DAME ELLEN TERRY DEAD

CUMBED THIS MORNING AT AGE OF OVER 80 YEARS

LONDON, July 21.—Dame Ellen Alice Terry, famous English actress, died this morning at Smallhyth, Kent. She was just past eighty years of age. The funeral will take place on Tuesday.

Sarah Bernhardt called Ellen Terry "the greatest actress in the world." Her artistic partnership over a period of twenty-four years, with Sir Henry Irving constituted one of the most brilliant periods of the English stage.

She was almost as well known in the United States where she was presented by Charles Frohman as in her native Britain, having toured it ten times and considering it her second home. In her tours of America she was greeted as a queen and a monster jubilee in 1906 was celebrated in honor of the halfcentury of her connection with the stage. She was married three times.

She was personally acquainted with many of the great personages of the Victorian era, including Disraeli, Gladstone and Tennyson.

Autograph Hunters pursued her everywhere and she finally capitalized the situation for the sake of charity by charging a shilling for each autograph and turning the money into maintenance of a cot in a children's hospital.

Queen Victoria witnessed Miss Terry's stage debut at the age of eight and thought so much of her histronic ability that years later she "commanded" her presence at Sandringham Palace where she performed for the Queen and the

future King Edward VII. King George V created Miss Terry a pire in 1925. St. Andrew's University honored her with the degree of Doctor

SHAKESPEARIAN ROLES

Miss Terry's outstanding roles were those of Portia and Ophelia although she made remarkable portrayals of Juliet, Beatrice, Desdemona, Margaret, Lady Mc-Beth, Rosamund, Guinevere, Imogen, Olivia and Madah Sans-Gene. Her great triumph came in 1875 as Portia under the management of the Bancrofts and her fame was firmly founded three years later when she played Ophelia to the Hamlet of Sir Henry Irving.

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the season up to July 20 totalled 14,431,600 pounds-9,805,600 pounds American and 4,575,-000 pounds Canadian-showing a slight increase over the total for the 1927 season at a similar date which was 14,281,300 pounds made up of 10,039,600 pounds American and 4,241,700 pounds Canadian.
