert evidence on the regulations regarding fire arms and other weapons and most of them have approved the bill.

The proposed legislation is to license the importation, manufacture and sale of weapons. It takes the form of an amendment to the Criminal Code of Canada. It not only would require the registrations of weapons but would substantially increase the penalties in the present law for the concealing or carrying of arms.

MINISTER IN CHARGE

The minister of justice would, under the law, be in charge of the administration. Manufacturers, importers and retailers would be strictly licensed by the department of justice. Only persons holding permits from authorized senior police officials would be permitted to own weapons of any kind. Any sale or transfer of weapons between private citizens would have to be recorded. Dealers would have to keep a strict record not only of sales but of repairs and replacements made in connection with weapons.

Military and Naval forces in Canada, officers of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, officers of the Crown, and police of provinces or municipalities would be exempt from the regulations respecting

TAILORS ASSOCIATION TELLS WHAT SHOULD BE WORN AND WHAT SHOULD NOT

Prince Rupert's society is not very highbrow it is true but fashion's edict for men was delivered to the annual convention of the National Association of Merchant Tailors of America by its fashion committee at Memphis, Tennessee, may be of some interest.

Few radical changes in the trend of style were noted, although the committee found many small details of men's dress to frown upon and a number of careless practices to censure. Chief among the latter is the wearing of light colored overcoats and bright colored hats with evening clothes, a fault which the committee declared was "very noticeable." Another fault was the combination of the opera hat with the dinner jacket.

Correct and incorrect practices in dress were summarized as follows:

The top silk hat or opera hat should be worn with the tailcoat.

White waist coats have given way to the black waist coats for dinner jackets.

Black shoes are the general favorites for town and business, while dark tans are the vogue for travel and country wear.

Very light tans or lemon colored shoes are never in good form at any time or place.

Spats are never correctly worn with tan shoes.

Gloves are a necessary adjunct, the various shades of tan being preferable.

Suspenders are regaining their popularity and greatly aid the fit and hang of the trousers.

Starched collars, either in white or matched collars to colored shirts of unobtrusive patterns are proper for town and business wear. The soft collar is recommended only for hot weather and country and sports wear.

MAY BEATIFY MONTREAL NUN

SACRED CONGREGATION AT ROME IS CONSIDERING THE CASE OF SISTER WHO FOUNDED GREY NUNS

DIED IN 1771

MONTREAL, Feb. 25.—(By Canadian Press).—The beatification of Sister Marie-Marguerite de Lajmmerais, founder and first superior of the Sisters of Charity, also known as the Grey Nuns (Montreal), is now before the Sacred Congregation of Rites of the Roman Catholic Church, in Rome. It became known in Montreal recently.

The name of Sister Marie-Marguerite was first brought to the attention of the Vatican for beatification in 1890. The Archbishop of Montreal was then ordered to study the merits of the recommendation. His findings were approved by Rome in 1909.

The case was then transferred to the Sacred Congregation. This body, after long and minute investigation into the religious standing of a candidate's activities, determines whether meetings should be held which would lead to the beatification of the person under consideration. A meeting towards this end (the selection of Marie-Marguerite) was held in Rome.

The sessions are held in camera and are highly technical and intricate. Well-informed Catholics in Montreal believe that having reached this stage, the beatification of Marie-Marguerite is a practical certainty.

Sister Marie-Marguerite died in Montreal in 1771.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 28 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

For MIL, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 10 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
