



It is their opinion that the usage by this Company of the water from Woodworth Lake for the purpose of supplying this area with electric power in no way conflicted with or affects the quantity of water available to the City from the lake for domestic and/or industrial uses in this Municipality. Solutions to the water problem were presented by the said engineers, not by the Power Company.

FOURTHLY: This Company does not advocate, endorse or support the contentions of any Civic Candidates in the forthcoming Civic Election, and this Company has never been and is not now in any alliance, conspiracy or agreement with any of the present members of the Civic Administration of the City of Prince Rupert or any Candidates who aspire to achieve that position.

Partner's Takeout Double Can Dictate Two Moves

Occasionally, when your partner doubles for a takeout, you will have about the equal of an opening bid in high cards. Therefore you will want to reach game.

If your hand is balanced and you have the opponents' bid suit well stopped, clearly your best action is to make a strong bid in no trump. If you have an unbalanced hand and one or more five card or longer suits, you jump the bidding in a suit.

On rare occasions you will have the type of hand Mr. Dale holds today. He had two bidable suits, but both four long and needing four-card support from partner. He had no stopper in the enemy's suit, diamonds, so no trump was out of the question.

Of course, he could make a 1D jump response in spades, hoping to get a chance to show the hearts, too. But it was possible that Mrs. Keen might put him in game at spades, holding only three spades to the ace or king In this situation Mr. Dale re-

an entry. sponded with two diamonds. This bid did not necessarily show no diamond losers but it did commit the side to a game contract. It asked Mrs. Keen to show her best suit or suits. With no further need to jump the bidding (since neither partner could stop short of game), the best contract of four spades was easily reached.

There wasn't much to the play of today's deal. A diamond was opened and Mr. Abel won and continued the suit, Mrs. Keen ruffing. She did not make the mistake of pulling all of the opposing trumps at this point. That would have taken all her trumps and when Mr. Abel was in with the king of clubs, he could have cashed a diamond.






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
