## Scene in Court When Colonel Jack Currie Insisted on Talking

Judge Orders Sheriff to Remove Him After Several Threats of Jail or Removal Had Been Made in Currie Libel Case

COBURG, April 18 (noon)-Colonel John A. Currie, member of the Ontario Legislature, was this morning removed from the court room on order of Mr. Justice Rose curing the hearing of the Sir Arthur Currie libel suit. Colonel Currie insisted on addressing the court and asking permission to make a statement.

"Mr. Sheriff, please remove that man," said His Lordship. The sheriff then instructed an officer to remove Colonel Currie.

### TOTLISATOR HAS NARROW MARGIN IN

Provides Rakeoff for Charitable Funds

LONDON, April 18.—The Racecourse Betting Bill, which passed its second reading in the House of Commons had a narrow escape. Receiving a majority of fifteen for the second reading it was saved from being "killed" by a later motion by two votes only.

The totalisator pools the bets on a race, and apportions the winnings in proportion to the stakes risked by the winner. It will also retain a percentage of the "bank" to cover the betting-tox and a contribution to the facecourse stakes and other costs, and its use involves a power on the part of the racing authorities to license bookmakers for admission to the courses.

It is proposed that the funds derived from the deducted percentage of the betting pool and from the licences given to bookmakers shall be administered by a central authority appointed by the Jockey Club and the National Hunt Committee, and shall be used for increasing the stakes and improving racecourse amenities and ultimately for charitable purposes.

EVEN THOUSAND DELEGATES TO ATTEND FROM ALL PARTS OF WORLD

TORONTO, April 18 .- Large delegations from far-off countries are expected to attend the Baptist World Convention in Toronto in June, including about 100 from Australia. The British delegation, it is anticipated, will comprize about 500 Baptists. The first meeting of the Baptist World Alliance was held in London, England, in 1905, and since then the denomination has grown greatly. It is stated that in Russia there are now nearly 2,000,000 Baptists, whereas before the war there were only 100,000. Altogether more than 7,-000 Baptist preachers and laymen, from all parts of the world, are expected at the coming convention which will open on June 23 and close on June 29.

Rev. Dr. E. Y. Mullins, president of the Southern Baptist Theological Semmary, Louisville, Kentucky, is president of the Baptist World Alliance. He came to Toronto last week to supervise the rrangements being made for the convention and gave a public address shorty after his arrival.



# COLLARD HAS

BATTLE SQUADRON OF THE MEDITERRANEAN FLEET IS ADMIRAL KERR

LONDON, April 18. - Rear-Admiral William Munro Kerr, who succeeded Rear-Admiral Bernard St. G. Collard in the first battle squadron, Mediterranean fleet, following the trouble on H.M.S. Royal Oak at Malta between Rear-Admiral Collard and Captain Kenneth G. B. Dewar and Commander H. M. Daniel over a dance and other matters with the result that the rear-admiral was ordered to lower his flag, relieved of his command and later retired, is 52 years of age. This is his first command affoat since his promotion to flag rank in Janluary, 1927. He entered the navy in 1890. In 1913 he was navigating officer of the King George V., and in 1916 served in the Operations Division of the Admiralty naval staff.

During the latter part of the war Rear-Admiral Kerr commanded the cruiser Caradoc and for a short time in 1919 acted as British Consul-General at Odessa. He held the post of Captain of the Dockyard and King's Harbor Master at Rosyth during 1921-1923, and became Senior Officer, Reserve Fleet the Nore, in February, 1924.
