### PATTULLO FORECASTS LOWER TAXES AND SOCIAL LAWS

WIMBLEDON, June 30.—Tilden had a great contest with Pierre Landry, the French tennis player today in the British tournament here. He won the first set and then lost two. His final rally and victory was most exciting.

#### HALIBUT FARES SLIGHTLY DOWN

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the month of June, ending today, totalled 3,255,000 pounds as compared with 3,650,000 pounds in the corresponding month of 1927 according to figures compiled by waterfront fish handling houses. American landings during the past month totalled 2,167,500 pounds as compared with 2,400,000 pounds last June while Canadian fish for June this year stands at 1,087,500 pounds as against 1,250,000 pounds last year.

SEWARD, June 30.—Due to activities of dog poisoners more than twenty dogs have been killed here recently. Rewards totalling close to a thousand dollars have been offered by the city and citizens for the arrest and conviction of the culprit.

#### MAKE NEW PARK ALONG HIGHWAY

COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO HAVE CHARGE OF ARRANGEMENTS AT LAKE

At a meeting last night with representatives of the Elks, Moose, Knights of Pythias, Lodge Valhalla, Canadian Legion, St. Andrew's Society, Native Sons of Canada and Pioneers' Association in attendance, a committee consisting of G. W. Johnstone, chairman, Howard Steen, Russell Graham, P. W. Anderson and Oscar Larsen, was appointed to take charge of arrangements for the development of a new park area and picnic ground beside the lake which is opened up by the construction of the Kasien Island Highway.

At a preliminary conference a couple of weeks ago, Hon. T. D. Pattullo promised representatives of these societies that he would cause a survey to be made of the ground as well as a grant by the provincial government for the development of a swimming pool. The committee appointed last night will again interview Mr. Pattullo next week with a view to having the project put into motion at the earliest possible moment. It is proposed to ask for a piece of ground a mile long and half a mile wide, development to start as soon as the grant is made.

Since early May a tramway has been under construction and, in connection with this, a dock and camp has been built at the beach. At the present time, stringing of cable and clearing of right of way is in progress.

#### LOWER TAXES FORESHADOWED

HON. T. D. PATTULLO ALSO HOPES TO PROVIDE HEALTH INSURANCE AND MATERNITY BENEFITS

#### SPOKE AT VANCOUVER

SANE BUSINESSLIKE METHODS TO BE ADOPTED BY THE GOVERNMENT AS IN THE PAST

VANCOUVER, June 30.—Foreshadowing a cut in taxation but declaring it would not be effected by reducing any benefits derived under old age pensions, mothers' pensions or other social legislation now helping the people of the province, Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, addressed a large mass meeting here last night and received an attentive hearing.

Mr. Pattullo said the government proposed to reduce taxation by sane businesslike methods. He dealt with the financial situation at some length and stated that the government hoped to be able to enact legislation whereby health insurance and maternity benefits would benefit the people.

Mr. Pattullo leaves tonight for Prince Rupert.

#### REPEL PROHIBITION VOTED DOWN YESTERDAY

FARGO, North Dakota, June 30.—In a plebiscite here the repeal of prohibition was voted down by a majority of 85,000 yesterday.

C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. D. Donald, is due back at 6.15 this evening from Anyox and Stewart and will sail shortly thereafter for Ocean Falls, Powell River and Vancouver with a large list of local passengers as well as tourists. First-class accommodation on the vessel is almost entirely booked out.

#### McGeer Urges Removal of Chief at Vancouver and Placing a New Man at Head to Reorganize Force

VANCOUVER, June 30.—Evidence adduced at the police inquiry warrants the immediate dismissal of Chief of Police H. W. Long, Detective Inspector John Jackson and Detective Sergeant George McLaughlin, and the complete reorganization of the force, in which the present police commission and Mayor Taylor should play no part, according to a summary of the argument of G. G. McGeer, K.C., counsel for Police Commissioner T. W. Fletcher at yesterday afternoon's session of the Vancouver police department probe.

McGeer, in a recently completed summary of his brief of argument, contended that reorganization of the force should be in the hands of a chief constable of the highest type, a man preferably with military and legal training. In the hands of such a chief, argued McGeer, could be left the question of which other men should be removed from the force.

The mayor said, declared McGeer, that there were traitors on the police force, but he did not place Jackson or McLaughlin in this category. Evidence also had been given by Ernest Leith, former constable, said McGeer, that McLaughlin had stated that he did not get the "big stuff" that Jackson and Taylor got that. If there was not sufficient evidence to warrant an indictment of conspirator, against these men, there was at least sufficient evidence to justify the commission in finding that none of these men should longer retain the public confidence.

#### STEAMER COAL HARBOR IS TO BE RETURNED

U.S. FEDERAL COURT DECREES VESSEL AND CARGO NOT LEGALLY SEIZED

SAN FRANCISCO, June 30.—The federal court decrees that the boat Coal Harbor with a cargo of liquor is to be returned to the Vancouver owners.

Coastguard Boatwain Johnson has been indicted for perjury for giving false evidence as to the position of the boat when seized off shore in February, 1925.

The same court decreed that the Quadra, same owners, remains in the hands of the hands of the United States government. The Quadra was seized in October, 1924.

#### TORNADO DESTROYED HOMES AT NASHVILLE AND GREELEY, COLORADO

NASHVILLE, June 30.—A tornado destroyed 23 homes and 44 barns, and damage being estimated at half a million dollars.

Sheriff John Lewis was killed when he stepped on a live wire in a puddle.

GREELEY, Colo., June 30.—A tornado took four lives and caused heavy property damage near here. Many farms were devastated.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 30 (later).—Six persons were killed and millions of dollars worth of damage resulted from the storm that swept Tennessee and Kentucky. The power dam broke, the rivers were flooded and many buildings destroyed.

#### FIRE ALMOST WIPED OUT PUGWASH, N.S.

PUGWASH, N.S., June 30.—Fire started early this morning in a vacant fish factory and almost wiped out the town, destroying a number of buildings including two hotels, several of the most important stores and other places of business.

The loss was \$100,000. Sixteen buildings were destroyed.

#### CHINESE AND JAPS CLASH

PEKIN, China, June 30.—Chinese and Japanese are clashing in Tsinan where Chinese Nationalist agitators are stirring up feeling against the Japanese. Battles have been sniping and several people have been killed in guerrilla warfare.

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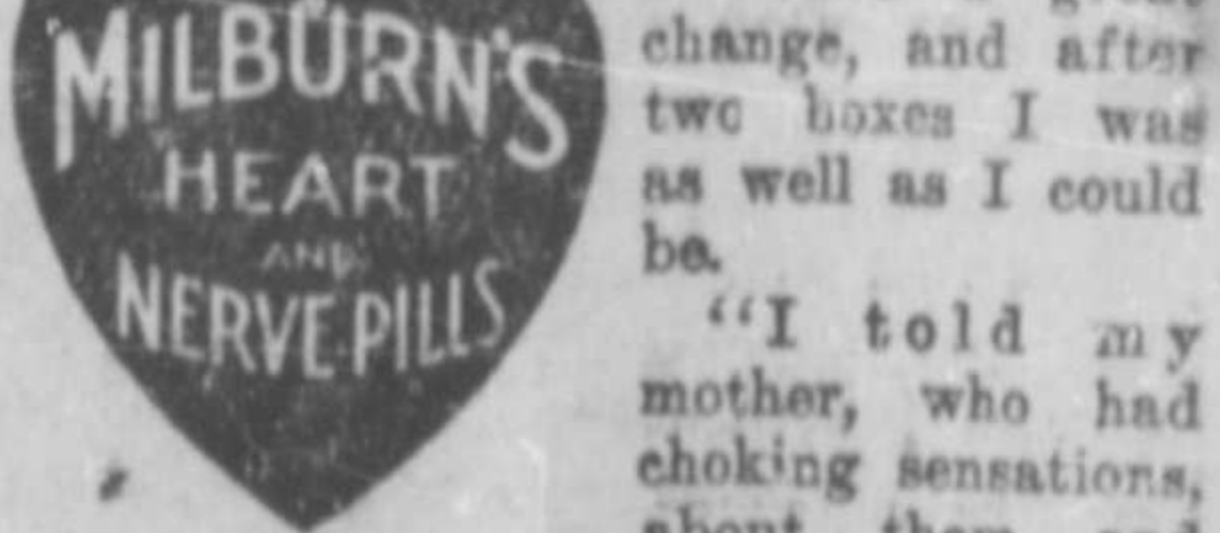

# Waterfront Whiffs

Racing Yachts Due This Week-end—New Type of Halibut Boat  
 — Bushby Buys Argo—Salmon Fishing is Only Fair

Prince Rupert should start to welcome this week-end some twelve yachts participating in the Capital-to-Capital race between Olympia, Washington, and Juneau, Alaska, for which this port has been appointed one of the breathing-spell and outfitting points. The race, for which preparations have been made for the past several months, started from Olympia on Wednesday and the vanguard of the southern vessels, with ideal weather conditions prevailing, should be here soon if they have not already arrived by this time. The first of nine prizes will be a bag of gold nuggets and the winners will also be presented with the keys of the city of Juneau. Yachts participating in the race are the Dolphin II, Bolinder, Maive, Yankee Roy, Winnifred, Dell, Wanderer, Kittiwake, Argosy, Leota, Fly and Sandpiper. These boats include the pick of the Seattle Yacht Club and other Puget Sound pleasure boat organizations and will, no doubt, cause much interest among local pleasure boat owners while they are here.

Because so many of the members are planning to take advantage of this holiday week-end by going on fishing trips and otherwise absenting themselves, it has been decided to postpone the annual regatta of the Prince Rupert Rowing & Yacht Club, originally scheduled for tomorrow, until July 15.

It is expected that the steamers Canadian Ranger and Canadian Farmer of the Canadian National Steamships Ocean Falls-California paper carrying trade will be here shortly to have installed the large steel tanks, which have been under fabrication at the dry dock for some time and which will fit the vessels for the carrying of fish oil from reduction plants on the west of Vancouver Island.

The Canadian Fishing Co.'s service boat Canifaco arrived in port on Thursday afternoon from Vancouver. On board the vessel is R. R. Payne, production manager of the company, who is making his spring rounds of the company's cannery plants along the coast.

### A NEW HALIBUT BOAT

Something distinctive in halibut boats of this coast is Capt. Ben Giske's brand new vessel Sea Bird which reached port on Wednesday with its maiden catch of 30,000 pounds. The most novel and noticeable feature of the Sea Bird is a partially covered in after house which is said to have been copied from a Norwegian style and which is designed to protect the men when the vessel is operating in rough seas. Under this cover, at the stern of the boat, are located the gurdy and other fishing gear. Built in Tacoma, the Sea Bird is 65 feet long and derives power from a 90 h.p. Washington-Estep engine. The vessel carries a crew of six men. Capt. Ben Giske, the owner and skipper, is well known in this port, having sailed for many years on the American fleet operating out of here.

The New Fraser, a New Westminster sloopboat owned by Japanese, was in port this week on the way to the Queen Charlottes where it will pack under charter to the Canadian Fishing Co.

The well known local halibut boat M. M. Christopher sailed on Wednesday night of this week for Vancouver where a 48 h.p. Gardner engine, sold through the Ward Electric & Marine Supply Co. of Prince Rupert, will be installed in the vessel. The installation of the motor will necessitate the tearing down of the present pilot house and it will probably be a couple of weeks or so before the M. M. Christopher is back.

A new sloopboat built during the winter at their Kitkatia Inlet fox farm by the Ness Bros. was towed to port this week and is now at the old McLean shipyard in Cow Bay where final construction touches are being put on the vessel and where, under the supervision of Harry Love, the old Eastern-Standard engine, formerly in Dr. W. T. Kergin's power cruiser Full Moon, will be installed.

Dave Stuart's yacht Tweekwa has been on the Ward Ways this week for some overhaul work prior to instituting the merry round of summer beach parties and fishing trips. Dave is just as canny an angler as he is a doughty goose hunter and, after Tory politics, the outdoor life of nimrod and huntman comes next in his affection. If his side wins next month, it is reported Dave will boat the party unless all restrictions such as creel and bag limits are raised to the sky.

### BUSHBY BUYS ARGO

George G. Bushby has purchased the well known local pleasure boat Argo from Jack Lawrence and will use the boat as a yacht for himself and family. We would have announced this last week only George told us he wanted to have this little surprise for his good family so we did not wish to spoil the fun. Now that the family has had its little surprise the rest of the world may know of the transaction. The Argo is 26 feet long and powered with a 16 h.p. Easthope engine, having been built about four years ago by Bob Davie.

The Prince Rupert Salvage & Towing Co.'s power tug Salvage Princess this week delivered to Douglas Channel the logging outfit of the defunct Dumont-Emerson concern which had been purchased from J. A. Meeker of this city by J. Hansen.

Coming back, the Salvage Princess called at Butedale to raise and bring here, at the order of the underwriters, what remains of the local halibut boat Caygeon which blew up recently and sank there.

Considerable rebuilding has been going on this week on the upper-works of the Prince Rupert Salvage & Towing Co.'s harbor boat Naas River. The pilot house has been practically rebuilt and new windows and doors have been put in. The Naas River will go permanently on the Salt Lakes run tomorrow.

In Alaska recently there was a good-will excursion of Puget Sound business men and while there the leader of the party remarked that the Volstead Act diverted shipments of halibut from Ketchikan to Prince Rupert. This seems to have aroused the ire of the halibut fishermen who, through H. E. Lokken, manager of the Fishing Vessel Owners' Association of Seattle and Ketchikan stated it was a reflection on the fishermen as it intimated that they were attracted to Prince Rupert by the whisky they could buy there. Lokken said the halibut moved through Prince Rupert because of market conditions. The fishermen delivered their catches where they could get most money. Any-

way much of the halibut sold at Ketchikan was shipped through Prince Rupert and the fishermen resented the insinuation that liquor was the bait which brought the fishermen to that port. He said "halibut fishing is too serious a business" for such a trivality.

### SALMON FISHING

District No. 2 salmon fishing the second week of the season has been most intensive and most successful in the Smith's Inlet area. The number of licenses for that area up to the end of this week was 349 and it is expected that the department will have to put on an additional weekly close season there. Throughout the rest of the district, however, licenses are still within the limits and it is not anticipated that any extra close season will be required.

Latest reports received at Prince Rupert were that fishing of sockeye in the district generally is still only fair. Reports of best fishing come from Fitzhugh Sound and Fisher Channel where the boats have been averaging approximately twenty fish per day. Reports from the Skeena River show an average of only five fish per boat, this being an incomplete report, however, and not covering all the boats.

Two seaplanes of the Pacific Airways Ltd., which will patrol the salmon fisheries of District No. 2 this season, are expected to arrive at Swanson Bay, south of Prince Rupert, to take up their base early next week. A third plane will be coming up the coast from Vancouver later. The machines will be operated largely in the southern part of the district during the first few weeks of the season. Later they will move their bases up to Prince Rupert and to the Queen Charlotte Islands.

The past week having been exceptionally light in landings which totalled only 577,000 pounds, made up of 407,500 pounds American and 169,500 pounds Canadian, landings for the season to date at Prince Rupert are just holding their own over landings for 1927 and 1926 at similar date.

Totals for the 1928 season up to yesterday were as follows: American, 8,886,400 pounds; Canadian, 3,769,000 pounds; total, 12,655,400 pounds.

Last year's totals at a similar date were: American, 8,824,600 pounds; Canadian, 3,661,700 pounds; total, 12,486,300 pounds.

In 1926 at the corresponding date the figures were: American, 9,049,700 pounds; Canadian, 3,830,700 pounds; total, 12,880,400 pounds.

Prices during the past week averaged lower than the week previous and took a bad slump during the past few days. The highest American bid was 13.9c and 7c paid the Augusta for 11,000 pounds, and the lowest 9c and 5c received by the Tye for 11,000 pounds. The highest Canadian bid was 11.7c and 5c which the Inez H. took for 4,000 pounds while the lowest was 8.9c and 5c paid in three cases.

Small landings of the week were not due to weather conditions which were ideal. They were attributable to the fact that the boats are bunched together again. As a consequence, it is expected that a week or so hence there may be another glut on the market not only at Prince Rupert but all along the coast.
