TWO HORES FINISH IN GRAND NATIONAL STEEPLECHASE

Floods in Saskatchewan Caused by River Being Jammed With Ice; Many Farms Are Now Inundated

Between Thirty and Forty Thousand Acres in Pike Lake Section are Covered With Water, Only Tops of Houses Showing

ASKATON, Sask., March 30.—Between thirty and forty thousand acres of farm land is under water, varying in depth from a few feet to an average of ten feet. Twenty-nine families are without homes and there are probably more, all of whom have lost their belongings, including a quantity of seed grain. This will deal a serious blow to farming in the district this spring. Such was the situation in brief this morning following a disastrous flood in the Pike Lake area, which commenced early Thursday morning and reached its peak last night.

Statement of Canadian Premier Denied by Lord Salisbury in England

Mackenzie King Sticks to His Point and Suggests Tabling of Correspondence Regard to Egyptian Treaty

ONDON, March 30 .- Canada was not invited to participate in the Anglo-Egyptian treaty recently negotiated, Lord Salisbury, government leader, stated in the House of Lords yesterday in reply to a question by Lord Parmoor, who called attention to a statement made by Premier King in the Canadian Commons on Canada's attitude in the recent Anglo-Egyptian draft treaty.





Is the last day for filing returns of Income earned during the calendar year 1927.

Returns are required to be filed with the Provincial Assessor, Prince Rupert, B.C., from whom the necessary forms and full information may be obtained.

Those required to make returns are as follows:-

- 1. Every corporation or joint stock company (use Form No. 7).
- Every partnership, and every person engaged in business of any kind, or practicing any profession (use Form No. 7B).
- 3. Every other person in receipt of income from salary, wages, commission, fees, bonus, perquisites, interest, dividends, rent, or other income from any sourse whatsoever, in excess of

(a) In the case of a married person, \$1800. (b) In the case of a single person, \$1200. (use Form No. 7A),

Individuals whose total income from all sources is less than the amount specified need not file a return unless requested by the Assessor to do so.

In the case of Provincial returns the amount of the tax is not payable until 60 days after the date upon which the Assessor mails a notice of assessment.

The public are earnestly requested to obtain the necessary forms and file returns promptly in order to avoid penalties. Assistance in the making up of returns will be gladly rendered where necessary by the staff of the Assessor's office.
