CRITICISMS FROM NOW ON

We can respect opponents and even be close friends with them, but it is difficult because one side is sure to do something that the other thinks should not have been done and recrimination is apt to follow.

Feeling is apt to run high at election time. People stake money on the result and the moment that is done they try to win, no matter what the issues. From this time until election a good deal of news of the elections will appear, practically every day. While some will tire of this, there will be others who will like it, but at any rate it is the duty of the newspapers at election time to discuss the issues and also to give the news of campaign happenings.




