FURTHER CHURCH UNION DISCUSSED

FORESTRY REPORT SHOWS INTERESTING DEVELOPMENTS

Primacy of Pope is Bar to Union Anglican and Catholic Churches Today

British Would Not Surrender Right to Intervene Although Unity is Desired Says Report of Malines Conference

LONDON, January 19.—The primacy of the Pope is indicated to be a bar to the unity of the Roman Catholic and Anglican churches in the long-awaited report on the Malines conversations between 1911 and 1925 under the presidency of Cardinal Mercier.

In regard to the Papal primacy one Anglican delegate said: "We wish for unity and if necessary preliminary conditions of duty were met we should not shrink from the idea of the Papacy acting as the centre of unity but, in so saying, we have in view a new Papacy not as it exists in theory and practice among Roman Catholics at present but the conception of unity such as may emerge in the future."

MARKETING ACT WORK APPROVED

Resolution Passed by Fruit Growers Approving Committee of Direction Work

KELOWNA, Jan. 19.—F. M. Black, chairman of the committee of direction under the Fruit Marketing Act, said amendments would be sought at the coming session of the Legislature including one to prohibit transportation companies accepting shipments except from licensed dealers.

Approval of the committee of direction was voted almost unanimously late yesterday at the annual meeting of the B.C. Fruit Growers' Association but on another resolution asking for extension of the Marketing Act to the whole province there was a difference of opinion and in order to give time for consideration the meeting adjourned.

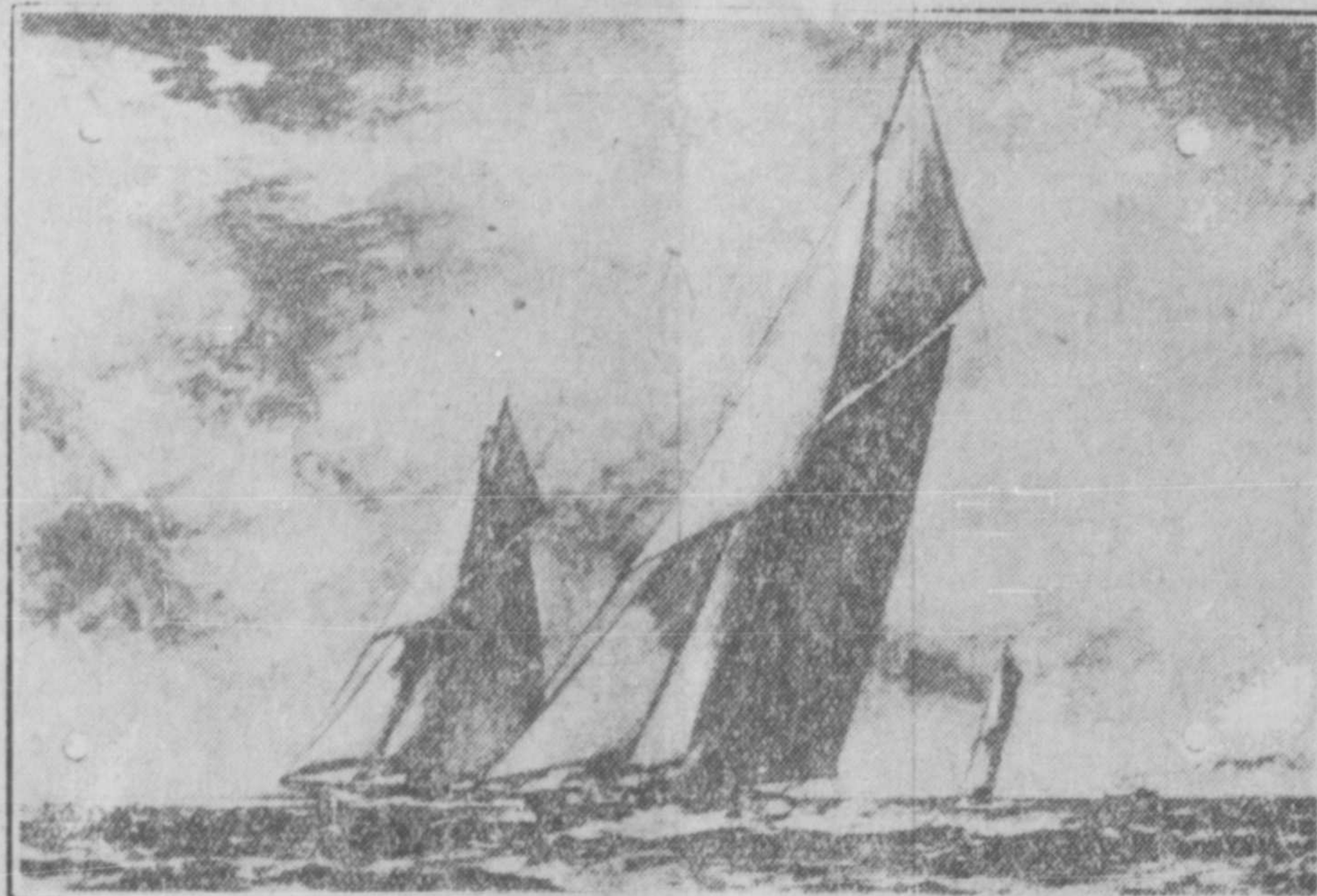
Kitty Lee went to the United States in a sailing vessel 77 years ago and lived in New York many years. She returned to Ireland and has lived here since 1871.

New Shipping Company Plans to Commence Developing Trade with Orient from Prince Rupert

"There will be no delay in the development program," state the organizers of the International Shippers Ltd. announcement of whose incorporation with a capitalization of \$50,000 and head office in Prince Rupert for the purpose of instituting cargo shipments through this port to and from Alaska, British Columbia and the Orient, was announced yesterday. They indicate that there has already been extensive preparatory work carried out with a view to ship chartering, reciprocal marketing of products and other activities. Further details, they state, will be worked out through the use of the cable and mails pending the inauguration of the proposed cargo shipments. The registered head office of the company is in Prince Rupert but, a development proceeds, the management expects to have branches at other centres of production as well as domestic and foreign agencies all of which will be necessary in connection with the operation of the project.

This organization, stated one of its organizers, is the outcome of negotiations conducted over many months past, during which time visits were made to a number of foreign ports most interested in shipping through the important central gateway of Prince Rupert. The leading exporters and importers, financial men and shipowners consulted showed a remarkable familiarity with Prince Rupert harbor, its rail and other connecting facilities reaching all of the producing and consuming centers of Canada and countries adjoining.

The Orient, in particular, it is stated, appreciates the nearness of Prince Rupert in comparison with that of other Pacific ports, and furthermore, it is decidedly in the market for available exports from this port. The matter of providing homeward cargo has always been the factor that stood in the way of the use of Prince Rupert as a gateway. Though it is fully recognized that resources, both near and abundant, await development, yet shipping has most persistently concentrated at and through more distant ports to the southward. British Columbia, for instance, sends to Japan alone average monthly shipments of approximately from 25,000 to 35,000,000 board feet of timber in which Northern British Columbia does not appear to participate though rich in forest products while, immediately to the northward, Alaska with an enormous timber stand has likewise been unable to share in such trade. Alaskan forests alone could supply Japan's annual requirements. Practically nothing is shipped from either Alaska or from this vast portion of Canada although the largest consuming markets of the world plead for the export surplus in exchange for their tremendous gold balance arising from their sale to America of silk and many other commodities.

A year ago the 69th Congress of the United States passed legislation whereby the vast forest stands in Alaska, in excess of the necessary reserve for local requirements, became eligible to export. The Act passed both houses of Congress and was signed by President Coolidge and it became the law governing Alaskan national forests from April 12, 1926. By that Act the said surplus aggregating

LONDON, Jan. 19.—General Sutton who with G. G. McGeer, K.C., and Noel Humphrys, civil engineer, all of Vancouver, who are in England in connection with the sale of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway has figured prominently in the columns of the daily press and the weekly illustrated journals, who have made much of his adventurous career. The General and his two associates were entertained by the Agent-General at the British Empire Club. It is rumored that General Sutton has succeeded so far in his mission as to engage the attention of an important financial house which is now reviewing the whole railway situation in B.C. with a view to taking action in the near future.

HOMER CITY NEXT WHEAT VESSEL HERE

British Steamer Expected to Arrive from Barry Docks at End of Week

Prince Rupert's next and twelfth grain ship of the season will be the British steamer Homer City which is expected to arrive in about three days' time. The vessel is bound in ballast from Barry Docks, South Wales, and at 8 o'clock last night was six hundred miles from Digby Island. The Homer City is one of the usual type of freighters and belongs to the well known "Bristol City Line." She is understood to be already lined so there should be no delay in getting her loaded and away to the United Kingdom or Continent with a full cargo of wheat from the Alberta Wheat Pool's Prince Rupert elevator.

AUSTRALIA SUBSIDY FOR CANNED FRUIT SENT TO BRITAIN

Annual Report of District Forester Throws Light on the Lumber and Timber Industry

The annual report of the district forester to the minister of lands makes interesting reading. It states that the production for the year amounted to a total of 809,611 for the district. The new Big Bay mill at Seal Cove will have a daily output of 60,000 feet. Ninety-five per cent of the poles cut in the district go to United States part by rail and part by water. Rumor of a Rayon Mill for Swanson Bay and reopening of Buckley Bay are all features of the report which follows:

PULP AND PAPER
There have been no new developments in this industry this year. The Pacific Mills plant has operated continuously. Nothing definite is known as to what may be expected to take place at Swanson Bay. A Rayon silk plant has been rumored. Any resumption of operations must be preceded by extensive reconstruction, as wharves and buildings have become very much deteriorated.

LOGGING AND MILLING
Logging activities in the Coast area have been on the wane, much of the logging this year having been done incidentally to the closing of several operations. The Pacific Mills is the biggest and steadiest consumer, and logs have been obtained by that company at their own price. The interior loggers, being mostly mill operators, have not experienced a very good year, owing to the fact that the mills have been operating on a falling market.

The prospects for 1928 are not very bright, but the loggers find some consolation in that there is not a large stock of logs on hand. This statement applies most particularly to the Coast. The centre of logging operations for pulp is shifting north, and in 1928 the most intensive activities will be found in Kildala Arm, Douglas Channel. This follows the creating of Pulp District No. 2.

The biggest development is the construction of a new mill at Seal Cove by the Big Bay Lumber Company which will replace the present Georgetown Agent W. E. Collier who has been called away from the district. NEED OF FINISHING DOCK

The big salmon dock owned by the Canadian National Railway has never been completed. Owing to the absence of a sprinkler system there, the cost of insurance is abnormally high and shippers cannot afford to store goods in large quantities.

The matter was mentioned to Sir Henry Thornton when he was here last summer and again was brought up by Colonel Nicholls on taking office as president of the board of trade this week. The latter stated it would take about \$20,000 to complete the work and then it would be possible to store salmon there and recondition it and make it ready for the market.

Prince Rupert is the logical place for this work and it might be handled here if efforts were made to get after it. This should be impressed on the railway company.

BRITAIN AGAIN LEADS

Britain is again leading the world. This time it is in naval disarmament. While the representatives of the government stood for the right to build certain ships under treaty with the United States and refused to give way under pressure, they have now given way without a treaty and announce the intention to refrain from building the ships for which the right was demanded.

It seems a pity that this could not have been determined upon at the time of the Geneva meeting. However, it may not be too late to make a treaty with United States and Japan. The latter country is particularly anxious for such a treaty owing to financial conditions.

QUESTION OF TITLES

The question of titles in Great Britain is one that is often discussed and is open to considerable controversy. It is noticed that while some leading men are never recognized, others get title after title and seem to be continually in the public eye. One reason for this is known to be that some people absolutely refuse to accept titles as they do not believe in the system or they feel that there is greater honor in being a plain citizen. Some of the greatest statesmen accept a knighthood or a baronetcy while others, much less notable, are given higher positions. The whole system is terribly involved and very unsatisfactory. It shows the wisdom of the Canadian governments in asking that Canadians be exempt from the system altogether.

INTEREST IN HOCKEY

The American invasion by professional ice hockey is one of the spectacular sporting developments of recent years. The French Canadian team from Montreal is the favorite of the season. Les Canadiens can always pack a rink whether it be in Boston, New York or Chicago. The story of the struggle to secure seats at Boston to see them play this week is an indication of the popularity of the game and the interest in sport for sport's sake which is developing in the United States. They expect their own team to lose and the visitors to win, yet they flock to see the game because of its intrinsic interest.

WORLD ADMIRES GOOD LOSER

To win in sport is, of course, the aim of every athlete, says the Edmonton Journal. One would not expect or wish it to be otherwise. Yet, since prizes are few and competitors many, all cannot carry away the palm of victory. We are forced to recognize, in fact, that to win is, after all, not the main thing in sport. There is truth in the old platitude that "the game is the thing."

Nor is here any more acid test of character than that of defeat. The athlete who gives up or attempts to cover his failure by a flock of excuses and alibis has not apparently caught the true meaning of sport, which seems to demand not only that the victor shall wear his laurels modestly, but that the loser, while admitting his defeat frankly and without evasions, shall at once set to and prepare to try again. This does not prevent him from analyzing the causes of his previous failure and utilizing what he discovers in his next attempt.

In sport, as in most other things, the head can help the heels. The man who can lose with a smile and prepare with coolness and a technique improved by his defeats to try again has built up a true sportsman's character and achieved victory from defeat. It is not without reason that the world admires a good loser.

FORMER CONSUL RECEIVES GIFT

Beautiful Gold Watch Sent From Seattle to E. A. Wakefield

Former Consul Wakefield who is now at Ensenada was agreeably surprised recently when he received a present by mail of a beautiful 18K jewel Hamilton watch with a platinum gold double chain. It came from the Fishing Vessel Owners' Association of Seattle. Writing to a friend here Mr. Wakefield says: "It was certainly most unexpected. Naturally I was very much pleased to know that the masters and vessel owners of the halibut fleet were so kindly disposed toward me."

Mr. Wakefield says that with the exception of three or four days during which four and a half inches of rain fell, the weather had been delightful since he reached Ensenada. The thermometer on January 8, the day before he wrote, stood at 70 in the shade.

Mrs. William Anderson left last week for a trip south.

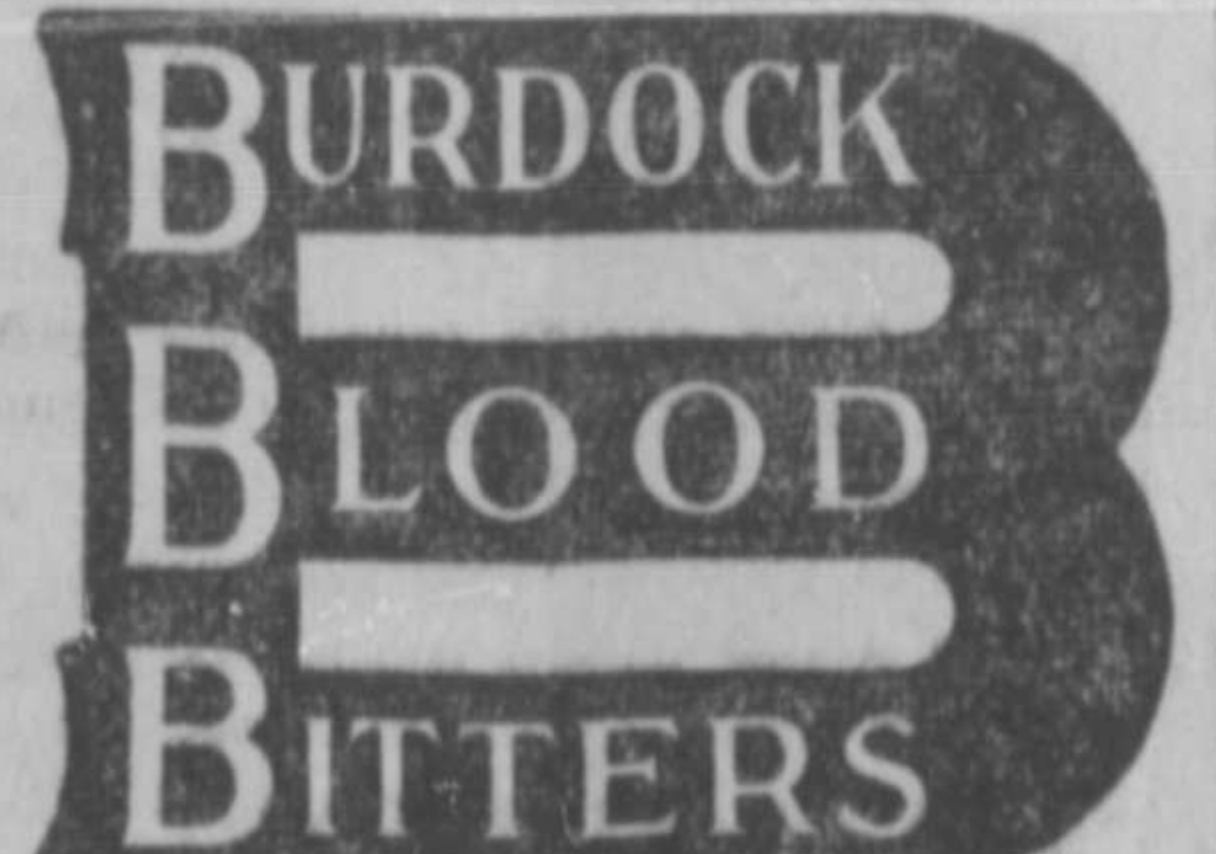
According to word received here, financing of the Bayview property for the coming season's development work is just about completed. This property is situated on the mountain just north of town and is known to contain some interesting high grade ore.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS
Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.
Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.
For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt Land."

PURCHASE
Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 19, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

HOMESITE LEASES
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES
For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 440 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING
Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free or partly free permits are available for settlers, cowboys and travellers, up to ten head.

WOMEN HEAR MISSIONARY

Miss Robbins Who is Visiting Here, Addressed Anglican Auxiliary Yesterday

Telling of the work done by the Anglican missions in Hunan, China, and of many of the Chinese customs and traits, Miss Catherine H. Robbins addressed a meeting of about sixty ladies of the Women's Auxiliary in the Anglican Rectory yesterday afternoon, Mrs. Andrew presiding.

Mrs. Rix helped receive the visitors and introduced the speaker, telling at the same time of the value of missionary work and giving some personal experience in connection therewith.

Miss Robbins told of having left Winnipeg for China eighteen years ago. It was just about that time that one of the periodic famines afflicted the country and the efforts of the missionaries were devoted to relieving distress and looking after bereaved orphans.

The orphanage is for boys only but on one occasion years ago two girls came in and could not be refused, Miss Robbins took them under her personal care with wonderful results to the mission. When recently the British government ordered the withdrawal of the missionaries owing to the unsettled state of the country, the work was kept going owing to the faithfulness of these two girls, who, having married each a husband trained in the school, they are today keeping the mission going, one in charge of the hostel and the other of the orphanage. Funds for this work come from Canada.
