Thirty-one Killed In Train Collision When Express Is Wrecked

BUCHAREST, Roumania, Oct. 26.—Thirty- one perns were killed today in a collision between the Symplon Junnel express from Bucharest and an express train from Sybiu near Slatina. Forty-seven persons were injured.

The force of the collision was so great that one of the sleeping cars of the Symplon Express was completely wrecked. Two of the first class coaches were smashed.

WERE BLOWN

Only the five men were at work and at the time they were placing the explosive in a crevice.. The switch controlling the fuse was not due to be closed for hours later.

The windows of houses within a two mile radius were shattered and many small buildings in the vicinity were wrecked. Parts of the bodies were found hundreds of yards away.
