# Walking Italia Party Found by Aviators Who Plan to Pick Them Up

LONDON, July 11 .- A Reuter's dispatch from Moscow states that a walking party of three, which set out from the Italia marooned party some weeks ago, has been found. It consisted of Dr. Malmeren and two companions.

The dispatch stated that a Russian flyer Chukhnovsky, who had been making flights from the ice breaker Krassin, now near Poyne Island, made the discovery.

The pilot today is looking for a place to make a landing in order to pick up the group. Two of the party waved as the plane passed and the other was lying down.

The purpose of the walking group was to reach King's Bay to bring back help to their comrades who are near Foyne Island.



TATHAT does the future of British Columbia hold for us? Were we VV wise in putting our Life's effort, our brawn, our brains, our money, into this Province?
