ELECTION TOMORROW

This is the last number of this paper prior to the election which takes place tomorrow. Like a great many others we have been speculating as to the outcome and have decided that the Liberals are likely to get at least 29 seats, Conservatives 11, and Labor 5. While some of those marked Conservative have a good chance of going Liberal and vice versa we submit this list as a very probable one and would suggest that note be made of the forecast as being pretty near the mark. Here is the list of winners:

Liberals-Alberni, Atlin, Cariboo, Chilliwack, Columbia, Cranbrook, Creston, Delta, Prince George, Grand Forks, Islands, Kamloops, Kaslo, Lilooet, New Westminster, North Okanagan, North Vancouver, Omineca, Prince Rupert, Revelstoke, Similkameen, Skeena, Yale, Vancouver 3, Victoria 3. Total 29.

Conservatives-South Okanagan, Saanich, Salmon Arm, Point Grey, Vancouver 3, Victoria 1, and possibly Comox, Dewdney and Mackenzie. Total 11.

Labor-Burnaby, Cowichan, Fernie, Nanaimo, and South Vancouver. Total 5.

WOMEN VOTERS

Women voters will doubtless remember that the Conservatives have refused to put a woman on their list of candidates in spite of the fact that in several ridings there have been outstanding women ready to take the nomination, such as was the case in Victoria.

The Liberals have two women on their lists. Most of the legislation for which women have asked have been passed by the Liberal government or forced on the Conservatives by Liberals. That is why tomorrow women will be voting for Liberal candidates throughout the province.







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BIG EVENT DECLARED A DRAW AL-THOUGH MANY THOUGHT SAILOR WINNER

NUMBER OF EVENTS

WHOLE AFFAIR WAS WELL MAN-AGED AND SPECTATORS HAD PLENTY FOR THEIR MONEY

Though he outgeneralled and outpointed his rival all the way and was entitled to the decision on both points and rounds, Stoker Percy Lake of H. M. S. Durban was unfortunate last night in being awarded but a draw with Johnny Woods of Seattle in a ten round bout which headlined one of the finest boxing cards that has been presented here in years. The naval man won everything in the bout but the decision. One judge fairly gave him the call but the referee and second judge called a draw in spite of the fact that Lake led the fighting most of the way, scored two points to his opponent's one and also had the margin on rounds.

The decision was apparently unpopular with the mass of probably the largest assembly that has ever witnessed a boxing card in Prince Rupert. It is estimated that nearly one thousand people attended the Exhibition Hall for the occasion and the gate, it is understood, amounted to over \$1,000. The event was promoted by Ben Self who is to be congraulated not only upon the excellence of the bouts, there was not a dead number on the card, but also the smooth manner in which all arrangements went off and he large crowd was handled.

The main event started shortly after 10 o'clock. Woods was in his corner some time before Lake arrived on the scene. Lake's age was announced as twenty years and his weight 1361/4 lbs. Woods was nineteen years old and his weight 129 % lbs. Lake was the shortr and stockier; Woods was taller and slimmer. It was announced that straight Marquis of Queensberry rules would be followed.

First round-Woods went in and. with straight jabs, drove Lake against the ropes. They exchanged right and left head blows, Lake swinging more than Woods.
