# STRANGLER CASE BEING TRIED TODAY

## EARTHQUAKE SEEMS HAVE MADE CHANGES WEST COAST

### Witnesses Identify Earle Nelson in Strangling Case at Winnipeg and Husband Recounts Horror

Famous Case May go to the Jury Tonight but Number More Witnesses Being Heard Today; Wife of Accused in His Defence

WINNIPEG, November 3.—Witnesses yesterday, with two exceptions, identified Earle Nelson as having been in or near Winnipeg while Patterson, the husband of the murdered woman, Mrs. Emily Patterson, told of the anguish that gripped him as he knelt in prayer for the safe return of his wife, only to brush against her lifeless body as he was about to rise. Five hours detailed examination of a score of witnesses who saw Nelson, the man who is charged with garroting Mrs. Patterson, occupied the time of the Assize Court yesterday. ### FISHERMAN IS DROWNED

Adolph Anderson Loses His Life on Being Swept Overboard From Schooner Gladstone

### YOUNG LOGGER WAS DROWNED

Body of George Anderson, Who Lost His Life at Buckley Bay, on Way to Vancouver

The body of George Anderson, aged 23, of Vancouver, who lost his life at Buckley Bay last Friday when he slipped off a boom of logs while employed by the Massett Timber Co., was brought to the city on the Prince Charles this morning and has been placed in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers who will arrange for its shipment south on the Prince George tonight to Vancouver where interment will take place. On falling into the water, deceased disappeared beneath the boom, his body being recovered several hours afterward. He had only been at Buckley Bay since August. Relatives reside in Vancouver.

### HUGE TONNAGE FOR EUROPE

Will Require 100 Ships to Carry Grain From Vancouver and Prince Rupert in December

VANCOUVER, Nov. 3.—Tonnage to carry 30,000,000 bushels of wheat to the United States has already been booked for November, December and January. This month's bookings total 6,000,000 bushels, December 20,000,000 bushels and January 10,000,000. It is estimated by grain men that 100 ships will be required in December.

J. P. McMillan, who has been on the staff of the South Bay cannery the latter part of the season, reached the city on the Prince Charles this morning from the Islands and will proceed tonight on the Prince George to Vancouver where Mrs. McMillan and family are already in residence.

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### LINER DROVE OVER FERRY

Hundred and Fifty Persons Thrown Into Water Including School Children

SYDNEY, N.S.W., Nov. 3.—At eleven persons were killed when the British liner Tahiti collided with a crowded ferry boat in Sydney Harbor today. It is feared that the dead may reach 15.

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### Curious Phenomena Found Off Coast of Alaska Since Recent Earthquake in Neighborhood

JUNEAU, November 3.—Belief that the earthquake which rocked Southeastern Alaska on October 24 originated in the ocean bottom, received some substantiation when fishermen yesterday reported that the waters west of here to Cape Spencer had been discolored since the trembler.

In the vicinity of Point Adolphus, Cape Spencer and Yakobi island, dead deep sea fish were found on the surface of the water. Fishermen on the banks off Cape Spencer report that in past years they have experienced considerable trouble with their gear on account of the rock bottom but after the quake the gear was covered with mud when they lifted it from the bottom. Almost total absence of fish in the Cape Spencer region has been noted since the quake but the fishermen do not agree in attributing this condition to the earthquake.

### CHURCH ARMY DOINGS TODAY

THIS MORNING

At the Church Army conference this morning the service was conducted by Rev. A. W. Robinson of Terrace. The proceedings opened with the singing of the hymn "Onward Christian Soldiers," followed by prayers in the English and native tongue. After another hymn, Rev. J. Gillet of Massett gave an inspiring talk to the native members. An anthem, "Hallelujah," was then sung by the Kitkatla junior choir, followed by an address by Henry Edenshaw of Massett. Following the singing of another hymn, Capt. Silas Robinson of Greenville gave an address in the native tongue, the native choir then rendering "The Children's Shout." Then Chief Joshua Shaw-Bash-Haw of Kitkatla gave an address in the native tongue. Another hymn followed and Solomon Bryant of Kitwanga gave an address. Rev. Mr. Robinson then spoke a few words and, after the singing of another hymn, the morning session was closed all the natives retiring to the basement for a hot dinner.

### HALIBUT BOAT IS WRECKED

"Stranger," Owned by Fred and Al Miller, Lost at Entrance Rocky Pass

KETCHIKAN, Nov. 3.—Word has been received in Ketchikan that the Stranger, a boat about 45 feet long, fitted out for halibut fishing, is a wreck in the south entrance of Rocky Pass. The Inverness, tender for the McDonald Logging company, has left for the scene to get the personal effects of the men on board and to try to salvage the engine.

The boat is owned by Fred and Al Miller, former employees of the McDonald company. They fitted the boat up for the halibut trade and in company with Warner Hogan, another employee of the logging outfit, started for the halibut banks.

The Inverness, left here last Saturday with 14,000 barrels of oil on a barge or the Standard Oil company at Petersburg, and word was sent to Petersburg to have the Inverness go to Rocky Pass and pick up the men and save what they could from the boat.

No details have been received concerning the wreck other than the fact that the boat itself is a total loss. It is presumed that the men must have found shelter on shore. The entrance to Rocky Pass is "reef ridden" and requires local knowledge and extreme care in navigating it.

### DIRIGIBLES BE OPERATED NEXT SUMMER

LONDON, Nov. 3.—Air Vice-marshal Sir Sefton Brancker, announced that two dirigibles, capable of carrying 100 persons each, would be completed next summer. Their use, he said, would be in the Canadian experimental service via Bathurst on the west coast of Africa and the Azores in order to gain the aid of the trade winds.

### Mayor Newton Agrees to Submit His Name to Convention and to Then Abide by Result of Vote

Withdraws His Own Self-Nomination at Meeting Conservative Party Held Last Night

The recent troubled aspect of Conservative skies as far as the forthcoming provincial election situation in Prince Rupert is concerned were effectively cleared when, after a long and acrimonious discussion in the course of which a few plain and unvarnished facts were spoken, Mayor S. M. Newton, self-nominated candidate of the party for the past few months, agreed, at a meeting of the association last night, to withdraw from the field in the meantime and allow his name to be placed in the Conservative nominating convention, there to take his chance and, if nominated, be the official candidate

or, if not, get behind the accredited nominee of the party, whoever he or she might be. Speakers on this particular subject included D. C. Stuart, W. E. Fisher, W. K. Love, S. W. George, etc., and the successful denouncement caused President E. A. Mann, who was in the chair over the gathering, which was well attended, to make the confident prediction that, with forces now joined, the success of Mr. Brady in the federal field would be made insignificant alongside the achievement of the Conservative candidate in the next provincial contest.

### WAS FOUNDER OF PROVINCE

Hon. Charles A. Semlin, Former B.C. Premier, Dies on Ranch Near Ashcroft

ASHCROFT, Nov. 3.—Hon. Charles A. Semlin, aged 94, Premier of British Columbia from 1898 to 1900, died at his ranch near here today following an illness of a year. He was born in Ontario and came to British Columbia in 1862. He was first elected to the legislature as a Conservative in 1871 when the province entered Confederation and successfully held the offices of chief commissioner of lands and works, provincial secretary and minister of education, his government with himself as Premier succeeding the administration of the late Hon. J. H. Turner.

Mr. Semlin took up large land interests in this vicinity on his original arrival from the East and his permanent residence has been here ever since. He died on his big cattle ranch which members of his family, during latter years, have conducted. He was a rugged pioneer figure upon whom, up to the time of his final sickness, the years passed lightly.

### OBJECTION TO SELLING P.G.E.

Says Railway Has Been Burden so why Sell When on Verge of Becoming Asset

VANCOUVER, Nov. 3.—Speaking before the Vancouver South Liberal Executive in regard to the building of the P.G.E. into the Peace River country by private interests G. L. Fraser said: "We have carried the P.G.E. as a tremendous burden to the taxpayers for many years. Why should we dispose of it just on the verge of a time when it could be made an asset?"

### OTTAWA PARLEY OPENED TODAY

Aircraft and Flying Operation Rules First to be Discussed

OTTAWA, Nov. 3.—The Dominion inter-provincial conference opened today with a brief address of welcome by Premier King.

Regulations pertaining to aircraft and flying operations will be discussed first. The question is raised as to the jurisdiction of federal authority over aircraft and as to the interpretation of the word "navigation" in the British North America Act.

### BLUE SKY LEGISLATION

A good many people have asked what is meant by "blue sky legislation." It is often mentioned in the despatches and just now Attorney General Manson has announced his desire to secure a Dominion blue sky law.

The idea is to protect the investor by preventing the floating of fake companies. Nearly every state in the Union to the south has laws designed for that purpose. We remember a few years ago a man coming here with his blue sky certificate from an Eastern state incorporating a company to operate in oil on Queen Charlotte Islands. The man who formed the company had two oil leases and on that basis he was given a charter. The blue sky legislation in that case was only an injury because he was enabled to raise money on the strength of the guarantee that the company was all right when it had as a matter of fact scarcely any basis for existence.

It is hoped that the conference of premiers may be able to evolve some scheme for protecting the public while at the same time not interfering with legitimate efforts to form companies for the development of industries.

### FLAG FOR CANADA

Canadian newspapers are still discussing occasionally the possibility of a flag for Canada. One of the latest is Saturday Night of Toronto. It says:

There is no apparent reason why Canada should not have her own flag, provided it indicates clearly that it is also the flag of a British commonwealth. Such a flag would seem to be that put forward by La Presse, of Montreal, as the result of a Dominion-wide contest held last year. This design is highly attractive pictorially and should appeal to the sentiments of those Canadians who believe that they can be both Canadians and Britishers at the same time. The flag is described in the terms of the heraldic art as a "white field, with Union Jack in first quarter and a green Maple Leaf in the heart of the second part." In other words, it is the Canadian merchant-marine ensign as we now have it, except that the white field supplants the red while the large green maple leaf appears in the place of the Canadian coat-of-arms. The advantage of the leaf over the coat-of-arms is quite patent, for the latter at any distance at all becomes indistinguishable from the coat-of-arms of other nations. One would suggest, however, a red leaf rather than a green; it would present a more striking appearance and would also be in stricter accord with heraldic principles.

The significance of the flag is stated as follows: the Union Jack symbolizes the British connection; the white field (derived from the flag of Old France, which was a white field bespangled with golden Fleur-de-lis), the first period of Canadian history; and the maple leaf, the modern nationhood of Canada. It is such a happy association of sentiments that La Presse exclaims: "Behold the formula is complete! The new flag is meant for Canadians without distinction; also, we have reason to believe that it will find favor with all Canadians."

Those who insist that the present ensign used by the Canadian merchant marine suits every requirement are apparently unaware that it is out of favor with shipping men. These have indicated their desire for a new design, based on the fact that the Canadian ensign is barely to be distinguished at a distance from the red ensign of the British merchant marine and thus often causes considerable confusion when Canadian ships are entering foreign ports. There would be no mistaking the identity of the suggested flag with its white field and prominent maple leaf.

### BEAVER WOULD BE BETTER

While the idea of the white ensign and maple leaf is distinctive and artistic, there are many who would wish to see the beaver, the emblem of industry, in place of the leaf. The difficulty might be in trying to construct an artistic beaver. The maple leaf does not turn red in British Columbia so would not be representative of the West. The future of Canada will be assured if the country is as industrious as the beaver. The only objection some might have is the fact that the beaver is diminishing in numbers before the advances of civilization whereas the maple trees will always be with us as ornamental shade trees. However, these are minor matters. What is desirable is to substitute for the present complicated meaningless flag something which will be distinctive, artistic and easily recognizable.

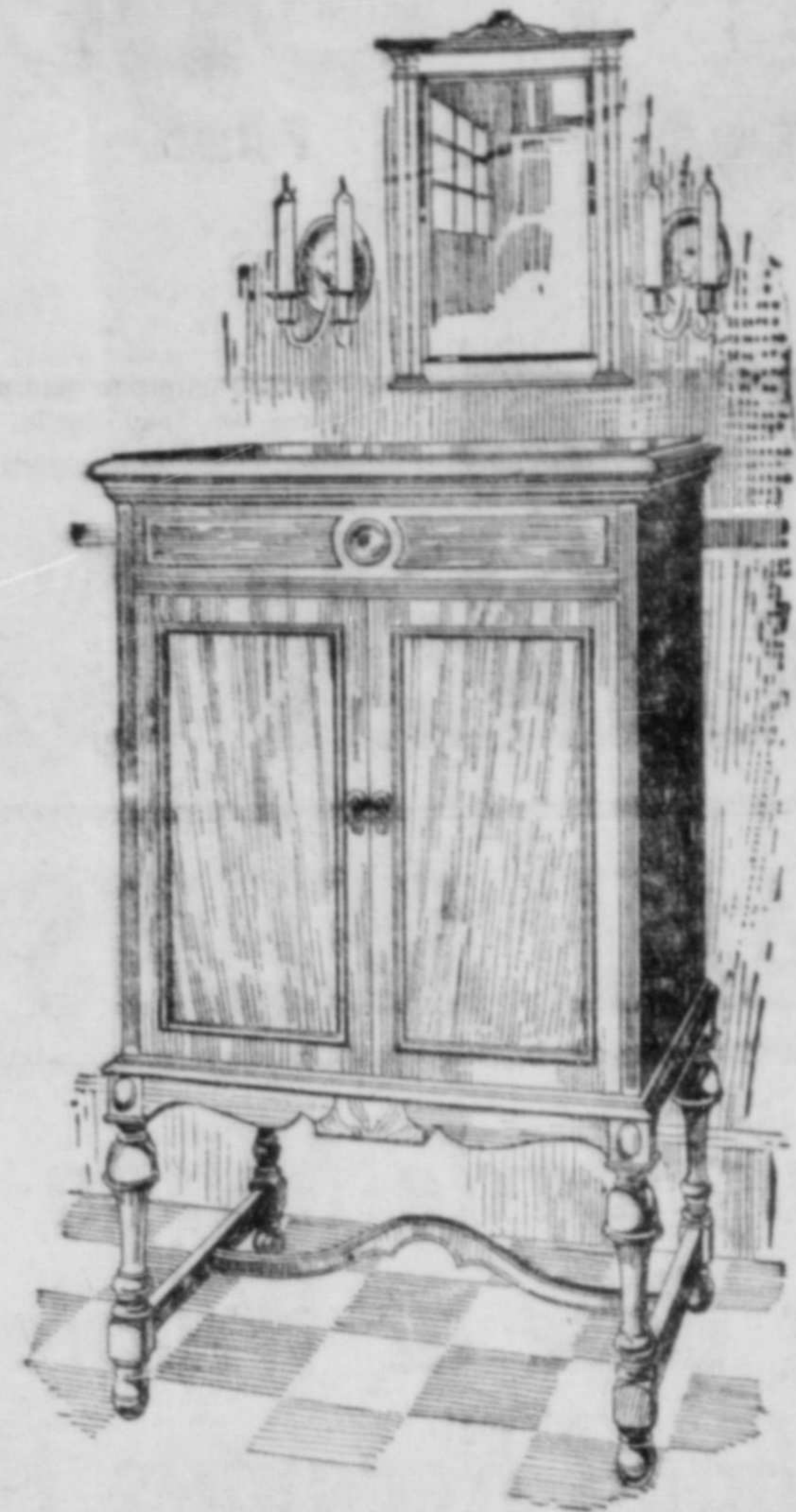

### ASKING PUNISHMENT MOTOR CAR OFFENDERS

VANCOUVER, Nov. 3. — More severe penalties on those reckless drivers who actually cause damage would act as an effective deterrent to dangerous driving and would greatly improve safety conditions, according to E. G. Baynes, director of the Automobile Club of British Columbia and member of the special citizens' committee investigating compulsory insurance. In a report received by the committee, Mr. Baynes states that he does not believe in the wholesale issue of summonses for doubtful offenses where a gesture or a word of warning from a police officer would do just as well, but that in cases where it is established that a driver was intoxicated or where actual damage had been caused by dangerous driving suspension of the driver's licence in addition to a stiff fine, would not be too severe.

## CHURCH ARMY CONFERENCE

Noonday Dinner is One of Features of Gathering of Natives Here

### NOTABLE ADDRESSES

Prayer in Three Tongues at Opening Yesterday and Address in Two

One of the big features of the Church Army conference being held in the city this week is the noonday dinner served every day in the Cathedral Hall at which all the visitors are guests. This is an occasion for the visitors to get to know each other and to meet local people and is a valuable contribution to the big convention. Music is provided on these occasions by the visiting bands.

Yesterday the conference opened in the Cathedral with prayer by Rev. Oliver Thorne of Kincolth and the lesson was read by Captain Paul Mercer of the Naas River both in English and native language. Prayers were said by natives in three different native tongues, Nishgah, Hydah and Taimpean. The address by Rev. W. E. Collison, Indian agent, was delivered in two languages. This was followed by an address by Peter Venn of Metlakatla on "How the Gospel came to Metlakatla." He told of the coming of Father Duncan to these waters, that missionary having been sent out by the Church Missionary Society in 1857. An inspiring address was given by Captain Michael of Aiyansh.

### AFTERNOON

In the afternoon following the usual procession through the streets of the city, Rev. W. S. Cooper of Greenville presided. An overture by the Greenville Band opened the proceedings, native prayers were said and the lesson was read in English by Paul Mercer. An address by Canon Rushbrook on the Origin of the Prayer Book proved extremely interesting. He told of its real value and how it was to be used. Tracing its history he explained that when Augustine came to England in the year 597 he found the Church organized there and the Prayer Book in use in the Gaelic language.

Addresses in the native tongue were given by Joshua Ridley of Kitwanga and John Nelson of Kitkatia and a discussion followed, presided over by Captain Casey.

At the afternoon gathering it was decided to organize the various branches of the Church Army in this diocese into one unit by forming a committee of the captains of all the branches with Rev. T. D. Proctor as chairman to go into the matters of uniforms and dress. This was moved by Alfred Adams and seconded by Captain Paul Mercer. This was following out the suggestion made the day before by Rev. T. D. Proctor.

It was also moved by Captain Gamble of Kitkatia, seconded by Captain Peter Stewart of Kincolth and supported by Archdeacon Rix that a request be sent to the Church Army in London, England, asking them to send out a representative to make his headquarters at Prince Rupert under Archdeacon Rix to have charge of the whole organization.

It was unanimously decided that the conference should be an annual event, the place and time of meeting to be settled by the committee later.

Captain Parson of Ocean Falls and formerly of London, England, gave an address on Church Army work, the theme being "To Bring Men to Christ and make the C.A. stand for Christ's Army."

### EVENING

In the evening there was a parade led by the bands and addresses by the white captain and several native captains on Third Avenue. They then repaired to the Cathedral Hall where the meeting was led by Captain Casey.

The Kitkatia Band gave devotional selections and new revival songs were learned. An address was delivered by Methias Shaw of Massett and the meeting was closed by Archdeacon Rix.

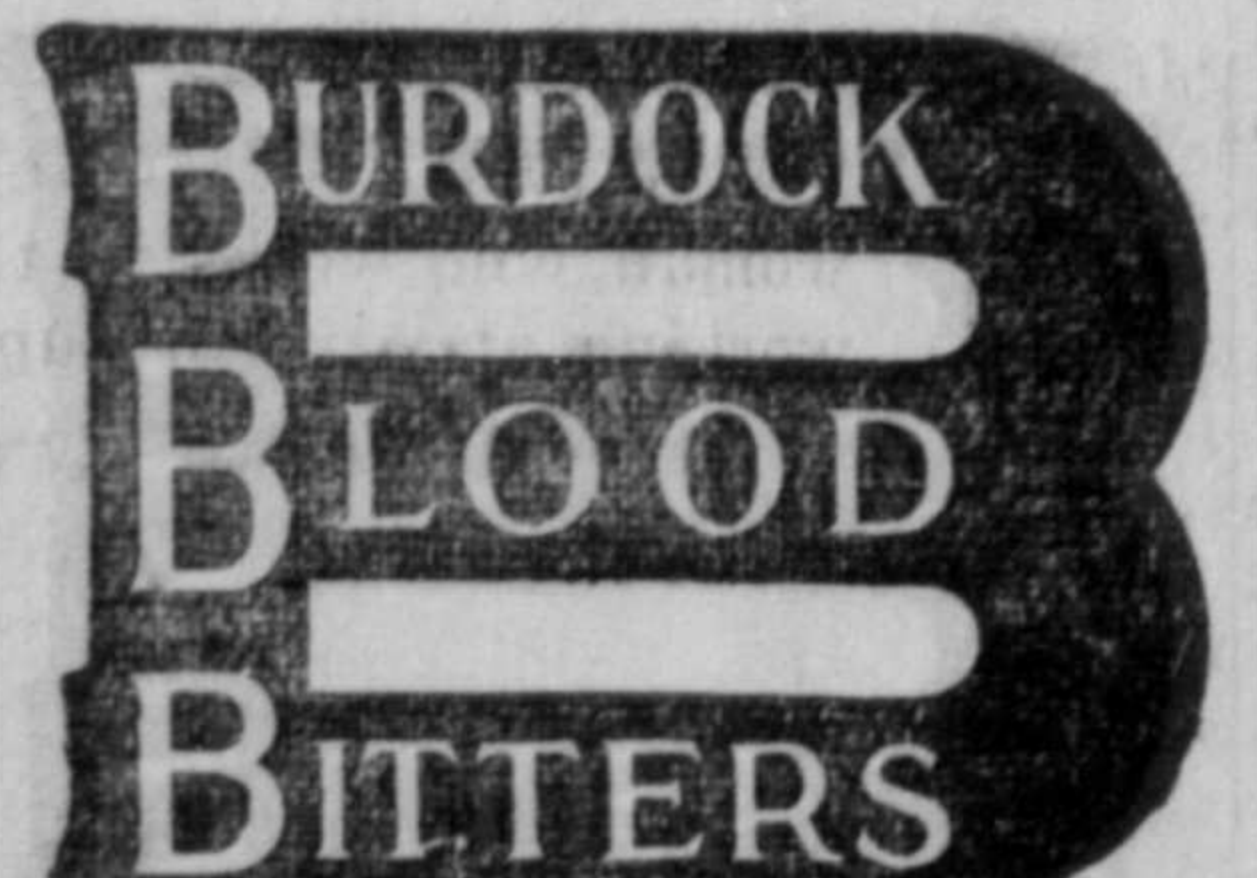

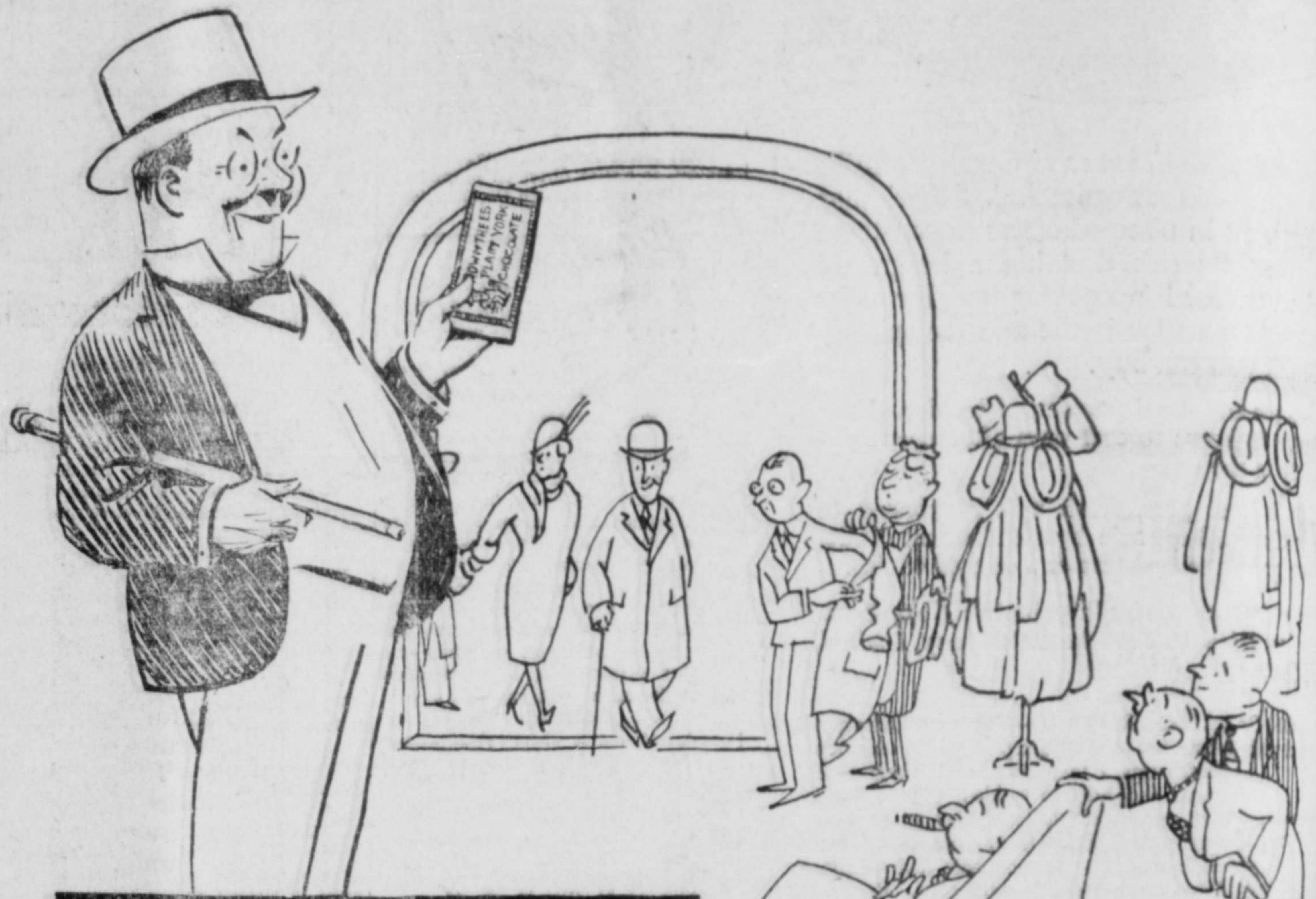

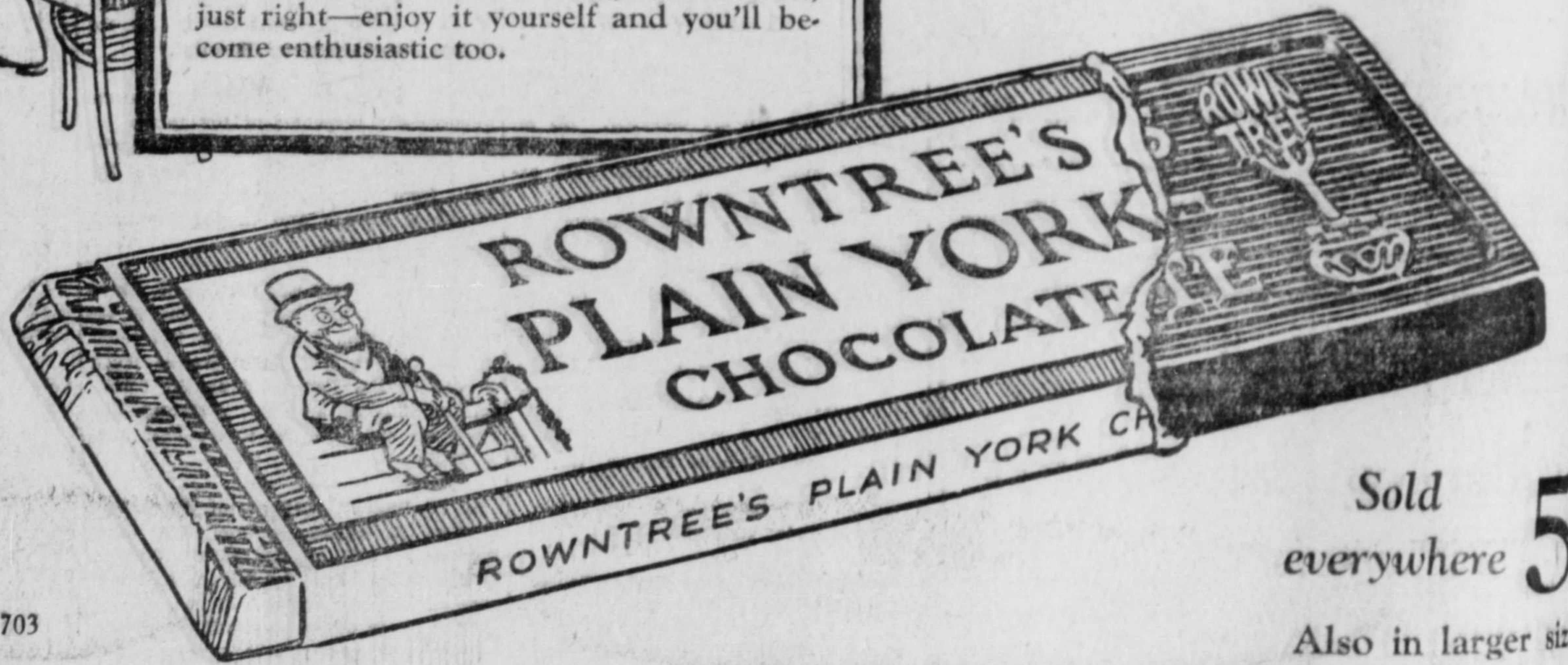

While government engineers have turned back in their research for a highway route from Prince Rupert to the interior, they have found a clue which may lead next year to the discovery of the long-desired pass through the Coast Mountains.

Following receipt of advices from Hazelton announcing the failure of the surveyors to find a feasible road north of the Skeena River, the public works department was informed that another possible route has been discovered. All the energies of the department will be concentrated on exploring this new possibility as soon as spring weather permits, it was stated.

JASPER, Nov. 3.—Bringing with them one of the finest moose heads ever secured in the big game hunting territories adjacent to the borders of Jasper National Park, Prince Michael R. Sturdisa, who is in charge of the Rumanian legation at Washington, and his wife have reached Jasper, terminating a most successful big game hunt. ## PRINCE CHARLES SCRAPPED BOTTOM

C.N.R. Vessel Merely Passed Over Shallow Place—Arrives Today from Q.C. Islands

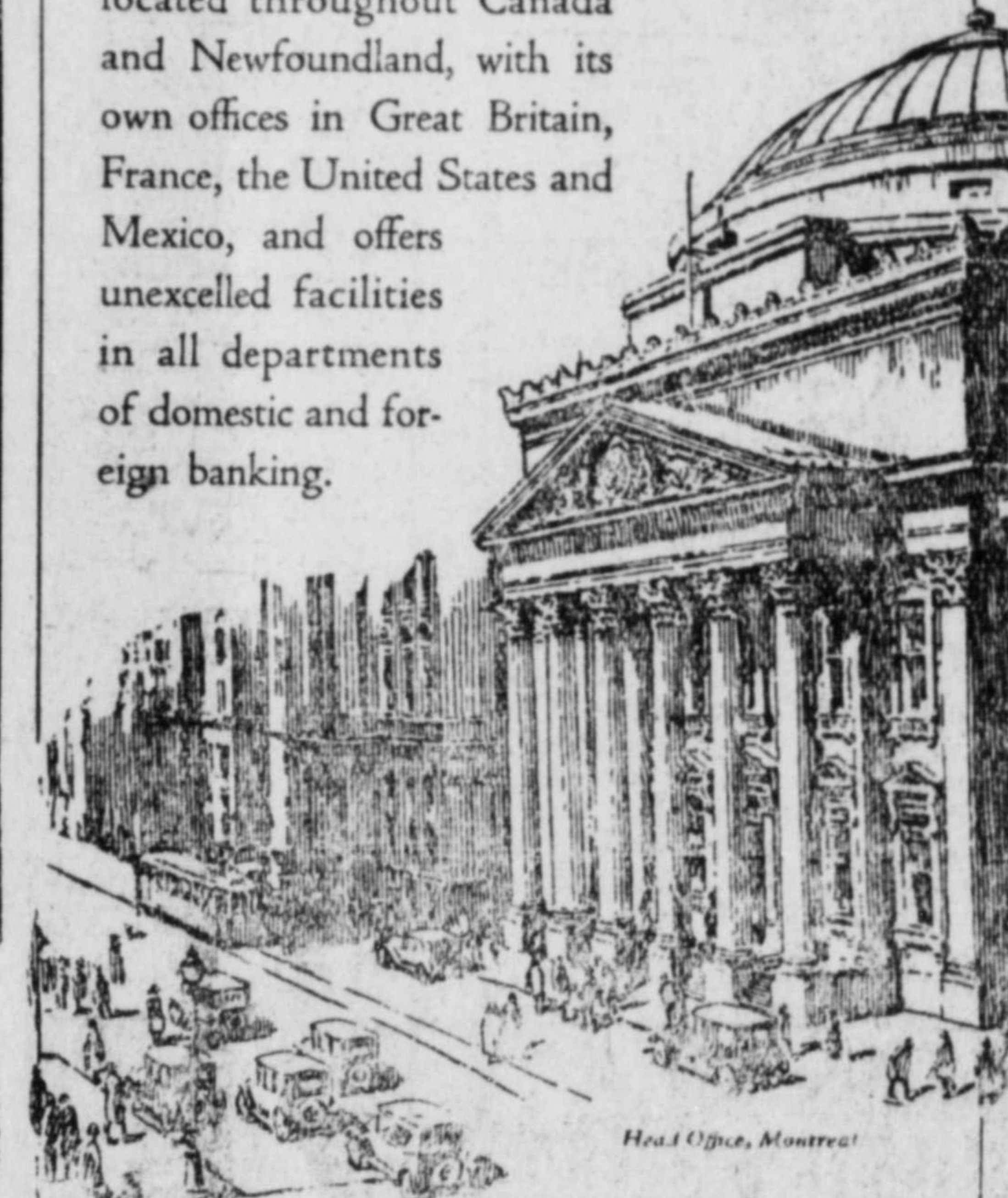
