## Long Disiance Classic Amsterdam Olympiad

Canadian Rowers Win Their Heats and Will Appear in Semi-finals in the Regratta-American and South African Win

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 3-Willie Ritola of Finland won the 5,000 metre race from Paavo Nurmi, who appeared content to trail his fellow countryman going just fast enough to beat Wide of Sweden for second place. The long distance classic remains with Finland after being in Nurmi's hands for many years.

The first event in the Olympic decathlon was won by I. L. Joen of South Africa running 100 metres in 11 seconds.

Ray Barbuti brought the United States the first running championship, winning the 400 metres in 47 4-5 seconds and barely beating

## HARVEST MEN

PLAN FOR 10,000 TO COME FROM OLD foils fencing championship. COUNTRY IS NOT YET REALIZED.

LONDON, Aug. 3.-It is now disclosed that the announcement that the British Government had concluded an arrangement to bring 10,000 miners to Canada for the rarvvest was premature. While the railways and immigration officials are inundated with applications negotiations still lag for lack of a satisfactory guarantee that the miners will get one year's employment. The Canadian government is not disposed to permit the influx with the prospect of swelling the winter unemployment in the cities after the harvest.

The railways are reluctant to guarantee continued employment or a re turn passage.

Bitter disappointment is expressed throughout this country.


