OTTAWA, February 2.—Speaking at the convention of Dominion and Surveyors here K. P. McCusker told of a recent survey he conducted in the northern stretches of British Columbia. He said the talk of a newly discovered tropical land which was said to be kept warm through the eruption of hot springs, was largely fiction. He said they found luxurious meadows and prairie land and large stretches of open country which he termed "Summerland." It could not be classed as tropical. The country abounded in game-goats, sheep, caribou and grizzly bears. Grass grew to such a height that it was clear no snow fell there during the winter.

CANADA QUITE BACKWARD IN TOWN PLANNING

Report to Surveyors' Convention Says Municipal Heads Were Inclined to Scoff at Move-

VANCOUVER A SHINING LIGHT

Much is Being Done in Pacific Coast City, and Whole Dominion is Urged to Take Hold of the Idea

OTTAWA, Feb. 2. - (By Canadian Press) .- "There is really a remarkable awakening to the significance and value f town-planning throughout Canada. even though the movement is not yet commensurate in its scope with that of ther countries," said Carl Engler, D.L.S., in concluding the report of the Town Planning Committee presented at the annual convention of Dominion Land Surveyors which opened here yes-

No sensible man, said Mr. Engler, is now asking whether town planning is fad. The movement has justified itelf in all directions and is accepted broughout the world, as is shown by the fact that each year representatives rom about 40 nations are gathering in iternational town and regional planing conferences. It seems to have assed the experimental stage and to have become an established and expandng practice in all civilized countries.

WORK IN BRITAIN The report of the committee draws attention particularly to the present tatus of town planning in Great Britain and the United States. It is surely significant, it is stated, that a leading country like Great Britain has come to legard town planning as a health measire comparable to universal sanitation. towns under planning law, with 52 regional plans in course of development. comprising vast aggregations of cities, towns and rural areas, and that the United States has also about the same number of towns under planning law.

While Canada is indeed making some progress it is significant of our backwardness on this side of the line, said Mr. Engler, that the Niagara Frontier Regional Planning project, now com-American side of the river, had its origin in the suggestions of Canadian planners. The Americans caught on to the idea and established an organization to realize it. In Canada, he said, .was scoffed at by municipal authori-'es as both visionary and impossible.

PROGRESS IN STATES The amazing progress of town planning in the United States is attributed to a central or federal government town planning agency which assists the movement in every possible way, especially by the periodical issue of zoning priners, model enabling acts and other terature. Canada also established central educational agency in the fedcral town-planning office established in staff, including two engineers and two architects. It has not functioned disruption of the Commission of Conservation to which it was attached, its

VANCOUVER QUOTED

Vancouver was referred to as th shining light among Canadian municipalities in regard to town planning. A great regional plan for Greater Vancouver is in progress—an interim zoning prepared and presented to the city nicipalities around Vancouver are engaged in town planning. In Victoria a zoning bylaw is ready for final passags by city council. The planning of the University Endowment Lands at Vancouver is referred to as a magnificent project resulting in the growing up of a university city on the headland of Point Grey planned in every detail on modern town planning lines. Vancouver is making full use of the authority conferred by the British Columbia Town Planning Act passed in 1925. That city. by the way. said Mr. Engler, is being entered in a thousand town-planning documents al over the world as the most progressive city in Canada.
