S. M. Newton Bolts Conservative Party and Forestalls Nominating Conventian by Announcing Himself Will be Candidate in Support of Dr. S. F. Tolmie but Goes

Back on Promise to Abide by Decision of the Convention

NNOUNCEMENT was made yesterday that S. M. Newton, former mayor, is to be a candidate at the coming provincial election. The announcement was not unexpected as Mr. Newton had been very actively engaged in registering voters and canvassing the city.

Early last year Mayor Newton announced through his paper that he would be a candidate and the notice was published for many weeks. Then pressure was brought to bear on him by local Conservatives and he announced that he had withdrawn his candidature and would allow his name to go before #---the Conservative nominating conven-

The convention has been called for April 12 and local delegates to it have been chosen and now, just on the eva of that gathering, Mr. Newton ansounces that he will be in the field. The following is the text of the announce-

"To the Electors:

"In order to clear up all doubt about the matter, I wish to announce my candidatare for the coming provincial election for the Prince Rupert Electoral Riding.

"I shall seek election as a supporter of the Hon. Dr. S. F. Tolmic, in order to bring about a very much needed change of government in this province.

"This being the last week for voters' list registrations, will those not aiready registered please get in touch with me without further de-
