MITHERS, May 29 .- Stanley B. Rutland, who is associated with L. S. McGill of Smithers, has been successful in bringing in English capital for the development of the Jessie Group on Hudson Bay Mountain, five miles from Smithers. This property is only two and a half miles from the Canadian National Railways and on the slope towards the railway. Last summer it opened up very well under surface work directed to showing up the various veins on the property and ore bodies on the several veins now show continuous ore for nearly one thousand feet in length.

The Jessie Gold Mines Syndicate has now been organized to carry on a full season's development this year and ample funds are provided for this purpose. The work will start early in June and will continue to open up the several known veins on the surface from the point left off last year. Later an effort will be made to prove depth of the ore by tunnel or shaft work.

Values on the Jessie Group show from \$6 to \$15 in gold, while the galena carries values in silver and lead up to \$150. Copper and zinc values are also found in some of the veins.

FISHERIES CHANGES

It is difficult to understand as yet what will be the result of the judgment of the supreme court in regard to the salmon fisheries on this coast. It is plain enough that when the Dominion government loses control of the canneries the province takes charge and has full control with the right to charge license fees. That is be charged to a drift, following the vein plain enough.

In regard to the fishermen, the report received of the judgment is just out of reach of high tides. indicates that any person who is a British subject has the right to lamples of the ore show good mineralia license on submitting the proper application and tendering the prescribed fee. Another judgment is that those who are not British subjects cannot be granted licenses. At present something like 600 non-British fishermen are given licenses, mostly Norwegians. ANOTHER CHURCH FOR PRINCE RUPERT

It seems but a few years ago that Prince Rupert had only one or two churches fininshed. The Anglicans were using their parish hall and the Presbyterians a temporary structure that has since been pulled down. The Baptist and Methodists had buildings but they were loaded with debt. Now we find all the Churches have, good buildings almost clear from debt with the exception of the Lutherans and they are taking steps to remedy the situation this, year when they erect a new church on Sixth and Dunsmuir. This is an indication of more settled conditions. It follows from the establishment of homes here and the general improvement of the city.

DIFFICULTIES OF SETTLEMENT

The difficulties of settling this north country are well illustrated in the case of Kitimaat. The people there have a mail once a month. Yesterday a resident of the valley dropped into the office and paid his subscription to the News.
