INEAKLY 300 LIVES LUSI IN WKECK

CHILEAN SHIP DRIVEN ON ROCKS IN STORM; FOUR ESCAPE

Terrible Wreck of Chilean Vessel Driven on Rocks by Storm and All But Four of 300 Lost Their Lives

Captain suicided on bridge and eighty bodies TWO RACING were found on shore although exact number lost will never be known

SANTIAGO, Chile, July 9.—Of some three hundred persons aboard the army transport Angamos only four are alive today to tell how the vessel pounded to pieces on the rocks. The catastrophe occurred at Punta Chimhel on the south Chilean coast near the town of Lebu Friday night.

Captain Corbeta Sufrez, unable to avoid disaster, suicided on the bridge.

Eighty bodies were found on the beach near Coronel but the exact number lost probably will never be known since, after leaving Punta Arenas with 291 persons, the vesse! made several stops, picking up additional passen-

The ship had been loading material for the navy in the gulf of Arauco when a storm broke in the late afternoon. The ship left the bay to ride it out and for several hours was badly battered. Heavy seas smashed the rudder and the ship started to drift toward the breakers.

Frantic appeals were sent out but no aid came. At 10 p.m. the vessel crashed on the rocks 300 yards from

Efforts were made to launch the lifeboats but they capsized as soon as they were lowered into the water with their human freight, tossed on the rocks or drawn back into the angry sea. Men, women and children perished in the sea while others remained on the decks, crying piteously for help.

Three hours after the ship struck she was virtually buried under the waves and then she broke in two and the few who remained were thrown into the water by the force of the sea.

Four survivors miraculous'y escaped by being dashed ashore by the waves.

On a group of 525 applicants accepted, who showed an everage pressure 152, a well known insurance company suffered an excess mortality exceeding the general average of that company by 30 per cent. On another group having an average blood pressure of 161, and this the only discoverable blemish, there was a mortality of two and a half times that to be expected. 



ONSERVATIVE CAMPAIGNER HOLDS MEETING IN NORTH AND TELLS OF ALLEGED INIQUITIES

sional Conservative speaker of the present political contest to make the camp of Alice Arm, in the person of T. Baxter of Vancouver addressed a well filled hall of voters here on Thursday evening. 


