**BLOOD TESTS AS EVIDENCE**

Woman Convicted of Imprisonment for Perjury in German Case

LONDON, Jan. 7.—The use of blood tests to determine paternity is illustrated by two legal cases reported from Germany during the past week.

The first was heard in Wurtemberg, where a woman applying for an affiliation order swore that a certain man was the father of her illegitimate child. The defence countered by producing evidence that the characteristics of the infant's blood were incompatible with this relationship. The blood of the man, they said, was of one type, and the woman's was of another; it was impossible that the union of two such persons could have produced offspring whose blood had the characteristics demonstrated. By which reasoning the court was so far convinced as to sentence the woman to six months' imprisonment for perjury.

The second case was of the same kind, but the judgment delivered on it by the highest Prussian court, was in a contrary sense. Similar medical evidence was brought to refute a charge of paternity, and the general validity of the blood tests was admitted. Apparently, however, a witness stated that in a series of over 2,000 cases investigated in 1926 there had been one exception to the rule, and the court accordingly decided that the tests do not provide the absolute proof required by the law.
