# Chinese Run Amuk Killing Ten and Seriously Wounding Others With Hatchet and Rifle Yesterday

FAIRFIELD, California, Aug. 23.—Ten Chinese were slain and five seriously wounded when Lay Yuen, a cook on the Wong Gee ranch near here ran amuk yesterday.. Using a rifle and hatchet he killed Wong Gee, his wife and three children and four others and then fled in an automobile.

The attack came without warning. The cook descended on the Wong family brandishing a hatchet and killed the mother and father and three children, decapitating the youngest infant as it lay in its mother's arms and then invaded the bunkhouse, pursuing one of the victims beneath the bunk where, being unable to reach him with the hatchet, he shot him to death.

The slayer was captured in a chicken house today by sheriffs. The rifle used by him was found last night and the automobile located. The Chinaman said he watched the sheriffs trail him through the bush last night and could easily have killed both. He said he killed the others "because they tried to poison me."

### U. S. POLITICAL CAMPAIGN

What strikes the ordinary observer in regard to the United States political campaign for the presidency is the similarity between the public utterances of the candidates there and in this country. Each claims to be the friend of everybody and ready to do anything they think the people may happen to want and yet hedging sufficiently to give them a way out in case they should decide to change the policy of the party.

What seems clear, however, is that Al Smith is against prohibition as at present in force in the States and Hoover is for it. Beyond that, there seems little difference in policy between the two parties, judging by their speeches.

### THE PARKS BOARD

The question of the efficiency of the Parks Board has been questioned, it seems. When two local parks were formed, one at the Salt Lakes and the other on the hillside above Prince Rupert, some authority had to be constituted to have charge of them, seeing that the timber there was not cut and that people did not trespass on them to the injury of the rights of the people generally. It had been subject of complaint that no one had control at the Salt Lakes and that visitors there could do as they wished even if it interferred with the common rights. Now the Salt Lake park is in charge of the Parks Board which has delegated the authority over the lake to the Swimming Club. This gives them the right to make improvements and if necessary to make a charge for admission to any part of it for any specific purpose.

The Parks Board is not interested necessarily in the development of any particular scheme of improvement but has power to delegate authority to carry out such schemes. This is much more convenient

than going to Victoria for authority.

The Government can change the Board members at any time but just now there are two strong supporters of the Government on it, one of which is the defeated candidate in the recent election, to whom the Government, under the present system, look for advice in such matters.



research was delivered before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at luncheon yesterday by H. N. Brocklesby of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station who is specializing in that line of endeavor. Mr. Brocklesby briefly scanned the development in the field of medical research during the past century with especial reference to vitamins. Ravages of deficiency diseases such as scurvy. beri-beri, etc., had reached such proportions in the nineteenth century that their eradiction had become an earnest study and in this connection there had been great expansion in food analysis. The discovery of the vitamins as food content had come about in the present century. Vitamins were of particular importance in the growth of children, bone formation and elimination of the deficiency diseases. Most important of the vitamins and the one often lacking in the ordinary food was Vitamin D. which was important in bone development and without which children often suffered from rickets. Mr. Brocklesby dicalt to some extent with coa liver oil, an important constituent of which was Vitamin D.




