FORMATION PEASANTS REPUBLIC EXPECTED ROUMANIA

Suspension of Chief Long of Vancouver is Asked by Investigating Commission

Suggestion of Fletcher's Council Accepted by Lennie and City Council and Commission Asked to Act

ANCOUVER, May 5.—Chief of police Long and Detective Sergeant George McLaughlin, head of the morality squad, will be suspended immediately pending the outcome of the present investigations, if the Vancouver police commission and city council act on the recommendation to that effect from R. S. Lennie, commissioner investigating the police force here.

Today's development follows an application from G. G. Mc-Geer, counsel for Police Commissioner Fletcher, for recommendations that the two officers be suspended. Lennie agreed, stating it as his opinion that the chief and McLaughlin should step aside until all the present charges against the administration be disposed of one way or another.

The recommendation of Lennie will be considered by the city council Monday. No announcement has been made concerning the action to be taken by the police commission.



Roumanian Feasants Art E.pected 'o Declare for Republic at Big Congress to Le Held at Alba Julia Tomorrow

UDAPEST, May 5 .- Dispatches from Alba Julia says the whole of Roumania is alarmed in anticipation of the proclamation of a Transylvania Republic by the peasants' congress tomorrow. The government it says is taking desperate measures to counteract the move.

ALBA, Julia, May 5 .- Vast hordes of peasants are plodding into this city today to voice the widespread demand for a change of regime at Bucharest.

Many of the illiterate majority know nothing about politics or government and it is to the inexperienced, incompetent rabble that it is proposed to hand over the government, according to Premier Vintila Britaniano.

The peasant's congress will represent fifteen million peasants who constitute the backbone of Roumania, according to Julia Maniu, leader of the peasant's party, who has promised better government.

BOLT OF LIGHTNING CAUSES SERIOUS DAMAGE TO ITALIA AT VADSO, NORWAY

VADSO, Norway, May 5, - The dirigible Italia, in which Commander Nobile planned a flight over the North Pole, was wrecked here at 9.10 this morning as it was about to take off for King's Bay, Spitzbergen. The big ship was struck by a bolt of lightning which shattered the outer envelope and caused other damage, the extent of which was not definitely ascertained at once. In any case, Commander Nobile's flight will have to be put off for the time being at least and possibly for months.

Ten Greek Sailors Drown and Two Died From Exposure Following Collision Yesterday in English Channel

ORTLAND, England, May 5 .- The crippled auxiliary Bacchus reached haven last night with the survivors of the Greek steamer which it had sunk in a collision in the English Chan nel Friday. Ten of the Greek sailors were drowned and two other died of exposure after being picked up from the water.
