Outline of Policy of Government Includes Sale of P.G.E. Transfer of Railway Lands and Reduction of Taxes

VICTORIA, June 7. - Elections will be held July 18 and nominations June 27, it was announced today.

ICTORIA, June 7—The Legislature will be dissolved within the next few days and the general elections will take place before the end of July, Premier MacLean stated.

Policies on which the government will appeal to the electors of British Columbia at the forthcoming provincial election were announced in detail by Premier Mac-Lean in a manifesto issued today. The government's plans include:

Sale of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway or its completion to North Vancouver and Prince George. The premier has every confidence that the negotiations for disposal of the P.G.E. to the Canadian National will be completed successfully, but meanwhile withold details of these plans, stating only that they involve land grants, and the extension of the line into the Peace River country.

An early agreement will be reached covering the transfer of the railway belt and Peace River Block to the Province with provisions to safeguard park lands and to protect the federal government employees in these areas.




