NOVA SCOTIA BY-ELECTION

ANTIGONISH-GUYSBORO IS VOTING TODAY TO NAME SUCCESSOR TO LATE J. C. DOUGLAS

GUYSBORO, Nova Scotia, Jan. 18. Voting is taking place today in the county of Antogonish-Guysboro, to choose a successor to the late Hon John C. Douglas, federal member of parliament, who died since his election on September 14. It is the first byelection in the country since the general election and great interest has tached itself to the campaign not only locally but throughout Canada. The rival candidates are William Duff former M.P. for Lunenburg, Liberal, and Neil R. McArthur, Conservative. Both sides are claiming victory-the Conservatives on the ground that it went Conservative in September through the election of Mr. Douglas and the Liberals on the ground that the situation nationally is favorable to them and also because Mr. Duff is conceded to be a formidable candidate.

Legislature Hears Proposal Wnereby Northern Trappers Might Be Given Protection

VICTORIA, January 18 .- Widespread belief that several trappers who disappeared in Northern British Columbia during the past two or three years were murdered for their furs was brought to the attention of the legislature yesterday by H. G. Perry, member for Fort George. The men simply vanished, Mr. Perry said, and, in spite of provincial police patrols, their fate remained a, mystery. Mr. Perry said that he intended no criticism of the provincial police but suggested, as a guard against possible crime, that trappers might be required to carry a die with which to stamp their pelts. In the event of robbery or murder, the crime would be uncovered if an attempt were made to sell the furs.

FOREIGN TRADE STILL GOING UP.

For the second successive year the foreign commerce of the Dominion will exceed the \$2,000,000,000 mark. This is an accomplishment which is regarded as giving still further evidence of the soundness of Canada's position at this time, and reflects not only the natural growth of the country, but also the able manner in which her business men are extending the world markets for their products. The latest trade statistics available are those covering the twelve months to the end of last October. These serve to show the situation virtually as it exists today.

Actual volume of trade in the twelve months was \$2,298,993,-820. This is in contrast to a total of \$2,075,844,989 for the preceding period, and with \$1,076,632,203 for the twelve months ended in 1924.

Of the 1926 total, a sum of \$1,307,879,711 was representative of total exports, of which \$1,293,639,169 was made up of Canadian produce and goods, and total imports of \$991,114,109. This indicates a favorable balance of trade for the country last year of better than \$302,000,000, which is considerably ahead of other recent years.

Certainly, this showing both for total trade balance is an encouraging one in a year which has been beset by a number of difficulties. Of major importance as an adverse factor against expansion of Canada's overseas marketing was the British coal strike, and the consequent reduction which it caused in the purchasing power of the English people. NEED IS STRESSED



NEW YORK JUDGE SAYS JURIES HAD RIGHT TO INQUIRE ABOUT EARL CARROLL'S BATH-TUB PARTY

NEW YORK, Jan. 18. - Two grand to Laurier House, Ottawa. juries had a perfect right to ask Earl Carroll, New York theatrical producer. whether anyone occupied a bathtub at a party in his theatre, although they were specifically investigating an leged liquor law violation, the United States Circuit Court of Appeals ruled here in affirming Carroll's conviction and sentence.

On February 22, 1926, Carrol gave party in his theatre here and newspaper accounts said Joyce Hawley, a show girl, had served men guests liquor from a bathtub in which she was seated, undraped. Federal officials ordered an investigation of the report that liquor had been served.

Carroll denied before two Federal grand juries that liquor had been! served and that anyone had occupied a |. tub. He was indicted for perjury for both statements.

A jury convicted him of perjury in saying no one was in the tub, but innocent in saying no liquor was served. Appeal was made on the ground that the grand jury investigation was concerned with liquor law investigation and that questions concerning occupation of the tub were immaterial to the issue.

Judge Manton, with two other judges concurring, ruled yesterday however, that the grand juries had a right to ask any questions they liked in their search for the truth.

Carroll, who was sentenced to serve one year and one day in the Federal penitentiary at Atlanta and fined \$2,-000, is under bail. He announced yesterday in Washington that he was "very sorry to hear of the decision, and that he would consult his counsel before making a statement.

Herbert C. Smyth, his trial counsel, said here he would immediately take steps to have the United States Supreme Court review the decision the circuit court on a writ of certiorari.




