

National Policy Born on January 17, 1878, at Toronto

Fifty years ago-1378-was a period of great political excitement and of triumph for the Conservative party. On January 17, at Toronto, a Conservative convention endorsed a tariff donald, who on March 13 proposed a resclution in the House of Commons in Nothing succeeds like knocking the favor of a "National Policy" for the protection of Canadian industry. That office with a majority of 68, every province except Manitoba supporting signed on October 16 and the following day, just a month after his electoral riumph. Sir John was Premier of remain until his death on June 1891. Elections in Ontario on September #= 10 sustained Hon, Oliver Mowat in power, but in Nova Scotia on the same day the Conservatives were defeated. On December 18 Manitoba electors endorsed Norquay, who had been sworn as Premier on October 16. The Canada Temperance Act was passed by the description as the "Scott Act."




